

BORAH FILES FOR 6TH SENATE TERM

BOISE, Idaho, July 8.—(AP)—Senator William E. Borah (R., Idaho) became a candidate today for reelection, to a sixth term.

Nominating petitions for the August 11 primary were filed with the secretary of state by the 71-year-old statesman's attorney.

In a statement issued last Monday, Borah said he would not bolt the republican ticket, and pledged his allegiance to the platform he helped frame at Cleveland.

"The filing speaks for itself," he said.

"I have left the entire matter up to my attorney." The attorney is Jesse Hawley, who filed the petitions, representing names from 15 Idaho counties.

Byron Deffenbach, a former state treasurer who has the support of Idaho Townsend forces, will oppose Borah for the republican nomination.

Borah's decision today—following the announcement of party support issued Monday—came as no surprise to friends.

"They predicted, however, that the 'hon of Idaho' faces one of the most bitter contests of his 30 years in the United States senate.
