Dictatorship on Teaching Resented

In the national capital to take an oath, before receiving each pay check, that they neither have taught nor advocated communism.

Discussions at the committee sessions classified the rider as an "insult" to teachers, several members remarking that unthinking laymen apparently believe they are being patriotic when they force oaths upon teachers.

The motion to seek repeal of the rider was made by John Callahan,

state superintendent of public instruction in Wisconsin.

Former Salaries Sought Means to remedy inequalities in educational opportunities came in for considerable discussion in separate sessions today. The restoration of teachers' pay to pre-recession levels also was given at-

tention.

William T. Carr, director of research of the N.E.A., described such restoration as "the first and most urgent need in respect to salaries."

The "inequalities" will be considered further tomorrow when the legislative commission will recommend that federal appropriations be made for education. It was expected that an amount from \$100,000 to \$200,000 annually would be asked.

Paul T. Taylor, Syracuse, N. Y., chairman of the N.E.A. committee on academic freedom, supported previous attacks on teaching limitations by declaring the attitude of several school boards has been "blessed are the meek for they shall inherit new contracts."

Continuing, she said "one trustee declared, 'when I pick a teacher, I pick her good-looking and give me one that doesn't talk too much.'"

"Patriotism and stonewall—what would happen to my teacher organization if all teachers were chosen on those merits?" the New York woman asked.

Delegates will begin voting on new officers today, soon after nominations are made. The report of the elections committee will be made Thursday night, following the political debate between three outstanding exponents of the democratic, republican and socialist parties.

12 OF BLACK LEGION FACE MURDER TRIAL

DETROIT, June 30.—(AP)—Twelve men, defendants with Day-ton Dean in the Black Legion slaying of Charles A. Poole, were ordered held without bail for trial when they stood mute on arraignment today in circuit court.

Plans of innocent were entered for them. The trial date was not set.

The men are among the 15 charged with kidnapping and murdering Poole. The other two have not been arraigned.

Dean, whose willingness to relate the activities of the hooded order has aided the state to build cases against nearly 50 persons, pleaded guilty late Monday to the kidnapping and "execution" of Charles A. Poole last May 12.

The confessed "trigger-man" faces a life sentence. Formal pronouncement awaits completion of a probate report expected in a week. Then prosecutors expect to use him as a witness in forthcoming trials.

The death of Poole, young WPA worker falsely accused by the Black Legion of beating his wife, first brought the raids of the night riders into the open.

Dean and 14 others were charged with kidnapping and murder. The calm but talkative Dean told investigators of death plots against political foes of the secret society, of flagging and beatings, of "torch" squads detailed to burn homes of suspected communists.

Pleading guilty yesterday, Dean told the Detroit civil service commission that "possibly a hundred" policemen were members of the hooded order and that "a lot of other city employees in the Black Legion haven't lost their jobs yet."

Walter Mason Micklen, 86, well-known resident of Douglas county and for the past several years a resident of the Melrose district, died yesterday following prolonged illness. He was born at Bukshire, England, June 8, 1850, and came to this country at 20. His wife died in November, 1933.

Surviving are six daughters: Mrs. Alice Cozad, Melrose; Mrs. Ada Strong, The Dalles, Ore.; Mrs. Myrtle Freese, Vale, Ore.; Mrs. Elma Pettit, Nampa, Ida.; Mrs. Vye Foster, Portland, Ore.; and Mrs. Augusta Anderson, Marshfield, Ore.

The body has been removed to the Douglas funeral home, and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

BOBBY WILSON TO CRASH GRID FILM

(HOLLYWOOD, Calif., June 30.—(AP)—Bobby Wilson, Southern Methodist's great halfback, will be seen on the screen as a teammate of four athletes who in life were his gridiron foes.

Officials of the R. K. O. studios announced they had signed Wilson for a part in the forthcoming picture "The Big Game."

Four members of the Stanford football team whom Wilson faced in the last Rose bowl game will also appear in the film.

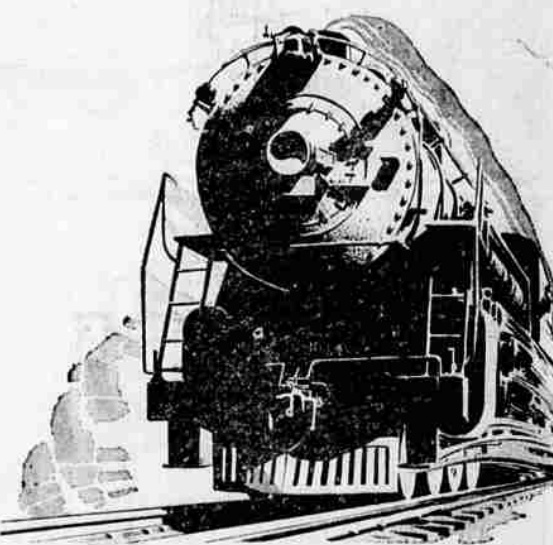
