

BOB MORRIS LOST TO LEGION JUNIORS

Pitcher Has Relapse After Apparently Recovering From Influenza.

The Douglas county Legion Juniors suffered a hard blow today when it was announced that Bob Morris, curve ball pitcher, had suffered a relapse, following an attack of influenza, and probably will be out of the game for the balance of the season.

Morris was counted upon as one of the principals of the team's pitching staff, and his loss will be keenly felt, particularly in the forthcoming series with Eugene for the inter-district championship.

He had been ill but had apparently recovered and had recently been practicing with the team. He has, however, suffered a relapse which his physician states will prevent further playing for several weeks.

Morris was particularly valuable to follow either Andrews or Elliott in the box. He throws a wide looping curve, which works very effectively, following the fast-breaking curves tossed by the other leading pitchers.

Fortunately the Douglas county team has unusually good pitching material this year and will be able to effectively meet the situation caused by the loss of Morris. Andrews and Elliott are able to go a full game without relief, under ordinary circumstances, while Sporer, with a whizzing speed ball, and McKay with a good collection of curves are available for relief work.

Team in Good Shape
Coach Cummings is well pleased with the outlook for the series with Eugene. The team has been working out regularly each night, and is showing up exceptionally well in practice.

The exchange of positions by Crouch and Anlauf at second and shortstop has effectively speeded up infield play.

Crouch is whipping a perfect throw from short to first, while Anlauf, who has been in the shortstop position, is covering second like he had played there all his life.

Concentration on hitting has resulted in much improvement in batting.

The batting practice, Coach Cummings says, has been no slay affair. The pitchers have been sent into the box to put everything they had on the ball, and the players have been hitting against as tough a collection of mean balls as will be found in any junior brand of ball.

Cummings is confident that Igoe and Mauney, the Eugene twirlers, will find the Hankies the hardest hitting team they will have faced so far this season.

JOE LOUIS "DOPE" REPORT EXPLAINED

DETROIT, July 16.—(AP)—John Roxborough, one of Joe Louis' managers, said today the fighter had signed an affidavit in which he charged that reports that he was "doped" during his fight with Max Schmeling, grew out of an extortion attempt.

Roxborough said the affidavit

charged Louis had received threats from a Chicago negro to ruin his married life.

Roxborough said the man "went to Julian Black, co-manager of Louis, in Chicago, and threatened an alienation of affection suit against Louis. Black bought him off for \$300."

The affidavit also contained a blanket denial by Louis that he was in any manner affected by narcotics when he entered the ring against Schmeling.

STAYTON DOCTOR DIES IN OFFICE

STAYTON, July 17.—(AP)—Dr. C. M. Brewer, for 36 years a physician here, dropped dead in his office late yesterday. The physician had just returned from a few days vacation when afflicted. The cause was given as a heart attack. Dr. Brewer is survived by his widow.
