FARM GRAIN CORP. ENDS YEAR IN RED

CHICAGO, June 30.—(AP)—Audit of the farmers national grain corporation books for the year ended today was expected by C. E. Huff, president of the government-sponsored cooperative, to show a loss of more than \$1,000,000 for the period.

Huff said yesterday that losses for the year ending June 30, 1935, are now indicated as being "somewhat over" the unimpaired capital and surplus of \$1,098,692 which the corporation reported on June 30, 1935.

Brought and relatively large grain imports, resulting in erratic movement in grain to market, he said, occasioned operating losses during the last three years.

He said that a refinancing plan through which the cooperative by negotiation with the farm credit administration, will begin the fiscal year with at least \$6,000,000 in working capital, "contemplates that regional stockholders in turn made up of local cooperative elevators owned by farmers, will purchase a very substantial amount of new capital stock in farmers national."

Spirit among the members of the company was excellent, Captain Miceili reports, and all tasks were performed promptly and efficiently. There was little sickness and no serious accidents. A few minor accidents occurred, the most serious being a sprained elbow suffered by Arthur Karlinger who was left at the Vancouver hospital for treatment.

JUNE UNDER NORMAL AS TO RAINFALL

The month of June was above normal in temperature and below in rainfall, according to the monthly meteorological summary compiled by D. P. Marting, in charge of the local office of the U. S. weather bureau.

The mean temperature for the month was 61.7 degrees as compared with a normal of 62.5 degrees. The highest temperature recorded was 87 degrees on the 21st and the lowest 45 degrees on the 28th.

Rainfall for the month totaled .02 of an inch as compared with a normal of 1.09 inches. Despite the deficiency for June, the seasonal rainfall totaling 34.67 inches is 2.27 inches above normal, with an excess of 4.43 inches since January 1.
