NEW YORK, July 20. (AP)—The first dim outline of Peltier's comet—most spectacular visitor of its kind in the skies since Halley's famous comet of 1910—will be visible to the unaided eyes of sharp observers throughout the United States Tuesday night.

It will become brighter and brighter thereafter as it races toward the earth at terrific speed in its orbit around the sun. It is expected to reach its maximum visibility about August 4, at which time it will be nearest the earth, about 16,000,000 miles away.

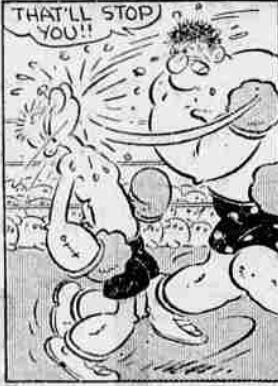

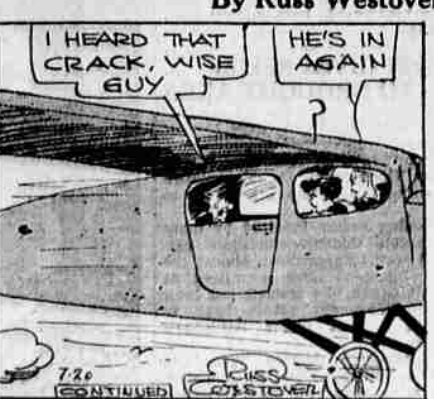

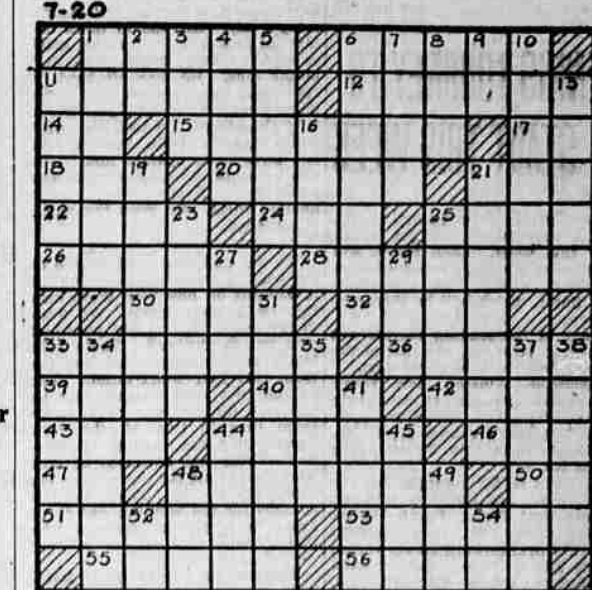
