FILM STAR CENTER OF 5 MILLION SUIT

LOS ANGELES, July 20.—(AP)—Lanky Gary Cooper, the film star, became a \$5,000,000 "football" today when his home studio, Paramount, filed suit for that amount against Samuel Goldwyn, producer, for allegedly luring him into the Goldwyn contract list.

A lengthy complaint, setting forth Paramount's list of grievances, went into the records of United States district court. It asked \$4,000,000 actual damages, and another \$1,000,000 punitive costs from Goldwyn.

Goldwyn said he would not reply until he had seen the complaint.

Cooper declined to make a statement, but his manager, Jack Moss, declared:

"Well, we're signed with Sam Goldwyn all right, but as far as trouble between the two studios, I don't know anything about it. It was just one of those things that sent us to Goldwyn instead of staying at Paramount."

Adolph Zukor, Paramount's chairman of the board, accused Goldwyn of a "breach of morals and ethics" in snatching Cooper off the Paramount roster of players.

BODY TAKEN FROM CRATER LAKE RIM

KLAMATH FALLS, July 21.—(AP)—The broken body of young Warren Bowden, 19-year-old tourist from Portsmouth, Va., was lowered from the jagged rocks 200 feet above the shores of Crater lake and brought to a Klamath Falls funeral home late yesterday.

The youth was killed instantly when he rolled over-end down the precipitous walls of the crater and struck out of sight.

A cross-country tour of the national parks ended in tragedy when Bowden, accompanied by two companions started scrambling down

the dangerous cliff to go swimming. Bowden slipped, went crashing down the slope and landed on a ledge hundreds of feet below.
