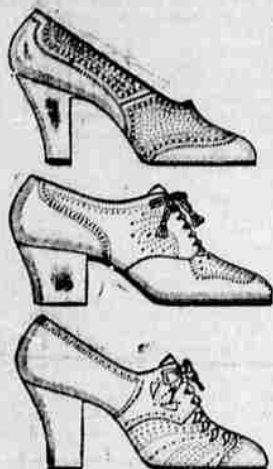


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BUNTS and BINGLES

Eugene that many. This lad Andrews should be good for one of these games if the lads show the support they showed in the game played July 4. They won't even have to be that good. We believe they now have a lot of confidence in Andrews and as a consequence will play much better ball.

Bobby Morris may be just what the doctor ordered as a relief pitcher. He has been ill but is now ready to take up where he left off. Bobby is a good curve ball pitcher and worked along with either Andrews or Sporer should be mighty effective.

It seems to us that so far as pitching strength goes you will have to give the advantage to Roseburg. The same thing goes for hitting strength. If a team has the best pitchers and the hardest hitters the answer is almost obvious.

The first base situation is a little different. It all depends upon whether or not Hamer will be on first for Eugene. This lad is a good first baseman and no mistake. He will not cover the bag any better than Vleck, however, although he may be a better hitter. It all depends upon whether or not Vleck has his eye on that day. It is going to be a battle between these two and a sweet one to watch.

FOUR ELIMINATED FROM JUNIOR RACE

The race for the junior league baseball championship of Oregon narrowed to nine teams today, with four already eliminated from the title race.

Still in the limelight are Woodburn, which defeated Hillsboro 15 to 2, and Eugene, which wallpined Toledo 16 to 9.

Woodburn, host team at the state finals August 1 and 2, must hurdle Astoria if it wins its way to the playoffs and Eugene still has Roseburg to contend with for similar honors.

Hood River and The Dalles will play for the mid-Columbia title, with the winner to meet Vale for the right to compete at Woodburn.

Two Portland teams which will meet for the city title and one of the four berths in the title games are Postoffice Pharmacy (Lincoln high) and El Rey (Jefferson high). Sugar Crest (Grant high) and Frost-Bear (Commerce high) have been eliminated.

The winner of the state title will meet the Washington state champion at Roseburg during the American Legion convention for sectional honors.

Missouri and lower Ohio valleys. New all-time highs were established at Peoria, Ill., where the mercury reached 114 degrees. At Keokuk, Iowa, with 112, Wichita, Kas., 110, Oklahoma City, 106 and Springfield, Mo., 106.

Haines found a trace to 34 of an inch fell in Green Bay, Wis., Indianapolis, Louisville, Springfield, Ill., St. Louis, Helena, Mont., the southern States and Rocky mountain regions.

The heat centered its fury on the plains states and the Mississippi and Ohio valleys. The forecast for tomorrow was continued heat, except for cooler weather in the Dakotas, northwestern Minnesota and northwestern Nebraska.

Slightly cooler weather was welcomed in Illinois and the upper Ohio valley.

Relief to Be Speeded
At Blumark, N. D., Rexford G. Tugwell, resettlement administrator, planned to cut all red tape to speed relief for the drought-stricken farmers.

A meeting was called for Monday to determine steps to be taken in the cattle industry if the drought continued.

A five-hour downpour totaling 1.83 inches damaged gravel streets in Austin, Tex.

Warm weather continued in Colorado and Wyoming, with cooler temperatures but no substantial relief in prospect for Montana. A cattle expert said the drought had caused a shortage of 300,000 cows in Wyoming and that the situation was "more serious than most people believe."

Montana rains came too late to save most grain crops, but benefited ranges, irrigated crops, corn, alfalfa and sugar beets.

The agricultural adjustment administration said 841 carloads of food and feed had been shipped to drought-stricken counties for distribution. So far the government has purchased no drought cattle.

Higher Prices Forecast
Higher prices for several farm products were forecast by the bureau of agricultural economics. Among them were butter, cheese, eggs and the better grade of cattle. Lower prices were predicted for potatoes, hogs, lower grades of cattle, feeder lambs, poultry and wool.

Federal agencies charted plans to allay the poverty of families ruined by crop destruction in five western and northwestern states but new apprehension was expressed by farmers of the corn belt.

Dr. Andrew Boss, University of

MINNESOTA AGRONOMIST, DECLARED MOST OF THE MINNESOTA CORN CROP WOULD BE RUINED UNLESS RAINS FELL WITHIN A WEEK. THE OUTLOOK WAS FOR CONTINUED HEAT WITH ONLY SCATTERED SHOWERS.

In Nebraska there was still the possibility of a fair corn crop if timely rains were forthcoming. Pastures were reported as "practically gone."

No relief was sighted for today in Iowa by C. D. Hood, federal meteorologist, as he estimated corn damage in that state already had reached 10 per cent.

