ELY GOES OVER TO REPUBLICAN CAMP

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., July 16.—(AP) Former Gov. Joseph B. Ely of Massachusetts, broke ranks today with John D. Hamilton, chairman of the republican national committee, practically announced that he would campaign for the republican presidential nominee, Gov. Alf Landon of Kansas.

At the close of their conference, Ely, a democrat and one of five prominent party members, who signed a protest against the renomination of President Roosevelt, was asked whether he would stump for Landon.

"What else can it mean?" he countered, apparently referring to his conference with Hamilton.

BALL APPLIES FOR FULL CITIZENSHIP

SALEM, July 14.—(AP)—Declaring reports published in a Portland newspaper that he was an alien and that his first citizenship papers had expired were "political trickery," Hugh G. Ball, Hood River editor and recent appointee to the state relief committee, telegraphed Governor Martin he had applied for full citizenship today.

Ball's telegram stated the newspaper was misinformed. "First papers still have five years to run before cancellation. Have applied today for full citizenship and await routine hearing in circuit court."

throw brickbats in our convention" and Smith assailed the Roosevelt administration as "a subtle plot to communitize the nation."

When this great leader of ours stood before that inquiry in Washington, he showed himself a true American.

"My slogan is 'I want to be elected so I can go to jail with Dr. Townsend!'"

Roosevelt Flayed—Father Coughlin, in his address to the Townsend convention, said: "As far as the national union is concerned, no candidate which it endorses for congress can support the great betrayer and liar, Franklin Roosevelt."

"He who promised to drive the money changers from the temple has built up the greatest public debt in the nation's history," he said. "He that has changed the gold for the temple."

Adopted communistic measures. The national union will not endorse any candidate who advocates the reelection of the great traitor, Franklin Delano Roosevelt."

In his reference to Landon in the address, Fr. Coughlin said "today when Landon advocates the restoration of the gold standard, I am forced to repudiate his philosophy and platform as a return to the days of economic slavery."

Unholds Constitution—"We have no quarrel with the constitution. 'Not that we need to change our constitution. The day has arrived when we must expel those who have perverted our constitution."

"The national union is not established upon a radical exorcism of socialism, nor on the other hand is it wedded to those die-hard Tories who persist in telling us that we must support the Roosevelt or the Landon whetstone."

"Be Christian, be American, be constitutional. 'No candidate for congress can receive the endorsement of the national union unless his record shows that he has favored its principles."

"I'm ready to die in the struggle to liberate America from the money changers."

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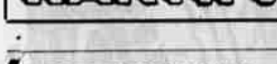

ADULT EDUCATION

TO BE CONTINUED

Approval has been given by the public works administration for the continuance of those adult education classes which have been approved by the superintendents and supervisors it was announced here today.

It is the desire of the WPA that only those adult classes be continued which are holding to a high standard as to attendance, quality of work, and benefits derived.

In the past the adult classes in Douglas county have been very good. Roseburg has classes in typing, shorthand, knitting, dressmaking, tailoring, piano, art, and lip-reading.

South Deer creek, Wille, Sutherlin and the CCC camp at Diamond lake, have classes in handcraft, sewing, home beautification, quilting, canning, crocheting, book reviews and current events.

If any person wishes to attend any one or all of these classes, which are free of charge, they may do so as the teachers are arranging their classes to take care of any new members.
