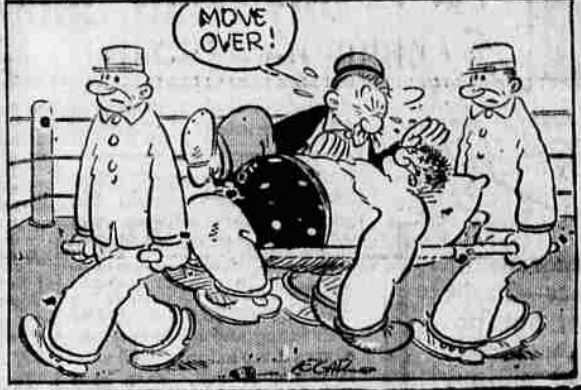

PORTLAND SEWAGE PROJECT SET BACK

PORTLAND, July 22—(AP)—Portland's \$5,000,000 sewage treatment plant project was set back today when the city council, voting 2 to 2, failed to pass the ordinance providing for the sale of \$5,000,000 in bonds.

The city's voters approved the \$5,000,000 bond issue three years ago when plans were afoot for a \$10,000,000 plant, part of which it was considered probable the federal government would pay.

Validity of the proposed bond issue was upheld recently by the state supreme court.

The council's action, which leaves the matter for another discussion, came within 24 hours after Dr. Frederick Stricker, state health officer, informed the city it must arrange to halt dumping of sewage into the Willamette River and Columbia slough or a law enforcement demand would be turned over to the attorney general.

The possibility that the matter again would be voted on appeared when Commissioner Bean introduced a resolution calling for another public ballot. The resolution will be argued next Wednesday.

PORTLAND FERRY STRIKE ADJUSTED

PORTLAND, Ore., July 22—(AP)—Several score ferryboatmen prepared to resume work under a new agreement today while controversy on two other fronts continued to harass employers and employees in the Portland area.

R. A. Hickox, secretary of the local ferryboatmen's union, said an accord had been reached by the union and the Western Transportation company, a Crown-Willamette subsidiary, to end the five-week tie-up of union ferries formerly operating for the Crown-Willamette company between West Linn, Portland and Camas.

A new difficulty arose between the furniture workers' union and the Super-Biltz plant, with the union calling a strike affecting nearly 100 employees on the claim that the plant discharged men who spoke in favor of unionization.

The third current labor controversy, which reached a climax last week when the sand and gravel association closed its plants after truckmen had called a strike at one company, resulted in halting operations on a highway project and a retaining wall here when difficulty was experienced in obtaining material.

Operations of the union ferryboats were expected to be resumed immediately as a result of the new agreement with the Crown-Willamette organization.

Hickox said the pact called for 10 per cent wage increases for boat crews (bringing the hourly scale to 75 cents); the union asked 85 cents; increases of 15 to 25 cents an hour for shore crews; handling of cargo at Portland, West Linn and Camas exclusively by ferry union members; and a weekly wage of \$15 for 13 weeks for employees displaced by the installation of mechanical equipment.

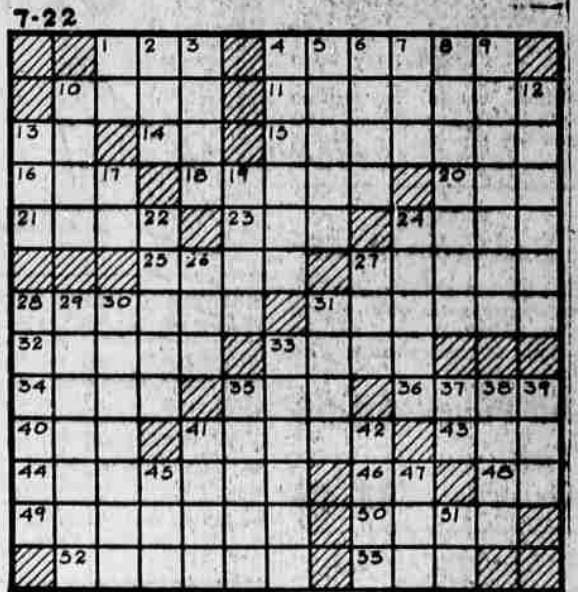
