

Legion Juniors Facing Two-Game Test

EUGENE TO BE FOE OVER WEEK-END

Battles to Be Preparatory to Elimination Series in State Schedule.

The Douglas county Legion junior baseball team will be given real tests Saturday and Sunday in games with the Eugene Juniors at Finlay field. Games will be played both Saturday and Sunday afternoon, starting at 2:30 o'clock.

The two games in succession are expected to be excellent workouts for both teams in preparation for the state elimination contests, soon to get under way.

Glenn Elliott, Myrtle Creek south-paw and ace pitcher for the county team, is expected to take the mound in Saturday's game. Elliott out-threw Pete Igo, Eugene's leading pitcher, in the 5 to 4 Roseburg victory last Sunday. Sunday's game will probably see Bobby Morris, Oakland curveball pitcher, as starting hurler. Elliott has been showing unusual ability this year. He has two years of junior ball experience, and coupled with his good control and fast breaking hooks is going to be a real contender for high honors in the state competition this year. Morris is also a coming pitcher, it is believed, having a good curve ball and lots of deception. He is also available as an infielder, playing an excellent game at shortstop.

Available also for pitching duties is Andy Wham, or Milton Andrews as he is sometimes known, a tall youngster from Yoncalla. He has a natural, easy, side-arm delivery with plenty of speed and a fast breaking curve. He has shown a tendency to be a poor starter, and usually gets into trouble for the first inning or two after which he settles down to a pace which baffles his opposition.

His Sporer is another pitching possibility. He is a rugged youngster with a zipping speed ball and has proven a fine relief hurler. He is used at the shortstop position when not working the mound.

McLain is Spark Plug
The Douglas county pitchers are made to show off to the best advantage by the work of Curley McLain of Myrtle Creek, who is to his third year of junior baseball. McLain has a mean delivery in placing his fielders to advantage and is exceptionally good in his ability to aid pitchers in overcoming wildness. As the spark plug of the team his work is fully on a par with his catching ability.

Ellis Neal from Glendale is another boy who is extremely valuable. Neal is one of the hardest worked players on the squad. He can play any position, even to pitching a few innings if needed. He has had two years of junior ball, and his experience is of great value as a steady effect upon the less experienced players. He is also one of the leading hitters.

Chick Anlauf, shortstop, is the smallest member of the squad, which is composed of the biggest youngsters who have ever represented the county. Among boys who tip the scales around 185 pounds, Anlauf, weighing about a 140, appears small. However, he swings a lumpy bat and in fielding his position is very fast and demonstrates a good throwing arm to first.

George Cronch of Roseburg, second baseman, is working against the handicap of being out of his natural position, but is nevertheless making a real showing. He is a natural outfielder, but has been moved to the infield to fill in a spot there for which no natural player was uncovered. He is in his third year of junior ball. He is proving particularly valuable as a lead-off hitter and has shown uncanny ability to force opposing pitchers to pass him to first base.

Burnell Hall of Riddle is a natural third baseman with a whip that fairly tears off the mitt off the first baseman on the throw across the diamond. He is a big, husky youngster, although not yet 15 years old.

Ray Morgan, Roseburg, outfielder, is the team's best ball hawk. He has excellent judgment on fly balls and is hustling every minute. As second hitter on the lineup he is very valuable, due to his natural ability in laying down bunts.

First Sacker Is "Find"
Billy Vleck, Glendale, was a most welcome find to the coaches who were badly worried at the start of the season by the lack of a prospective first baseman. Vleck, however, took over the duties like a veteran and is handling the difficult bag with precision. He is a hard worker, and a real chatterbox.

Jimmy Marr, also of Glendale, is a utility outfielder and pinch hitter. He is showing great promise as a natural coach at first base.

Robert McKay of Roseburg is a utility player available for either outfield or infield, or he can take the mound when needed. He is a good stickler and very valuable as a pinch hitter.

Gene Hollbrook of Glendale, who holds down the centerfield job, is a rangy boy who is not only a good ball hawk, but has an arm which has cut off many runners trying to stretch their hits.

Altogether the team shows much promise and a little practice together should turn out a squad that will be a threat in the state championship contest.

ZIONCHECK ADVISED TO SUE NORTHWEST AIRLINES
WASHINGTON, July 3.—(AP)—Kenneth Romney, house sergeant-at-arms, told newsmen today he was advising Marion Zioncheck, the Northwest Airlines pilot, for refusing to carry the Washington representative from Chicago this week.

Zioncheck was required to leave the plane after getting aboard at Chicago. Romney said he made reservations from Washington.

The sergeant-at-arms said he had instructed Mrs. Josephine Young, Zioncheck's secretary who left last night for Seattle, to tell the representative he could bring suit in federal court against the airline, and to tell him that Romney would go to Seattle to testify.

"They put him out of the plane after taking around the field for photographs and publicity," Romney said. "They will get publicity all right, but it will be adverse."

