EX-NAVY OFFICER ARRESTED AS SPY

(Continued from page 1) service and knew what it was all about," he replied.

The warrant against Farnsworth charged that he had delivered to an officer of the Japanese navy a book entitled "The Service of Information and Security," described as a confidential publication of the United States navy.

He did this with reason to believe that the book was to be used to the injury of this country, the charge said.

Thompson Case Recalled The seizure followed by only ten days the unprecedented case of another former navy man, who was sentenced to serve 15 years on July 3 after conviction in Los Angeles of selling confidential fleet data to a Japanese secret agent.

This man, Harry J. Thomas, Thompson, admitted boarding battleships and supplying "clippings" for a Japanese who paid him "about \$700 in salaries." The specific charge against him was conspiracy to commit espionage.

Indicted with him was a man named as Toshio Miyazaki, lieutenant commander of the imperial Japanese navy. Though Japanese authorities said a man of that name was a member of the Japanese naval college, they pointed out that the name was a common one in their country.

Thompson was known to have lived for some time in Baltimore, which is near Washington, but whether government prosecutors would seek to establish any link between his case and that of Farnsworth was not disclosed.

20 Years Possible

Farnsworth was charged in the warrant with violating a section of the United States code which provides a penalty of "not more than 20 years imprisonment" for "unlawfully disclosing information affecting the national defense."

In time of war the offense is punishable by death.

G. C. LORENZ HEADS BANK AT KLAMATH

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 13.—(AP)—G. C. Lorenz, Klamath Falls business man, was today elected president of the First National bank. The bank, with a total resources of over three and one-half million dollars, has recently been acquired by the Glanville interests.

The board of directors has been increased to include D. O. Hood, Portland investment dealer, who has been in the city for several days assisting the shift of control.

RAINIER, Ore., July 14.—(AP)—Kenneth (Hack) Hammer, former star Oregon State gridster, who has coached athletics at the Rainier union high school for the past year, today accepted the position of assistant football and basketball coach at Klamath Falls, Ore.

Last week Hammer was elected coach at Newburg, Ore., but turned that berth down in favor of working under Lex Avritt, head football coach at Klamath Falls.

PLEDGES NEEDED FROM AIDED AGED

An effort to clean up all old age assistance property pledges by Saturday, July 19, is being made by the county relief committee, Franklin Hoyt, relief manager, announced today.

All persons receiving old age assistance and who are the owners of real property, are required to pledge such property, Mr. Hoyt explains, for the purpose of reimbursing the state and county for funds expended for the care of the pensioner.

The pledge, Mr. Hoyt states, consists of a blank mortgage, following an existing mortgage. The committee requires no deeds and charges no interest.

It is necessary to furnish the executive secretary with a copy of the deed to the property and a detailed description of the property.

Since signatures are required much time and effort can be saved if the recipients of old age assistance will call at the relief office, if unable to call, descriptions of property should be mailed to the relief committee and copies of pledges will be forwarded for signatures, Mr. Hoyt states.
