## GRADES FIXED FOR GLADIOLUS BULBS

**SALEM, July 21.**—(AP)—Following hearings held at Grants Pass and Portland the state department of agriculture reported today the approval of 19 different grades for gladiolus bulbs.

The large or top grade will be known as Oregon jumbo, which must be 2 inches in diameter. Frank McKennon, head of the plant division, stated the quality in the higher grades was the same, the differences being accounted for by size.

"An imperative need exists in every county for authentic information regarding soils, marketing facilities, utilities and other related resources for guiding the new settlers," said Duffy.

"This will do more to make him an asset to the community and state than any other factor. Co-operative studies begun by the settlement administration have this end in view. Meanwhile, hundreds of farm families, many of them newcomers, are being assisted thru rehabilitation."

Duffy said there were about 4,000 farms in the northwest available for immediate occupation and having a good opportunity for successful operation. About 500 are on completed irrigation projects, 1,500 are in good soil areas and about 2,000 in good soil areas of cutover land.

## BANK LAW CHANGES FAVORED BY LONDON

**TOPEKA, Kas., July 21.**—(AP)—A survey looking toward "simplification and improvement" of federal banking laws was projected by Rep. John B. Hollister, republican of Ohio, today as a possibility if Gov. AH, M. Landon wins the presidency.

Hollister, the ranking member of the house banking committee, conferred twice with Landon yesterday as the republican candidate put finishing touches on the 3,500-word address in which he will accept the nomination Thursday night. At the conclusion of the talks on banking and currency, Hollister said in a statement:

"I was particularly interested to talk over with him the matter of a non-partisan commission of experts on banking to begin as soon as possible a basic study of all our federal banking laws with a view to their simplification and improvement."

"The operation of our national banks, of the federal reserve system and of the federal deposit insurance corporation are closely interrelated, but frequently laws governing one of these establishments are passed without proper consideration of their effect on others, leading to conflicts and ambiguities. In addition, experience has shown us that there are many ways in which banking

may be improved by additional legislation."

"I found Governor Landon to be very well informed on all these (financial) subjects," Hollister said, "not only with respect to their legislative history but in their bearing on our present national problem."
