

WORK SHEETS FILED BY 3RD OF FARMERS

CORVALLIS, July 8.—(AP)—The enrollment of Oregon farmers for benefits under the new federal agricultural conservation act exceeded estimates by nearly 2,000, final figures showing today that 20,023 producers filed work sheets with county agents.

The work sheets apply to more than 2,000,000 acres of soil depleting base, or the average amount of land used for soil depleting crops. At Oregon State college, extension officials believe a third of Oregon's farmers operating more than half of the crop land filled out work sheets and that 80 per cent of them will qualify for soil conserving or soil building payments, which may amount to \$3,000,000.

In some counties up to 70 per cent of the crop land is embraced in work sheets submitted. A rough estimate by extension officials places the possible total of class 1 diversion payments at \$2,000,000, which, with the smaller soil building payments, would raise the sum distributed to Oregon farmers to about \$3,000,000.

Average offered for the program in other counties included: Douglas, \$600.

central Saskatchewan area. Alameda, 120 miles southeast of Helena, reported almost 100 inches of rain.

Roofs were torn off buildings and planks carried a quarter of a mile in some localities. Lightning from rainless clouds sent three additional fires roaring through timbered Wyoming and Montana forests as more than one thousand fighters strove almost hopelessly to stop flames in three other areas since Sunday.

A resettlement official asserted that resourceless families in the Dakotas will starve unless given assistance.

A state-wide conference met at Havre to discuss means of coping with "worst drought in Montana history."

A heavy hail storm damaged crops in the vicinity of Pueblo, Colo.

Aid Program Launched

Persevering western planters received some good news. President Roosevelt swung the government into action behind a program designed to carry 170,000 farm families and their harassed livestock through the crisis.

He announced at Washington late yesterday they would receive aid through WPA work and substance loans and grants while small cattle breeders would receive federal loans to save their foundation herds.

The president estimated 204,000 farm families—the bulk of them in the Dakotas, Minnesota, Wyoming and Montana—were in need of some form of immediate cash relief. He said 50,000 were being employed on WPA well digging, dam building and farm-to-market road construction projects at an average weekly wage of \$15.

Mr. Roosevelt said substance loans would be advanced to 50,000 families through the resettlement administration in addition to 70,000 already receiving such aid.

Means of assisting 34,000 others must be worked out.

He also announced plans to adjust "dust bowl" farmers to new enterprises.

Next month, the president said, he would visit the "dust bowl," the Dakotas and possibly Minnesota to gauge the progress of the program.

Cattle Being Moved

The president said cattle were being moved out of the drought regions as a private enterprise as far as the large producers were concerned.

Small cattle raisers were being assisted, he said, through loans which will permit them to ship their animals out as feeders and still retain title to them.

The president said this was preferable to the government buying up the cattle to process for food.

He said this year's wheat acreage this year was nearly ten per cent higher than the 1925-26 average. This, he emphasized, exploded a lot of reports written, he said, for political effect. He said the yield, of course, would be below average but because of the drought and not because of crop curtailment.

What the administration was trying to do, he emphasized, was to change the economy of the drought area.

He said with a proper use of the drought area land it would support not quite as many but nearly as many as are now there. Average, for instance, could be used more and more for battle, vegetables and small crops, with certain areas being put to forests, he said.

CLOUDBURSTS NEAR YAKIMA INFLECT HEAVY DAMAGE

YAKIMA, July 8.—(AP)—Several thousand dollars damage to crops and irrigation ditches was caused last night by a cloudburst over the sage brush hills, five miles north of here. Three slides blocked the state highway for several hours, trapping automobiles. Electric power in rural districts was interrupted and street gutters in Yakima were filled.

FEDERAL AGENCIES ACT TO AID DROUGHT VICTIMS

WASHINGTON, July 8.—(AP)—Government agencies moved on a united front today to give assistance to thousands of drought-stricken farmers in the northwest and south.

The resettlement administration, which already has a complete organization in the field, has made

allotments to six western states totaling \$393,000 to cover a short period as a major step in a program designed to care for 154,000 families. At the same time, WPA made plans to give work to an additional 50,000 farmers.

The 154,000 families to be taken care of by the resettlement administration are located in North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Kansas, Nebraska, Montana, Wyoming, Oklahoma, Texas, Missouri, Kentucky, North Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, Alabama, Georgia and South Carolina.

The total monthly cost to relieve suffering in the drought areas, over and above those families now receiving cash grants from the resettlement administration, will be \$1,500,000 officials estimated.

In addition, it was said, loans amounting to \$5,000,000 would be necessary for a feed program and \$9,000,000 for a crop program in addition to the normal crop loan program. The resettlement administration estimates \$4,500 a new cases must be taken care of in the drought-stricken areas.

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STATE RELIEF FUND ASSURED \$880,000

SALEM, July 8.—(AP)—The state liquor control commission will have \$880,000 for relief purposes from August 15 to the end of the current year, Arthur K. McMahon reported to Governor Martin in a conference held with the purpose of outlining the program for the remainder of the year.

The amount was estimated, McMahon said, on the average income of the commission, but out of this about \$250,000 certificates of indebtedness must be paid, leaving for direct relief \$630,000. The certificates were issued for relief during June and July.

The first six months of the year the commission turned over \$1,052,960 for relief, the report stated. With the balance anticipated the year's total will be \$1,800,000, slightly in excess of Governor Martin's allotment set aside for that purpose.

McMahon said the liquor commission had arrived at the estimates with a view of giving the largest amount possible for relief, but still remain on a cash basis to take advantage of the cash discounts, the saving totaling about \$60,000 annually.
