

EX-NAVY OFFICER DENIES ESPIONAGE

Farnsworth Explains His Actions While Seeking Jap Aviation Job.

WASHINGTON, July 16.—(AP)—John S. Farnsworth, former naval officer accused of betraying navy secrets, told a reporter today that he had shown photographs of naval aviation equipment to a Japanese agent while seeking a \$50,000 job in the Japanese air force.

"The photographs, he said in an interview at the District of Columbia jail, were only of the type which could be obtained by anyone from the naval public relations office, with the exception of some personal photographs made during his naval service.

He said the latter were turned over to an agent of the Japanese government several weeks ago, as evidence of his experience, and that he was advised they would be sent to Tokyo along with his application for employment.

"The Japs are pretty poor pilots and need some help," Farnsworth said.

worth said. "The French and English have already given them up."

"Only last week I called up to get some answer to my application, but was told there was none. I suppose they are scared since this Thompson case out in California."

A former navy yeoman, Harry Thompson, was sentenced last week to 15 years in prison for selling navy secrets to a Japanese naval officer.

Charge Denied

Farnsworth denied the government's charge that he had turned over to a Japanese a copy of the navy's confidential instruction book "Service of Information and Security."

"When I was in the service, I had a copy that was 10 or 15 years old. When I was dismissed, it was in among a lot of old papers and scrap books I sent home and was put up in the attic. When I moved from my home in Chevy Chase (Md.) a year or so ago, it was burned up with a lot of other things in the attic. I'll admit I should have turned it in when I was dismissed, but I never gave or sold it to the Japanese government."

Earlier the former naval officer had asserted that a reported "confession" was entirely untrue.

CONFIDENCE VOTED IN ALBANY PREXY

EUGENE, July 17.—(AP)—The Presbyterian synod of Oregon wrote a vote of confidence for President Thomas W. Bibb, the trustees and faculty of Albany college into its records today.

A discussion on the college failed to materialize at the annual conference here yesterday and in its place a committee of eight, four to be selected by the synod trustees and one by each of the four Presbyteries, was agreed upon to study the college.

Dr. Bibb was involved last spring in a controversy with some college students over publication of the college paper and the school's athletic program. The dispute finally was settled amicably.

The synod voted to hold the 1937 conference in Pendleton on the invitation of the Rev. P. Murray Jones. Dates will be set later.

HOSPITAL PATIENT KILLED BY NAZIS

BUCHAREST, Rumania, July 16.—(AP)—Six students who admitted they were Nazi "iron guards" invaded a hospital today, surrounded the bed of Mihail Stelcescu, who was recovering from an appendicitis operation, and killed him with 20 bullets.

It was reported the shooting was preceded by a speech in which the leader of the students said: "Now you die, traitor!"

Stelcescu until a year ago was adjutant to Corneliu Codreanu, chief of the Iron Guard movement. Police said they quarantined and that Stelcescu formed an independent Nazi faction.

After the shooting the students surrendered to police, saying "our patriotic mission is accomplished."

TOWNSEND'S AIDE SCORES ALLIANCE

Gomer Smith Resents Plan to "Sell Organization Down the River."

CLEVELAND, June 17.—(AP)—Gomer Smith of Oklahoma, national vice-president of the Townsend organization, yesterday bitterly criticized the Rev. Fr. Charles E. Coughlin and the Rev. Gerald L. K. Smith.

Mingled boos and applause from Townsend delegates greeted Smith's tribute to President Roosevelt, a sharp turn of events since Coughlin and other speakers assailed the president and the new deal administration.

Smith questioned the claim of Gerald L. K. Smith, a Townsend director, to 6,000,000 followers in the share-the-wealth movement and said if "you want to look for those 6,000,000 followers you will find them in the swamps of Louisiana and most of them would turn out to be bull frogs instead of voters."

Smith asserted that some of the leaders in the Townsend organization "are trying to sell the movement down the river."

"They are trying to lead us into the slaughter house of destruction along with Father Coughlin with his shirt off, and with Gerald Smith with a Bible in his hand," shouted Gomer Smith. "I can read my own Bible and seek my own salvation."

"Shall this great Townsend organization debase itself and go off on a wind-mill fighting expedition," Gomer Smith asked. The delegates responded with a thunderous "no."

As Gomer Smith concluded his speech with a tribute to President Roosevelt and a promise of his personal support for the president, there were boos from the delegates and some scattered applause.

It looked for a moment that the pact sealed earlier in the day between the Townsend organization, Father Coughlin's National Union for Social Justice and the Share-the-Wealth club was headed for trouble.

Townsend "Sorry"

Then Dr. Townsend rose, held on his hands and quieted the delegates. He told them that Gomer Smith was unduly exercised because of his recent defeat for the democratic senatorial nomination in Oklahoma.

"We are exceedingly sorry that Gomer Smith was defeated so badly," Townsend said.

"However the good old folks in Oklahoma will get their pensions as quickly as the folks in Ohio. Some people can't take a licking and feel good over it."

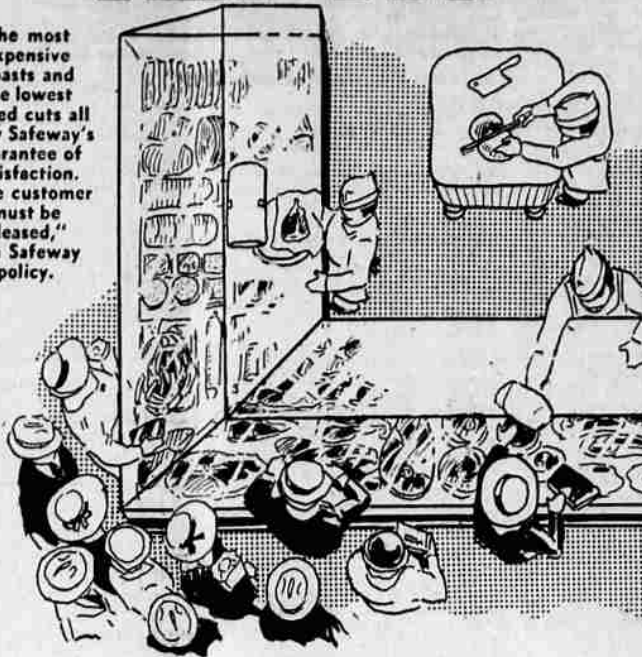
"I deplore personalities in this great convention and vituperation. It isn't necessary."