Damage to the central Illinois corn crop was estimated up to 50 per cent.

racing outdoors in flight. The tremors were felt for several seconds at about 11:10 p. m.

Women Cover in Park
The novelty of the tremors stirred excitement, but memory of the Helena, Mont., devastation nine months ago aroused fears.

A mother snatched her baby and raced barefooted to the street. The Fort George Wright telephone operator said he was rolled from his bed.

Windows and dishes rattled; chandeliers and lamps swayed; pictures swung on the walls. Hundreds of calls swamped newspaper offices.

Depot Wrecked
Milton-Freewater, Ore., in the Walla Walla valley, reported the heaviest loss of any shaken town.

The corner of the Union Pacific depot collapsed, showering masonry and bricks to the sidewalk. Officials of the Utah Canning company there estimated damage of \$10,000 to \$15,000 in their warehouse. Stacks of cans—empty and full—were upset and damaged badly.

At Walla Walla, Wash., Fire Chief William Davis warned against standing today until flames were thoroughly inspected. A late theatre crowd rushed to the streets with the first shock.

Warden J. M. McCawley, whose home is outside of the state prison wall at Walla Walla, reported several of the bricks of his chimney crashed through the ceiling, barely missing a sleeping child. The bricks in the prison wall stood firm.

Reports indicated the tremors were felt plainly through the region east of the Cascade mountains in Washington, in north Idaho and through at least the northern tier of Oregon counties.

Residents of Wenatchee reported two minor shocks, about 15 minutes apart.

HEPPNER, July 16.—(AP)—A slight earthquake shock was felt here about 11 o'clock last night but there was no damage. The disturbance was more pronounced at Arlington. People here fled into the streets.

BAKER, July 16.—(AP)—An earth shock of about one second duration was felt here Wednesday night. The "quake" is reported to have moved furniture in several residences.

ARTESIAN WELL RESTORED TO LIFE BY EARTHQUAKE

WALLA WALLA, July 16.—(AP)—An artesian well on the A. M. Fix ranch that dried up three weeks ago, today was gushing with greater vigor than ever before, following last night's earthquake shocks in this valley. Walter Maxson, farming southeast of here, told of a new artesian supply having started flowing from what formerly was a common well.

A concrete dwelling owned by J. M. Marlett near Umapine, Ore., was almost demolished by the series of shocks in that district. A smokestack at McLoughlin union high school, Milton, Ore., was cracked almost in half, most of the cornice and roof of the \$200,000 plant was damaged and many structural buildings in Milton showed cracks. Several flues and fireplaces in buildings there were reported seriously damaged.

Doctors and patients in the veterans' hospital here who had been transferred from the Helena, Mont., hospital after quakes became prevalent there last fall were quoted as saying the initial shock at 11:10 last night was as severe

BEAVERS WIN TWO FROM LOS ANGELES

The Los Angeles invasion of first division territory was temporarily halted today, thanks to Portland's heavy-hitting lineup and the Angels' own misdeeds.

The Beavers came from behind yesterday in both games of a double-header to scuttle the San Francisco Missions 5-4 in 10 innings, and 9-7 in the short second.

At Sacramento, the Angels succumbed to the Senators, 6-5, by reason of damaging errors.

Seattle and Oakland remained in first and second positions as the tribe defeated San Diego, 2-1, and the A's trounced the San Francisco Seals 6-3.

Portland was just too hot to handle against the Reds, tying the score in the ninth inning of the first game on Clabaugh's single, and winning in the tenth on Lee's outfield fly with the bases loaded.

In the seven inning contest, Nitcholas needed all set for victory as he went into the last inning, but the Beaver "murderers" row" quickly put together five hits, including nicely spaced triples, to score five runs and clinch the contest.

munition in four chambers but not in the top chamber which gave immediate access to the barrel.

Inspector Sands produced two rounds of ammunition taken from the man, along with a black-bordered envelope containing a postcard portrait of the king and a newspaper on which was pencilled: "May I love you?"

After the accused had been remanded to jail, a solicitor representing him, stated:

"No intent to kill"
"In view of reports which appeared in tonight's evening papers, the prisoner wishes to say there was no attempt at assassination nor was there any intention of assassination."

Until recently, the defendant was quoted as saying, he had been editor of a paper called the "Human Gazette."

Witnesses asserted the suspect aimed the gun at the king but that "a woman in grey" knocked the gun from his hand.

The king retained his calm dignity throughout, although several witnesses said they believed he saw the armed man in the crowd before the quick commotion broke out.

Women screamed and fainted. Bobbies swarmed in on the suspect and rushed him away before violence developed.

The whole English capital was thrown into consternation by the incident.

INJURED BY BLAST, FIRE BRINGS HELP

QUINCY, Calif., July 15.—(AP)—Hill hand blown off in a premature blast, Edwin Plann, prospector, remained in critical condition in a hospital here today.

Weakened by loss of blood, Plann set fire to trees in front of his cabin to attract attention. A forest crew brought the man to the hospital and extinguished the blaze.
