EUGENE JUNIORS BURY TOLEDO, 17-0

Igoe and Mauney, Hurlers for Victors, Have Foes Baffled Throughout.

Eugene won the first game of the three-game Junior League baseball series with Toledo by a score of 17 to 0 Sunday, and will play at Toledo today in the second game for the right to meet the Douglas County Juniors in the inter-district eliminations.

Igoe and Mauney, ace hurlers for the Lane county team, held Toledo helpless, allowing only one hit.

Mauney, who is recovering from a recent illness, pitched the last three scoreless and hitless innings, and gathered a single, double and triple during his trips to the plate. Igoe allowed only one hit in six innings and fanned 11 batters. Mauney struck out six.

The Douglas county Hukies are scheduled to meet the winner of the Eugene-Toledo series, the first game being planned for Roseburg next Sunday afternoon.

Locals Have More Hurlers

The Douglas county team has a decided advantage over Eugene in pitching ability, as the Lane county team is limited to two effective hurlers, Igoe and Mauney, while the Hukies have Elliott, Andrews, Morris, Sporer and McKay, with Neal and McLain able to toss them over as well as any of the Eugene second-string hurlers.

Elliott recently outpitched Igoe and Andrews is believed capable of equalling anything that Eugene has to offer. Morris, with his fast slants, and Sporer, with a speed ball, can be thrown into the breach at any time.

Pitching ability, it is expected, will decide the series between the Hukies and Eugene, the 17 to 0 score indicating Eugene will be the contender. Both teams are good hitters, and are perhaps about equal in slugging strength. The Hukies, perhaps, have a slight edge in leadoff strength with Crouch, Morgan and Ball in the first three spots and McLain, Anfaut for cleanup hitters. Crouch has an uncanny ability to draw walks. Morgan is one of the surest hitters on the team. Ball is a consistent slugger, while McLain is usually sure of at least one long drive per game. Anfaut is not a hard hitter, but can usually be counted upon for a single in the pinches.

Eugene, on the other hand, has a group of hard hitters, who hit for extra bases when they do connect, but the Hukies perhaps have a slight advantage when it comes to driving in runs against tight pitching, such as will probably feature the coming series.

McLain is Mainstay

The Hukie pitching staff also has a decided advantage behind the bat. Curly McLain is unquestionably the outstanding junior league catcher in the state. With three seasons to his credit, he has experience which is invaluable to the team. The Hukie twirlers, therefore, can throw without worry regarding the handling of the ball at the plate.

Moore, the Eugene catcher, on the other hand, demonstrated in games played here a weakness in handling fast balls. With the Eugene pitchers forced to bear down as they will doubtless have to do, the margin the Douglas county team will have behind the bat may be a very important factor.

Another place in which the Hukies have the edge, is that the Eugene team must play four and perhaps six games in two weeks, giving their two major pitchers little rest, while the Hukies will play only two or three games, if that many are required to take the series.

Bolton, according to George F. Sullivan, U. S. district attorney, will be the government's principal witness. Another Charge Faced

Karpis, unless he decides to plead guilty, will be tried later also for the \$200,000 ransom kidnaping of Bremer, St. Paul bank president, who was held prisoner for 22 days in a "hideout" only a few blocks away from the place where Hamm was imprisoned, Sullivan said. Asked when Karpis would be tried on the Bremer count, District Attorney Sullivan merely said:

"Probably in the fall."

Hamm was kidnaped June 15, 1933, and held prisoner for four days while Bremer was abducted Jan. 17, 1934, and released Feb. 7. Karpis was seized May 1 in New Orleans and rushed here by airplane. When he was arraigned soon after being brought here his bail was set at \$500,000.

Karpis, Sullivan said, was the driver of the car in which Hamm was taken after he was seized a block from the Theodore Hamm brewing company, of which he is president.

Mercury Starts Up

The forecast was the outstanding development in today's drought and heat news as temperatures in most midwestern states began another upward swing early in the morning.

Yesterday 23 of 43 stations reporting to the Chicago weather bureau in the central states recorded readings of 100 or higher. Nearly a score reported all-time highs. In contrast none of 15 gulf state stations had readings higher than 98.

Early readings today included Adrian, Mich., 101; Detroit and Ann Arbor, Mich., each 96, and Ionia, Mich., 95. Yesterday an all-time maximum for the state was recorded at Saginaw, Mich., with 111.

Rains of Big Value

The rains in the northwest last night were of incalculable value. South Dakota had showers at Rapid City, Aberdeen, Watertown, Mitchell and Pierre. Aberdeen's maximum of 106 yesterday, dropped to 66 last night.