CAMPBELL STAGES THIRD COMEBACK

Cleveland Outfielder Hits at Dizzy Pace to Lead Team to Victory.

Bruce Campbell, one of the grander boys in this baseball business, is another athlete who's finding the experts in a sports year already dizzy with such goings-on.

Three stricken with spinal meningitis, and rated through as a ball player less than two months ago because of the dread disease, the Cleveland Indian outfielder, chuck full of what the trade calls "noxy," is making his third comeback from the illness one of his most impressive.

Up from his hospital bed only about three weeks, he already has boosted his batting mark considerably despite his long absence. He is among the first 20 hitters in the American league, and is giving indications of making this season one of the best of his career.

If there was any lingering doubt about his recovery, he took it apart yesterday. He led off against St. Louis Brown pitching for seven straight hits, as the tribe came through in both ends of a doubleheader, 14-6 and 4-2. Campbell hammered out a double and five singles in the opener, then added another single his first time up in the nightcap, after which he was removed "for a rest."

Red Sox Sinking
The twin who pulled the tribe up to fourth place in the league standings, as the sinking Boston Red Sox sank out of the first division into fifth place by losing their fourth straight to the Yankees, 8-7, for their seventh setback in a row. The Tigers, meantime, held onto second place by beating the White Sox 7-1 behind Schoofy Rowe's seventh pitching, and the Senators took over sole possession of third place with a 4-3 edge over the Athletics.

Cards Cling to Lead
In the National league, the Cardinals held onto their slim half-game first-place edge by nodding out the Pirates 4-2, with the game-winning hit by a virtual one-man pitching staff, Dizzy Dean, chalking up his 14th win of the season, while the second-place Cubs were outlasting the Cincinnati Reds 5-6 in 15 innings. The Giants climbed back into the first division through the Red Sox setback and their own close finish 7-6 over the Yankees, while the Phillies finally got some pitching — Lucky Walter turning in a four-hit performance — and shut out the Dodgers 5-0.

DALLAS, Texas, July 3.—(AP)—Fans bood here last night as Max Baer, former champion heavyweight, toyed with 217-pound Buck Rogers before knocking him out in the third round.

After a friendly reference to former President Herbert Hoover for adding his Rapidan camp to the Shenandoah park acreage, Ickes recalled that the federal policy of requiring donations of almost all the land for new national parks made it especially difficult to establish them in the east.

I can see the danger of a policy of appropriating money for the purchase of lands," he said. "Once the government began to do this there would be enormous pressure from every state in the union for the establishment of at least one park."

"We want no 'park barrel' recreational policy, no national parks that are log-rolled through the halls of congress. Yet we require more parks if we are wisely to anticipate future needs and surely there is enough statesmanship in the country to set up safeguards against reckless or improvident expenditures. . . ."

Out of the only federal fund for park acquisition, a \$750,000 PWA allotment, Ickes said the building of the parkway connecting Shenandoah and Great Smoky mountains parks had been begun.

roads and water conserving dams. They hoped to put the first contingent of an army of 50,000 cropless farmers to work in several days.

In the national capital, President Roosevelt's special drought committee shaped a general assistance program. Reports to the resettlement administration indicated 100,000 farm families would need aid.

Grain Prices Soar
World-wide alarm over the situation precipitated a buying stampede on both sides of the Atlantic yesterday. High price records for the season were shattered on the Chicago market by every grain on the list. Wheat's shy ride lifted it past the long sought "dollar-a-bushel" level. Its five cent advance at Chicago was halted by exchange rules forbidding a bulge of more than a nickel a day. Corn surged up the allowable limit of four cents.

December wheat swung up to \$1.03 at Chicago and to \$1.18 at Minneapolis. Traders studied estimations of the wheat and dryness had already destroyed 100,000 to 140,000 bushels of spring wheat in the United States and 75,000,000 in Canada. Wheat has gained 15 cents since June 1 and corn 12 in a month.

Southern crop damage was calculated at \$150,000,000, although general rains in Tennessee, Arkansas and the middle and west gulf states provided a respite yesterday. Chicago statisticians figured \$100,000,000 losses in the Midwest. They asserted Canada's bill possibly might reach \$75,000,000.

Agricultural observers in the Dakotas and Montana termed the visitation the worst in the history of their states. Yields far short of normal were envisioned in the affected regions of Minnesota and Wyoming.

Officials in the Black Hills area of South Dakota decided to abandon their wasted fields to grasshoppers. They returned a consignment of poison grain shipped to eradicate the pests.

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CONTRACTS LIMIT TEACHERS' AFFAIRS
MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 3.—(AP)—In Alabama school teachers must promise not to have company or go automobile riding on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday nights.

And in Mississippi a teachers' contract reads: "It is further agreed that no teacher will play society or unnecessarily frolic on school nights."

While a town in North Carolina requires its teachers to promise to "take vital interest in all phases of Sunday school work, donating my time, service and money for the benefit of the community; not to go out with young men except when necessary to stimulate Sunday school work and not to fall in love, become engaged or secretly married."
