

### EDUCATORS URGE U. S. SCHOOL AID

#### Social Racketeers Exploit American Youth, Says U. of C. President.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1.—(AP)—A militant note in the battle for academic freedom and a recommendation that the federal government aid education in the amount of \$100,000,000 to \$300,000,000 a year came to the floor of the 74th annual convention of the National Education association today.

Delegates settled into their second business session after hearing Dr. Robert Sproul, president of the University of California, answer a talk on "Youth's Appeal" by declaring the youth of America "are being mercilessly exploited . . . by the social racketeers . . ."

"The answer of America to her youth must be today . . . abundant life, ordered liberty, and the right to pursue happiness with some prospect of attaining it."

Reports of the committee on academic freedom and tenure, overlapping to a considerable degree, urged "public support of teachers" in independent instruction and an investigation of all discharges in violation of the principle of unrestricted teaching.

Several speakers in earlier sessions denounced the congressional "red rider" compelling teachers of the District of Columbia to take oath that communism did not come up for discussion in their classes.

The committee on academic freedom said, "teachers . . . should be accorded the full legal rights of all citizens to express publicly their views . . ."

### RISKO TELLS WHAT HE'LL DO TO STEELE

SEATTLE, July 1.—(AP)—Eddie "Babe" Risko, world's middleweight champion, and Freddie Steele, the northwest's wonder boy from Tacoma, Wash., today settled down to their final training drive before their championship fight here July 10.

Promoter Nate Druxman announced that a \$79,000 gate was in prospect. He said \$40,000 was already in the bank.

Risko's manager, Gabe Genovese, said he had received two offers for his titleholder with the provision Steele is whipped.

"One bid, Genovese said, was for \$25,000 to meet Allen Mathews, colored middleweight contender, in St. Louis.

The other was to fight Jock McAvoy at the middleweight limit in Manchester, England.

Risko, looking in excellent condition, said he was going to "knock Steele's jaws in."

"Steele may have more polish in his boxing than I possess, but I'll brush that aside. I'll take the war to him. That's the way to beat him."

Steele won a decision over Risko in a non-title bout here last spring.

### CARDS CLIMB BACK INTO LEAGUE LEAD

The Cardinals are proving a tough team to keep down despite the recent feats of the Chicago Cubs. As for the Yankees, who have adopted some of the "gas house" tactics of bludgeoning the opposition without mercy, there doesn't seem to be any way at all to hinder them.

After being shoved down into second place for one day and then sharing the lead with the Cubs for another—the first time in over a month the top of the National league had not been exclusively theirs—the Cards fought their way back into first place yesterday with a double victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates, one of their major rivals.

Both games were tough ones but under the leadership of Pepper Martin and the venerable Jesse "Pop" Haines, the Cardinals won 2 to 1 and 4 to 3.

The Yankees, meanwhile, buried their closest rivals, the Boston Red Sox under a landslide of blows to win a doubleheader 10 to 9 and 6 to 3, and increased their lead to 2 1/2 games.

A crowd of 54,916 at the Yankee stadium saw Lou Gehrig contribute his 19th and 20th home runs to the festivities to take second place in the major league race behind Jimmie Fox, who has 22 homers.

A third major development yesterday was the Giants' drop out of the first division for the first time since 1932. A 7 to 6 setback at the hands of the Boston Bees put the Terrymen one point behind the Cincinnati Reds, who had an open date. The Phillies-Dodgers, Tigers-White Sox and Indians-Browns games were rained out.
