

Igoe Hurls No-Hit Game Against Douglas Juniors

EUGENE VICTOR IN SERIES START, 9-0

Visiting Moundsman Fans 10 of Locals and Gets Perfect Support.

Pitching hitless ball and gathering three hits, one for three bases, Pete Igoe, ace hurler for the Eugene Legion Juniors had a big day yesterday as Eugene defeated the Douglas county juniors 9 to 0 in the first of a three-game inter-district series.

Igoe struck out ten of the Douglas county team's batters, while he had perfect support on the few balls that were hit.

The Douglas county team, on the other hand, made six costly errors, in addition to misjudging fly balls and altogether turned in a very poor exhibition.

Andrews, who opened on the mound, got away to a poor start, when Mallory clouted the first pitch into center field where Neal misjudged the ball, which rolled for a home run.

With the count standing 3 to 0, Elliott went into the box in the third inning and was rapped for nine hits, although he made 11 strikeouts.

The hits were well scattered and would not have been costly had it not been for infield and outfield errors in crucial spots.

Eugene had no earned runs, except, perhaps, Mallory's home run, which, however, was plainly misjudged.

The teams play Friday at Eugene.

The third game, which will be required should Roseburg win at Eugene, will be played in the town having the largest gate receipts in the first two games. Roseburg should win the third game easily, as the stands were well filled for Sunday's contest here.

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Well—so that, boys and girls, is that. About \$150 worth of cash customers plunked down the old do-rum at the gate yesterday to see what was promised to be a ball game. Because it was supposed to be a ball game the track and field fans stayed at home. As a consequence both groups were disappointed. The baseball fans had their mouths all fixed to do some tall and fancy routing, but because they were preponderantly Douglas county fans they had little opportunity to do their stuff. Had the score been reversed it would have been a "jewel" game. As it was, it was a flop. Ball fans are funny that way. We're either at the zenith of hopeful anticipation or at the nadir of despair.

Young Pete Igoe had the locals on the hip from the very beginning of the game and kept them there all afternoon. He pitched a great game, if we're any judge of kid baseball. He not only didn't allow a run but was just as stingy with his hits. More than that we can't recall more than two fellows reaching first base. It is the ambition of every pitcher to turn in a "no-hit no-run" game. Igoe deserved his success. He earned it from a potentially hard-hitting club. What is more—if his cockyness and clowning get the results they did Sunday perhaps we should take them up.

We still refuse to believe that the better team won. It was just one of those things. The kids from the north were hoped to the 10th degree and turned in a game 100 per cent better than they should be able to do consistently. On the other hand the Douglas lads failed to get one break. Every break went against them. Even balls and strikes seemed to hop the wrong direction. The whole day was just one of those things.

Ball fans who like their baseball scrambled got large gobs of it in Sunday's game. Scrambled is the word. At least four of the players were out of position most of the day because of illness or injury. Three positions were consequently weakened by these shifts. This may not be necessary in Friday's game and do we hope so? Kids just can't be shifted around and turn in their best games. Holbrook's injury played havoc with the centerfield strength but in our opinion this should have been the only weakness.

Andy Andrews got off to a bad start in Sunday's game. It just wasn't his day to click. He had a lot of hard luck and couldn't make his hook work. Pitchers have days and Sunday just wasn't Andy's day. He was in there doing his best but that wasn't good enough. Elliott didn't have any better luck. He was hit hard in spots and this, coupled with some mighty ragged baseball, just about tells the story. He took an awful lacing against odds that should not have been against him. Not one break of the game favored the local lads. Every break went against them. So goes the game of baseball.

We are now one down. We're in the hole. How well we come out of it depends on how well these kids fight in Friday's game. We were in the same position last year and won out in the end. Those kids last year didn't lay down, and the team this year won't either. The kicking they took Sunday may be the very thing they need to make them turn in two of the best games they are capable of playing. There are hundreds of fans who are pulling for and supporting this team to win. There may be reasons for not winning, but there are also plenty of reasons why they should.

There was a mighty cry of disappointment when George Crouch lost a ball in the sun. The kid shouldn't have been blamed. He has been playing infield all season and although from the stands it looks easy to catch a fly ball it is in reality a hard job. George was a good ball hawk last year, but this year has had very little practice at it. In addition he played right instead of left field. There was plenty of excuse for him to have a bad day. Give the kid credit for trying all the time. He is a willing worker and was doing his best. It hurt him a lot worse than anyone else when he bobbed, notwithstanding the fact that he was horribly handicapped.

WHITE SOX TAKE 8 GAMES IN ROW

Yanks Split Twin Bill With St. Louis; Cards Slash Chicago Cubs' Lead.

The Chicago White Sox completed the job of leaving the second division of the American league yesterday by stretching their winning streak to eight straight with a doubleheader victory over the Athletics, smashing out 28 hits for 11-5 and 8-2 decisions. With the Red Sox trouncing the Tigers 12-3 to regain third place, the Chicago clouters moved into a deadlock with the Detroiters.

The Yankees, meantime, were having trouble with the lowly St. Louis Browns, getting better than a split despite Gehrig's 27th and 28th homers to take the big-league lead. After winning the opener easily, 10-3, they fell 5-4 before Knott's pitching the nightcap.

The Cleveland Indians' winning streak, which was even longer than the White Sox, was snapped at nine games as the Tribe, after winning the opener of a twin bill 11-3 from the Senators, found Weaver too tough in the nightcap, and bowed 9-5.

Cards Gain on Cubs

The Cardinals saved something out of a more-or-less disastrous week by pulling up a game behind the league leading Chicago Cubs in the National league race with a doubleheader victory over the Boston Bees, 8-1 and 7-2, while the Cubs were getting no better than an even break with the Phillies. Then won the opener, 2-1 in 11 innings on Walter's wildness in the final frame, and then collapsed 4-1 before the fourth-pitching of Rookie Claude Passeau in the nightcap.

The Pirates, dropping their fifth straight by a 4-2 margin to the Dodgers, on the strength of Van Mungo's hitless relief pitching, all but lost their third-place standing as the improving New York Giants split with the slipping Cincinnati Reds, losing the nightcap 3-2 after taking the opener 4-3.

The Douglas County Legion Juniors will meet the Eugene Juniors on the University diamond at 5:15 Friday night. Coach Ward Cummings reports. The intermediates of the two towns will play a preliminary game starting at 3 p. m.

It is expected that a large number of fans will attend the game, and Coach Cummings requests that any persons making the trip and having room available for transporting players to please notify him as early as possible.

of corn in a 40 square mile area near Florence, S. D. The state's weather caused death list rose to 20.

Selling orders inspired by more favorable weather conditions carried corn futures down almost the full four-cent limit permitted as the Chicago pits opened, but later trading brought prices back to about a cent under Saturday's close.

Speculative buyers turned to wheat and that grain at time scored more than two cents a bushel rise.

Corn traders studied a report that a large part of Iowa, principal corn producing state, would with favorable weather hereafter yield 50 to 55 per cent of a normal crop.

The effect of the falling temperature was demonstrated in North Dakota, where the mercury sank to the sixties. Last week temperatures of 110 and above were common in that state.

A low of 67 degrees was recorded in Chicago today and the weather bureau predicted that temperatures in the seventies would remain until tomorrow at least.
