ROOSEVELT'S RULE PLAYED BY GLASS

Virginia Senator Asserts Congress Erred in Its Authority Grant.

ASHLAND, Va., July 18.—(AP)—Senator Glass, Virginia's 78-year-old democratic senator, brought the Patrick Henry bicentennial celebration to a climax with a declaration that the present administration is a "government of privilege and discrimination."

Speaking last night at a gathering on the campus of historic Randolph Macon college, Senator Glass said the present government is such as Henry denounced in Virginia's house of burgesses.

"That is just what we are doing in this country today," Glass said, "whether it be due to the mismanagement of bank managers, insurance company managers, or the mismanagement of businesses or railroads. The government's nose is in all sorts of business today."

"Surrender" Blamed. The president, he said, "made the mistake of taking all the power that congress was willing to give him. It is the congress that should be blamed for abjectly surrendering its own constitutional functions and delegating them to the president of the United States and to various minor executive officials."

Declaring it to be his purpose to vote against any measure that would "abdicate by my oath of office and to the nation's better judgment," Senator Glass added:

"Patrick Henry would go along with me. I could enjoy the power of your great countryman in denouncing oppressive and unwise measures. If I had his force of speech, we might have accomplished something in the senate without putting the supreme court to the trouble of deciding these matters."

"Aid Talk" Foxy. Asking if Henry could be "bamboozled by talk of federal aid to states," Senator Glass answered his own question by saying that any money the government has comes from the pockets of taxpayers and that "all this government aid talk is folly."

He said Virginia gets back a "mere pittance" of the \$129,000,000 it pays the federal government in direct taxes, while 15 states west of the Mississippi which together pay less taxes to the federal government get ten times as much.

"Patrick Henry was opposed to Virginia ratifying the constitution," Glass continued. "His reasons went toward the proposition that it did not curb government enterprise enough, and because of his efforts, the first ten amendments were drafted. The constitution was intended to curb government enterprise when the government hasn't got sense, patriotism and courage enough to curb itself and remain within constitutional limitations. Without the restraint that it embodies the constitution would be a worthless piece of paper."

"Patrick Henry, if he were living now," Glass asked, "could he go along with the vagaries and whims of impractical academicians, some of whom never did a day's work or earned a meal by the sweat of their faces? Henry's whole life was an absolute contravention of that sort of thing."
