GENEVA, July 3.—(AP)—A Czechoslovakian newspaper reporter-photographer, Stefan Lux, interrupted the league of nations assembly sessions today to shout: "This is the end!" and shoot himself.

Lux, a Jew, left a letter saying he wished by his act to draw world attention to the situation of the Jews in Germany.

Premier Paul Van Zeeland of Belgium, president of the assembly expressed regrets for the incident, then said: "Gentlemen, let us continue."