Grand Forks, Williston, Jamestown, Bismarck, Fullerton, Minot and Fargo in long suffering North Dakota were aided materially by the rains and lower temperatures. Fergus Falls, Minn., had a 29-degree drop to 77 after a 45-minute shower.

Relieving the long Montana drought was 1.23 inches of rain at Glendive, 57 at Poplar, and 36 at Kalispell.

"The rain will help dry land farmer crops and at least give the grain a good start. It also will help make feed crops, but it won't be of much aid to wheat and other grain crops, which were too far developed," said W. E. Maughan, weather chief at Helena.

Near Williston, in the northwest corner of North Dakota, a sudden cloudburst sent water racing into the Missouri valley to wash out 500 feet of track on the Great Northern main line.

Other sections of the nation also benefited from rain last night. Thunderstorms were general in most of the gulf and south Atlantic states, with rain in the Rocky mountain region, and heavy precipitation in places, the weather bureau said.

Manitoba in Canada's wheat growing district, received rain. However, at Regina, Sask., today it was reported by the department of agriculture that crops in general have suffered from the extensive heat and drought of the past two weeks despite light showers in scattered areas.

Opposes Old Parties

"I will never vote for Roosevelt and I will never vote for Landon," said Dr. Townsend. "I don't know who I'll vote for but I would rather vote for a socialist than either of them and Lord knows I'm not a socialist."

He added he was "opposed all the way through to the democratic and republican parties, as parties, because they have failed to carry out their promises to the people."

Dr. Townsend said he expected the convention to take some definite action on the question of its participation in the election campaign but what that decision would be he said was entirely up to the delegates.

Lenke is scheduled to address

the convention at the closing session Sunday. Townsend officials said any political action taken by the convention would be before that time.

Coughlin Declines Bid

The Rev. Charles E. Coughlin returned to Detroit today, declining an invitation to address the Townsend convention, and refusing a conference with Dr. F. E. Townsend, the movement's founder.

"I have no idea of a meeting here with Dr. Townsend and did not even know he was in Cleveland," the Detroit priest said shortly before he left after addressing last night Ohio leaders of his National Union for Social Justice.

"I'd like to meet him if the opportunity presents itself," Dr. Townsend said, adding that he could name "a dozen men in the United States who would make a better third party candidate" than William Lenke, head of the new Union party, who has received Father Coughlin's personal endorsement.

The Townsend movement's position on a possible endorsement of the North Dakotan is one of the principal items of convention business.

pression in some quarters that the huge surpluses of 1932 and 1933 would still be with us as a reserve against possible emergency had it not been for the adjustment programs."

Wallace said one of the reasons for "the severity of these recurrent droughts is that land has been put in uses for which it is not adapted."

To improve conditions, he suggested:

"A sound conservation policy," and "a sound system of commodity loans."

"The loans," he said, "should enable the farmers to get a fair price for their products in years of heavy production and at the same time relieve the shortage of food and feed against lean years."

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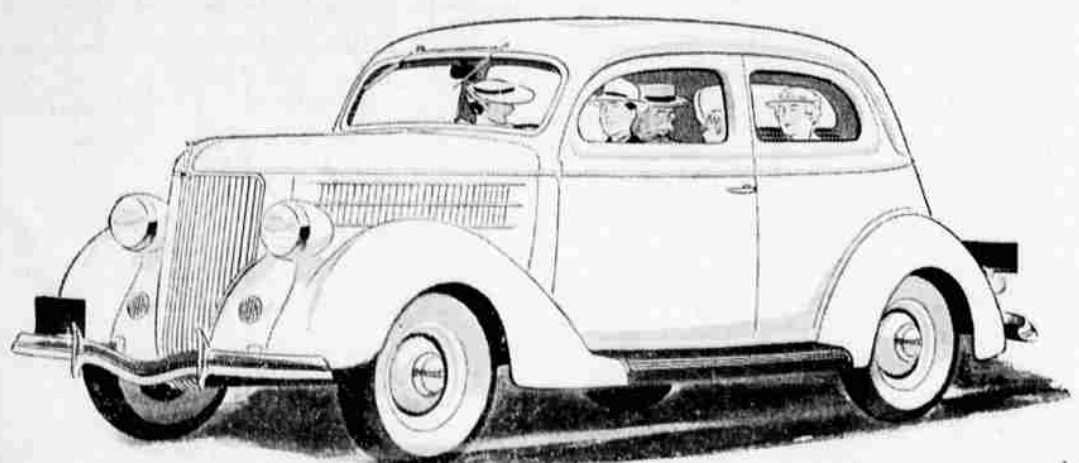
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
