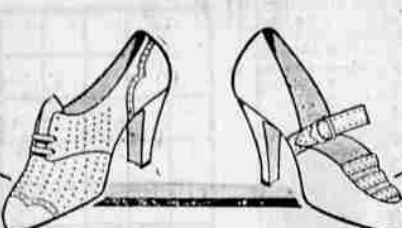

HUBBELL WINS IN DUEL WITH DIZZY

Cardinals' Loss To Giants Puts Them 2 Games Back Of League Leaders.

Just about once every year, Carl Hubbell and Dizzy Dean hook up in a baseball masterpiece. "The Hub" came out on top in a light duel with the "Great One" yesterday, with whatever breaks there were going against Dean to make their rivalry over the last three seasons all-even at two wins and two losses for each.

"Old Diz" undoubtedly pitched the better ball game yesterday. He gave up only five hits to the Giants over ten innings, while his gas house gang mates were getting the Cardinals' bats going. Hubbell, who struck out half a dozen batters and walked only two, Hubbell fanned but three and passed five. Bartlett's home run decided the game, 2 to 1.

The Cardinals' loss put them two full games back of the National league-leading Chicago Cubs, who barely turned back a late Brooklyn rally to nose out the Dodgers 5-2. The Pirates managed to remain in third place by clubbing the Phillies 17-6, after coming from behind a 3-0 deficit. The Cincinnati Reds handed the Bees their third straight setback, as Frey bested Cantwell, 3-2, in a mound struggle.

Yankees' Lead Cut
The Cleveland Indians cut the Yankees' American league lead to eight games by nailing out the Red Sox 6-5, while the Yanks were bowing to Thomas and the St. Louis Browns 5-4. The Browns' win enabled them to come out of the American league cellar for the first time this season.

The Chicago White Sox, opening at home after a highly successful road trip, had their eighth-game winning streak snapped as the Senators came through 5-5. The Tigers moved back into third place and dropped the skidding Athletics into the cellar by taking a double-header decision. They won the opener 8-0 behind Bridges' seven-hit pitching, and gained a 9-8 edge in the night cap with a two-run rally in the eighth.

ed Almeria, southern Spanish port, from the rebels.

A general engagement between loyalists and rebels was indicated at Ceuta, Spanish Morocco, where a heavy bombardment was in progress.

The United States consulate in Barcelona announced all Americans there were safe.

The insurgent forces claimed victories in the south, where they launched their military campaign, while the government said it was in full control of the northern and eastern provinces.

The report of a spectacular political development in Madrid—the formation of a "red committee"—eclipsed the military situation.

Although the purpose of the red committee was not made clear, observers assumed it was intended to take over the government if the present regime fell.

The threat of international action for the protection of foreign nationals hung over the country as the fighting increased.

Madrid Threatened
From Paris came the report that a decisive battle was imminent north of Madrid between rebels and government forces.

An insurgent army, augmented by peasant volunteers, was reported heading for the capital.

The government announced that 150,000 loyal troops stood ready to meet the attack.

Irun was the center of bloody fighting in the north. Rebels besieged the city but were unable to drive out the government forces.

A message from General Cabanero, chief of the rebel forces at Zaragoza, reported heavy fighting west of Barcelona. The government took over the cathedral and other Barcelona churches as "people's institutions." Some churches in Madrid have been burned.

After six consecutive days of temperatures above 90, Los Angeles was brought relief by ocean breezes and the high mark yesterday was 88.

The weather man said "fair and little change in temperature" again today and Oregon sought the shade with no immediate prospect of a cessation of the season's first heat wave.

Eastern Oregon again felt the

brunt of the heat, with Pendleton and La Grande recording the highest temperature, 106.5 degrees yesterday. It was the highest of the year there and the sun showed no signs of relenting today.

Klamath Falls recorded the hottest day since August, 1933, Tuesday with the temperature reaching 100 degrees. In Medford it was 97 and Grants Pass recorded one degree cooler.

Western Oregon began to experience slightly cooler weather. North Bend, cooled by the Pacific, recorded another 64-degree temperature Tuesday, making it once more the cool spot of the state.

Wilbur Glickson of Muddy creek, Baker county, suffered a sunstroke while stacking hay at his farm and was removed to a hospital.

FIELD SCOUT HEAD NEED IS DISCUSSED

Plans for the appointment of a field office to direct Boy Scout activities for Coos and Douglas counties are being discussed here today with local leaders in boys' work by W. L. Hayward, Portland, associate regional executive.

The Coos and Douglas scout groups are now affiliated in the Wallamet council, which also includes Lane county. Many leaders, Mr. Hayward reports, believe that the present situation does not give an opportunity for the required supervision and desire appointment of a leader who will be able to serve as a field man between the local councils and the central organization.

The principal question to be determined, Mr. Hayward states, is whether there is sufficient interest to provide funds to meet the additional cost of such service.

OREGON ALLOTTED WPA PROJECT FUNDS

WASHINGTON, July 22.—(AP)—Allotment of \$1,768,202 to carry on women's sewing rooms, canneries, park developments and other activities under the WPA was approved today by Aubrey Williams, deputy administrator.

Allocations for women's projects included, Oregon \$50,000, Idaho \$20,000, and Washington, \$42,116.

"Davis shot him in the stomach. The fellow tried to say something but could only gasp. He ran and we ran after him. The others kept shooting after him. I went back to the car, picked them up, and took them back to the cottage."

Coleman's bullet-pierced body was found in the marsh on May 26, 1935.
