DOUGLAS B. & L. PLANS LOWER RATE

A marked improvement in conditions was shown in the report of J. E. McClintock, secretary of the Douglas Building and Loan association at the annual meeting of the association Tuesday.

The year shows a substantial improvement in collections and sale of property owned by the association, the secretary reported, with prospects of additional sales within the next few months at satisfactory prices. Loans have advanced on an average of 40 per cent over a year ago, the stockholders were informed. Withdrawals have been small, except on mortgages. Delinquent taxes have been paid on a majority.

Directors elected for the coming year were H. J. Eddy, George Kohlhaugen, Edward Kohlhaugen, A. S. Coen, B. W. Strong, Dr. E. B. Stewart and J. E. McClintock.

Following the meeting of the stockholders, the directors met to complete their organization, choosing H. J. Eddy, president; George Kohlhaugen, vice-president; B. W. Strong, treasurer; J. E. McClintock, secretary, and Olive Liller, assistant secretary.

The board ordered interest rates reduced to 4 per cent on all new investments after July 1. The action was necessitated, it was explained, because of the lowering of interest rates on loans. The action does not affect investments of present stockholders, who will continue to be paid 5 per cent annually.

It was also ordered that the association resume making approved loans in the city of Roseburg at the new loan rate of interest. All new loans are to include taxes and insurance in the monthly payments.

FERRY STRIKE AT PORTLAND SETTLED

PORTLAND, July 2.—(AP)—A strike of ferryboatmen on the Western Transportation company towboats plying on the Willamette river came to an end today with acceptance of a new working agreement.

Reo Gault, company manager, said the exact conditions of the agreement could not be announced. About 95 men walked out, tying up the service.

50 MILLION LOAN ASKED BY SELASSIE

GENEVA, July 2.—(AP)—Emperor Haile Selassie asked the league of nations assembly tonight to

approve a loan of \$50,000,000 to finance Ethiopia's defense of her "integrity."

The vanquished nega also presented to the assembly the draft of a resolution under which it would pledge itself to refrain from recognizing any territorial annexation achieved by force of arms.

Selassie went before the nation for the second time to plead for the seemingly lost cause of his African kingdom, now declared a part of the reborn Italian empire by Premier Benito Mussolini.

Drought Likely To Put Farmer F. D. R. In 'Red'

WARM SPRINGS, Ga., July 2.—(AP)—Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Georgia farmer, stands to lose "a lot of money" this year because of the drought plaguing the wheat in this section in years.

Rain has not descended the president's farm on Hoo mountain since Mr. Roosevelt passed here April 8 on his return to Washington from a vacation fishing trip off the Florida coast.

"It's bad on the farm," said Otto Moore, superintendent of the president's estate here, pointing to the dried fields and withering wheat which corn that should be waving over one's head at this time of year.

"I don't know how it will turn out. The way it looks now we'll be lucky to make one fifth of a crop. We're going to lose a lot of money."

Pastures for the herd of 125 cattle have browned and lifeless. The sun has stunted the growth of 50 acres of corn—the only crop planted before the dry weather forced a halt.

All hope, however, has not been abandoned by Moore.

"We're putting fertilizer around the corn, but that won't do much good if it don't rain."

"That's just our last hope—rain. And it will have to come within the next two weeks."

RADIO'S "JOHNNIE" BATTLES INJURIES

SANTA CRUZ, Calif., July 2.—(AP)—Al Altem, known to radio listeners as "Johnnie," who impersonates a page boy on a cigarette company program, is recovering from injuries received in an auto accident last week in an auto.

One man lost his life in the accident, and five were hurt.

Altem, whose home is in Bridgeport, Conn., received multiple fractures of the pelvis and possible internal injuries.

OREGON BODY EYES CROP CONTRACTS

SALEM, July 2.—(AP)—A committee of five men will start investigation into various agricultural contracts between processors and growers here late today following organization, Solon T. White, director of agriculture, announced.

The members of the investigating group were chosen by Governor Martin 10 days ago after complaints had been made against the so-called "open end contracts" in which processors and canners of prunes and berries set the price paid to farmers.

In addition to investigating the contracts the committee will be instructed to study grades and standards of prunes; make a general inspection of the prune industry; and practices of canners in receiving and cooling green fruits at the canneries.

The committee is composed of John Ramage of Woodburn, Dave Busenbark of Roseburg, Paul Carpenter of Corvallis, Louis Harner of Carlton and L. H. McBee of Dallas.

BANDIT GARDNER'S EX-WIFE TO WED

NAPA, Calif., July 2.—(AP)—Florence Irene Gardner, 39-year-old former wife of Roy George Gardner, notorious mail train robber, and William Parkes, 40, attendant at Napa state hospital, have filed notice of intention to wed.

Mrs. Gardner obtained an annulment of her marriage June 6 from Superior Judge Percy King of Napa. Her annulment petition, filed April 26, alleged Gardner, when she married him in 1918, withheld information that he had been convicted and served time in San Quentin prison.

WASHINGTON, July 2.—(AP)—Figuring down to the last pennies, the treasury today put the government deficit for the year ended June 30 at \$4,763,841,642.48 and the public debt at the close of that fiscal period at \$33,778,543,493.73.

Today's calculation in the treasury's statement of its position, listed expenditures for the year as \$8,879,798,257.61—again including debt retirements. Receipts came to \$4,115,956,615.13.
