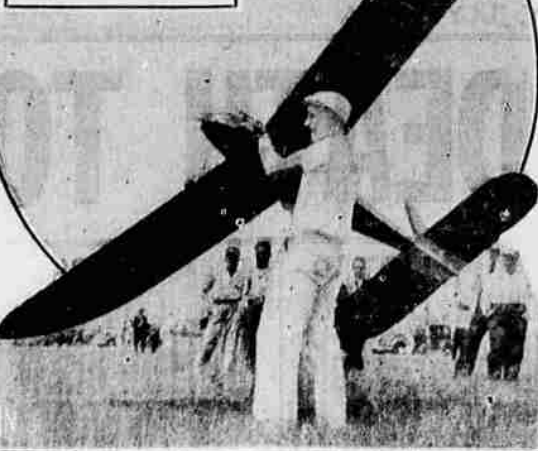

MYRTLE CREEK, July 10.—The Pine Mountain Lumber Co., owned and operated by L. A. Daly and sons, is just about ready to begin sawing. The spur to connect with the slope and the dock are about completed, and the mill pond is being filled with logs by the contractors, Russ Briggs and Howard Brownson.

At least five new families are here to take their part in all community interests and to add to the general business of the town. The mill means a payroll for several men.

4-H OUTING ENDED BY HEAVY RAINS

Boys attending the 4-H camp at Wolf Creek returned home yesterday, abandoning camp because of inclement weather. Heavy rains drenching the camp made it inadvisable to continue the outing. E. A. Britton, county club leader, said, and he arranged transportation home for the boys late yesterday.

GLENDALE SCHOOL GROUNDS IMPROVED

GLENDALE, July 10.—The Glendale school district is improving the school grounds, work having started this week of laying cement walks from the intersection of Willis avenue to a point parallel on Molly street and so curved as to meet the main entrance. Walks will also be laid from the main walk to each side entrance.

About six men will be employed on the job, supervised by J. Emer Nelson. It is planned later to landscape that portion of the grounds between the walks and the building with lawn and shrubbery.

GREETING SERVICE PLANNED BY OREGON

SALEM, July 9.—(AP)—Greeting service, not "pest stations," will be Oregon's welcoming gesture to incoming motorists from the south.

R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced today the state would institute within the next few days official tourist greeting and information service at each of the principal highway entrances along the California-Oregon state line.

The service, Baldock said, will be in contrast to the pest inspection order which motorists undergo upon entering California. It will be carried out in cooperation with the state police department, which will designate its officers to the duty of meeting and greeting visitors at the line.

At Governor Martin's suggestion the highway department is also studying a plan under which a limited number of college students would be employed during the summer months to operate tourist information stations at the chief highway entrances into the state. Before each season these information agents would be given a special course of instruction as a part of the highway department's tourist information service authorized by the last legislature.

OREGON EVENTS

CRATER LAKE, July 10.—(AP)—The unofficial greeter for Crater lake this year is Beige, a bear whose friendliness won him his title and his color his name. Like-wise, his light color is a puzzle thus far to biologists.

Portland officials said he poses readily for pictures, consumes all food thrown to him and apparently has made the rest of his tribe understand his position, because other bears disappear when Beige hoves in view.

ASTORIA, July 10.—Salmon packers said they would send a strong protest to the U. S. engineers against immediate closing of the gap in Bonneville dam between the main spillway cofferdam and the Washington shore, claiming it would mean virtual extinction of large runs of salmon expected to occur in the next 90 days.

ONTARIO, Ore., July 9.—(AP)—Officials here said today that 18 ex-service men have filed applications for homesteads on the Owyhee reclamation project under preference rights granted to them. Most of them live in this area.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 9.—(AP)—A cat named Irma Westover, Portland aviator, today as she continued to recuperate from injuries incurred in a plane crash on Camas mountain in Washington June 27. She received a broken back and probably will be in the east several months.

SALEM, July 9.—(AP)—Contrary to the accepted belief, the male of the "black widow" spider species may have the same "hour glass" markings of the female. W. C. Miller of Salem said he learned recently, Miller said, a friend brought him a spider with the identical markings of a female spider which he had kept in a bottle. He put it in the same container, but the visitor soon died.

The next morning, however, Miller discovered his female spider had nested during the night and now he has about a dozen baby spiders in the bottle.

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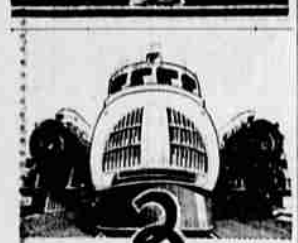
