The suffrage movement, to which such leaders as Carrie Chapman Catt devoted their lives, has progressed to the point where scores of women are recognized as important figures in national politics, among them such notables as Mrs. Alice Roosevelt Longworth, one of Ohio's delegates, and Mrs. Alvin T. Herr of Kentucky, national committeewoman.
