WOMAN ADMITS ROB-SLUG LURING

MEIFORD, Ore., July 7.—(AP)—Ruth Talbot, 23, accused with John Angland of Klamath Falls of assault and robbery with a deadly weapon, has admitted her part in the robbery of John L. Little, Williams creek miner last week, according to the state police and district attorney.

Angland, taxicab driver, yesterday entered a plea of guilty. Talbot woman is reluctant to plead, and has been granted "a couple of days to make up her mind."

The authorities say the statements of the pair reveal a plot to blirk and rob, with the woman acting as a lure, and Angland "doing the rough stuff." They had a "sucker list" of southern Oregon men allegedly susceptible to wine and women, including one Klamath county woman with \$1400 in bonus bonds. The names of a number of Jackson county and Klamath county veterans were on the list. There were other "prospects" listed also.

In the Little assault and robbery, the Williams creek miner met the Talbot woman at Klamath Falls, police said, and a meeting was arranged for a resort near Gold Hill. Little said the district attorney he contemplated marriage.

Angland drove the woman to the meeting place, police asserted, and the three started for Portland. Angland hit Little in the head with a piece of iron and a struggle ensued. Little sustained a fractured arm and head bruises.

In her statement, the district attorney said the Talbot woman admitted she had procured the purse containing \$180 before the fight started, but Angland did not know it.

After the crime, the couple returned to Klamath Falls where they were arrested by the state police Sunday night.

CHRISTIANITY IN INDIA SPREADING

PORTLAND, Ore., July 7.—(AP)—The religious revolt of 60,000,000 Hindus in India, "untouchables" contends an increasing rapid growth of Christianity in the British province of Southern Asia, in the opinion of the Right Reverend Brenton R. Badley, one of the three Methodist bishops of India.

He told interviewers here the prospect of 60,000,000 persons changing religions even has politicians worried.

The bishop, who visited Portland enroute on a trip around the world, said Christianity has grown three times as rapidly as the total population of India, more than three and a half times the Mohammedan faith.

Bishop Badley commented that "business conditions in India are stable" and that "the majority of the population stands for the continuance of British rule."

SALEM LEGION HAS STATE CANDIDATE

SALEM, July 7.—(AP)—The local American Legion post offered the name of O. E. Palmateer of Salem as candidate for state vice commander, and his name will be presented at the annual convention at Roseburg August 13 to 15.

George Averett was elected commander of the Capitol post at the election held last night.

KLAMATH FALLS, July 7.—(AP)—Fire fighters from the Klamath Forest Protective association were battling flames in the Poe valley district this morning. There was a possibility ranches and stock might be damaged.

Communication lines into the valley were down.
So far the fire has been confined to brush.

ASHLAND, Ore., July 7.—(AP)—William C. Patton, 69, a carpenter, was in a hospital here today near death from a bullet wound. Police said he was found in a garage with a note in his pocket indicating he had shot himself because of ill health.

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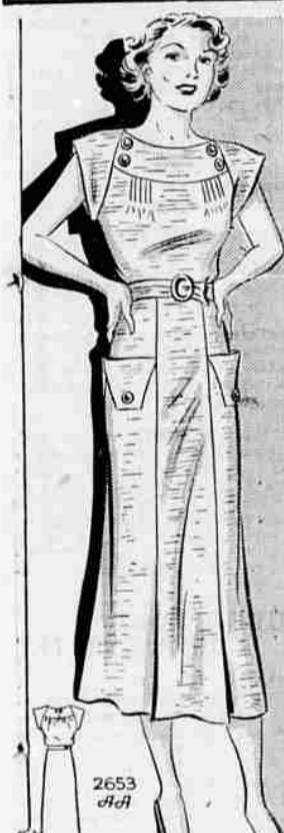
