Earl Johnson, head of the Texas delegation, said that his state's delegation had adopted a resolution protesting any convention speeches attacking the president of the United States.

Another resolution, he said, asked that Gerald L. K. Smith be restrained from speaking in Texas.

The attorneys said the police had not been asked to aid in the investigation.

Bowles, engaged in chores at the farm he holds under lease, was returning from the barn to the house. Attorney Canaday said today in describing the incident of the shooting, "Bowles heard a rifle shot. The bullet struck him in the thigh and he fell to the ground. The shot apparently came from a thicket on his left."

"His partner, R. E. Benner, was in the house and had the radio turned on, so did not hear Bowles' calls for assistance until he went out to feed the hogs, a short time after the shooting occurred. He then heard Bowles calling for help and assisted him to the house."

"The shooting was reported to be an accident, in order to give time for investigation," Attorney Canaday said.

Bowles was released from the hospital today, the attorney continued. "He is still unable to walk. The bullet shattered his leg and could not be removed."

Threats Alleged "Many threats have been made against Bowles' life," Canaday said, "and people have been seen lurking in the brush. They have been seen to run away when anyone approached them."

Bowles had a watchdog, which was kept chained in the yard. During his absence from home, the dog disappeared, and it was found that the collar had been unfastened. The dog has not returned.

"We are also investigating a mysterious telephone call received at the hospital when Bowles was admitted."

"A very short time after the injured man was taken to the institution, some man called and wanted to know who the person was who had been shot. He was refused any information."

"We propose to make a thorough investigation into all angles of this case to determine the source of the threats and attacks made upon this man, if possible," the attorney said.

U. S. Ready to Buy The AAA at Washington announced today it was ready to begin emergency purchases of cattle at Chicago, St. Paul and Sioux City next Monday if drought conditions forced farmers to sell livestock in unusually large numbers.

The resettlement administration announced land use adjustment program in the drought area. It included the purchase of nearly a million acres of North Dakota land at a cost of more than \$2,500,000. The program was to include 41 projects in Montana, Nebraska, the Dakotas and Wyoming and to cover four million acres at a total cost estimated at \$13,749,000.

The Mississippi river was at its lowest stage of the year and at Alton, Ill., its temperature was 92 degrees, an all-time high record. During the heat wave and drought of 1934 the highest temperature recorded for its waters was 89 degrees.
