EDITOR RICE WILL
AGAIN BROADCAST

Chas. W. Rice, editor of the Myrtle Creek Mail, will resume his weekly broadcasts from KRNR on Tuesday of next week at 1 p. m. Mr. Rice has done much to extend the fame of Myrtle Creek and the products of its adjacent farming communities, having published the Mail for over thirty years, copies of which have been sent to nearly every state in the Union. In addition, Mr. Rice's weekly talks urging promotion of a canning industry in Douglas county, and consumption of the wrinkled prune as a means to offset the wrinkles of worry from the countenances of many Douglas county farmers, were for several months a popular KRNR feature.

"I feel that advertising pays handsome dividends, and have renewed our contract with KRNR because I believe that our paper and our community will benefit by county-wide publicity," the editor said today. "Whereas, I firmly believe that newspapers are the country's primary advertising medium. I am of the opinion that radio is a secondary medium which is fast becoming indispensable to aggressive business," he added.

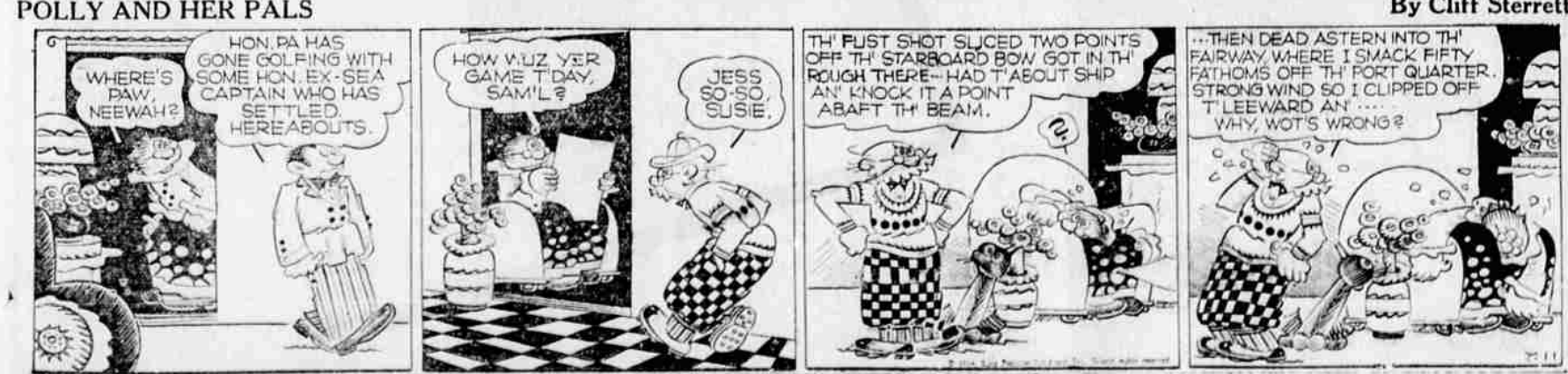

BOSTON, July 11.—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "The wool market continues to mark time, for the most part, although a few houses report more inquiry, especially in the woolen end of the market."

"The bulk of the business which has been done has been in the fine and fine medium class, 11 and 14 wools of ordinary to good French combing type at prices about on the level of a week ago."

"In the west, operations have slowed materially. Dealers bids are in a lower basis but appear to be securing little wool, as few growers are willing to sell for current bids."

"Foreign markets are a bit stronger again on rather better business, in line with the London sales."

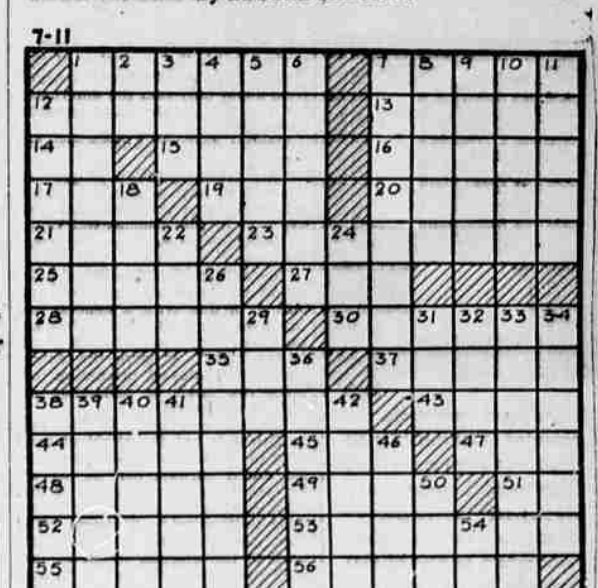
"Mohair has been a bit slow but very steady."
