MEDICO-HOSPITAL FIGHT BEING WAGED

PORTLAND, July 6.—(AP)—The fight between hospital associations and the Multnomah county medical society moved to a new battleground today with the society threatening physicians who work in the future for the associations with loss of their memberships. The action of the society followed upon its withdrawal last July of approval of one association, asserting that experience showed that the practice "eventually results in a decided deterioration of medical care."

The associations, which have more than 100 physicians engaged here, offer employment group memberships at a small sum per month, entitling the subscriber to hospital and medical attention without payment of more than the monthly assessment.

Proponents of the association claim they keep people of charity rolls and permit \$14-a-week clerks full medical attention at a price they can afford.

Expansion of physicians from the county society would prevent society members from treating special cases of the associations.

JUVENILE BAND TO PLAY IN ROSEBURG The Antlers band, junior organization of Portland lodge, No. 112, R. P. O. Elks, will visit Roseburg Wednesday, July 8, and will be sponsored by the local Elks lodge in a public concert at Library park at 8 p. m.

The band is composed of 26 boys, under the direction of George C. Ledover, and is reported to be one of the best juvenile bands of the state.

The Roseburg lodge is to entertain the visiting party with a dinner at Carl's Tavern, after which the boys will play a street concert at the Elks lodge temple prior to the formal concert at Library park.

The youthful musicians are on a good will tour, sponsored by the Portland lodge.

MARKETS HOPS

PORTLAND, July 6.—(AP)—Damage of the Pacific coast hop crop through downy mildew, aphid and cutworms, skyrocketed market prices today to 32 cents a pound, the highest offer in the northwest in several years.

The top price was paid for a carload of 1935 crop at Yakima, but Oregon growers held on to their crop, refusing offers and quotations of 35 cents were in sight, observers said.

Reports said two cars of the 1934 Yakima crop were sold at 16 cents and dealers were bidding 25 cents and more on good Oregon hops for September harvest.

Contracts for five years at prices ranging from 25 cents the first year down to 18 cents the last year were sought by Yakima firms and in California growers were offered up to 26 cents for the new crop.
