U. S. POLITICAL OBSERVATIONS

Inner-circle conferences since the national conventions appear to have increased still further the likelihood of a stormy, militant presidential campaign.

Roosevelt's 116 statements are mapping a speaking trip for him which cover a large section of the country. Landon's managers expect him to be exceedingly active after his formal notification in late July. On each side a closely-organized battalion of lesser speakers is preparing to spring into action.

The business of lining up various groups for intensive effort is going forward on a vast scale, among the farmers, the laborers, the women, the young people and the various classifications of business men, special campaign structures are to be erected to compete for group favor.

Above all, it appears that money will be more plentiful than in many past campaigns. Varied money-raising methods, some of a distinctly original character, are in process of formulation. Both sides are talking in terms of millions as they compute their campaign prospects.

Huge Spending Seen
A grand total of ten millions for the headquarters of the two major parties, in fact, would fall far short of meeting the combined expectations which have been spoken of in private party councils.

Even that would not include the large sums collected and spent by the numerous class and professional groups, nor the campaign chests of the multitude of local political committees.

Altogether, the prospective spending runs into figures which it is difficult for the lay mind to grasp; yet the total does not necessarily mean that this is to be a notably corrupt campaign.

Those inexperienced in politics have little conception what it costs to maintain and staff elaborate headquarters, to send out speakers and rent auditoriums, to print literature and distribute it, to purchase advertising and to pay for the odds and ends which go with aggressive political action on a national scale.

Whenever there is corrupt spending—and the court records show that it sometimes does occur—the amounts involved usually have represented only a lesser part of the total bill. This year it is clearly apparent that both sides are preparing to spend very heavily for items commonly classed as legitimate.

Lull Before Storm
The full scope of these preparations has had little reflection in the comparative quiet of the period immediately following the conventions.

The reason is that each major party is following a studied plan of campaign, and on both sides the plan appears to be the same. It contemplates active contact with the enemy beginning around August 1 and increasing in tensely day by day right up to the election.

CALIFORNIA FIGHTS PLAGUE OF HOPPERS

LOS ANGELES, July 16.—(AP)—On two widely-separated fronts in southern California a grasshopper plague was fought today with pesticides and poisoned grain.

When the second hatch of grasshoppers in Imperial valley proved exceedingly heavy, state game officials released 250 half-grown pheasants near Westmoreland to help save crops and gardens from destruction.

Making their first appearance of the season in Los Angeles county, grasshoppers destroyed nearly 50 acres of beans near Saugus. Bran covered with poison was sprinkled in the area, bringing the pests under control.

OAXACA, Mexico, July 16.—A plague of locusts ravaged farm crops near this city today. The insects swarmed into the area yesterday in black clouds that hid the sun. Farmers watched anxiously with increasing panic as their crops were being devoured. No estimate of probable damage was available.

PATROL CALLED OUT IN FISHING DISPUTE

NORTH BEND, July 17.—(AP)—A coast guard patrol boat moved to the city docks here today as a cautionary move against possible disturbances in connection with a dispute between purse seine fishermen's unions.

The fishermen gathered in a public meeting last night but failed to reach an agreement. Intimidations were heard that 3,000 union members of the deep sea and purse seine fishermen's union might take a "holiday" to express interest in settlement of the controversy.

The disagreement centers upon the refusal of fishermen belonging to the Monterey Fishermen's Protective association to associate with the deep sea group, the Monterey organization asserting the deep sea union was opposed to its interests.

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GLAVIS TAKES JOB AT LOWER SALARY

WASHINGTON, July 17.—(AP)—Secretary Ickes yesterday announced the resignation of Louis H. Glavis as chief investigator of the interior department.

Bradley D. Smith, assistant director, was named acting director to succeed him.

The announcement said Glavis resigned to be chief investigator for the senate campaign funds investigating committee.

In a letter to Ickes dated today, Glavis said they had agreed that the committee's work "was of such vital importance that we should not refuse the request which had been made for services."

Glavis thus left a position paying \$8,000 a year for one limited by law to \$2,000.

Glavis was the center of an interior department dispute years ago, in the Taft administration. He was recalled to government service by Ickes.

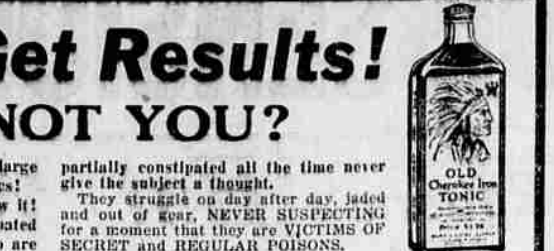
