

THREE PLAYERS OFF JUNIOR TEAM HERE

ACTIS SCORES WIN OVER CARMEN BARTH

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., July 18.—(AP)—Ray Actis, regarded as the hardest hitting middleweight developed in San Francisco since the days of the late Stanley Ketchel, had another victory written in his record today. He scored a decisive ten-round victory over Carmen Barth of Cleveland, Ohio, here last night.

Two knockdowns decided the fight for the San Francisco Italian, left to the jaw floored Barth, Olympic games champion of 1932 in the second and ninth rounds.

The bell saved Barth in the second round but he got up in the ninth after taking eight counts.

Barth made a good show of it with a sixth round rally when he dropped over a right to the jaw which nearly floored Actis. The latter's knees buckled but he weathered the storm and came on to win the decision.

Each weighed 165 pounds.

principles and this reciprocity of action shall be directed toward nominating and electing Townsend plan endorsed candidates for president.

Any prospect, leaders said, of a new political party incorporating the Townsend organization with a similar social groups was put to rest when the convention sent the "common cause alignment" resolution back to committee.

After some discussion on the floor, the convention adopted a resolution that "whereas there remain in certain isolated cases, endorsements for congress, which should not have been made," the board of directors would be authorized to review endorsements and perhaps withdraw endorsement.

Gomer Smith came across the platform back of Townsend and sat down. Hundreds of delegates stood and cheered in an ovation for him.

OREGON DELEGATES QUIT CONVENTION IN DISGUST
SALEM, July 18.—(AP)—In a telegram to the Capital Journal, Theodore G. Nelson of Oregon announced today his resignation as a delegate to the Townsend national convention at Cleveland.

Nelson's message stated he had informed the convention officials it would be unnecessary for them to cancel his credentials or read him out of the organization as had been threatened.

Following Nelson's lead other Oregon delegates, expressing themselves as disgusted with the proceedings, were leaving for home today without so much as attending the morning business session of the convention, Nelson informed.

Declaring himself still faithful to the cause of adequate pensions for the aged, Nelson, who recently ran against Charles L. McNary for the republican nomination to the United States senate, indicated he would join and throw his support

to "another organization of a different type which might tend to develop more support for universal old age pensions."

Continuing, Nelson said "I do not wish to be associated any longer in any way with the Townsend organization. The Townsend movement has fallen into the hands of cunning racketeers."

CANDIDACY NOT HURT, WM. LEMKE DECLARES

CHICAGO, July 18.—(AP)—Rep. William Lemke, (R., N. D.), commented "that doesn't hurt my candidacy a bit" when informed today that the Cleveland convention of Townsend followers had voted against any organization endorsement of any presidential or vice-presidential candidate.

Lemke, presidential candidate of the new union party which has the expressed backing of Rev. Charles E. Coughlin, added that "the resolution doesn't say anything about individuals."

Asked whether he would endorse the Townsend plan in full when he addresses the convention, Lemke said:

"My speech will be an exposition of my views on old age security, on regulation and reestablishing representative government, and on the money issue."

Townsend Faces Suit.

Ouster of Dr. Francis E. Townsend and the board of directors of the Old Age Revolving Pensions, Ltd., was asked yesterday in a suit filed in common pleas court by the Rev. Alfred J. Wright of Cleveland, a devoted regional Townsend leader, and three other persons.

The suit asks:
That the court order an accounting of \$1,000,000 in Townsend clubs which has been "dissipated."

That a receiver be named for the Townsend movement and its remaining assets.

That restitution of funds to the Old Age Revolving Pensions, Ltd., be ordered by the court.

The petition for "discovery, accounting, restitution, removal of trustees and appointment of new trustees and a receiver," was filed by Dr. Wright through Attorney Benjamin Sacharow, of Cleveland. Other plaintiffs are: General C. H. Hildes, Los Angeles; Mrs. Lottie Brown Berry, Glendale, Calif., and Edgar P. Brown, Los Angeles.

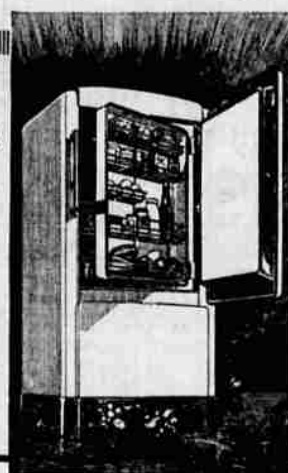
