MAN-CAUSED WOODS FIRES ON DECLINE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 15.—(AP)—The human element still figures in Oregon and Washington's forest fire losses but not quite so prominently as a year ago, the forest service said today.

Up to July 10, 208 fires were reported this year in the 29 national forests of the two states. Of the total, 136 were caused by lightning, 34 by smokers, 11 by campers and 13 by debris burners.

Last year, up to the same date, 265 fires were listed, of which lightning caused 44, smokers 78,

campers 34 and debris burners 78. Only 568 acres have been burned over this year, compared with 1043 acres up to July 10, 1935.
