FRUIT, VEGETABLES MOVING FASTER

PORTLAND, July 15.—(AP)—An upward swing in the movement of northwest fruits and vegetables appeared in the past week with 614 cars loaded in all districts.

Potato shipments totaled 129 cars, eight of which were from Oregon and the balance from Washington and Idaho, with 13 cars of onions moving out of the Walla Walla district. Twenty-nine cars of Oregon celery were forwarded to other markets.

The pea shipments from Washington reached 213 cars, and shipments of cabbage from the three northwest states totaled eight cars, mixed vegetables, 57 cars, cauliflower, five cars, and tomatoes, four cars. Cherry shipments dropped to 90 cars.

PORTLAND, July 15.—Father Michael J. Early, vice president of the University of Portland and acting head since the death of Father Joseph Boyl, last month, assumed the presidency of the school today under appointment from officials at South Bend, Ind.

The congregation of the Holy Cross maintains both the University of Portland and Notre Dame.
