Finlay field, which has been the scene of so many hotly contested events during the summer, will have still greater scenes before the American Legion convention is over. Many of the best features of the four-day program will be centered there. In fact if a visitor to the convention saw only the events that were staged at Finlay field he could go home feeling that the convention was a huge success.

The two championship baseball teams (Oregon's champion will be determined at Woodburn August 1-2 and Washington's at about the same time) will arrive in Roseburg on Wednesday, August 12th. Naturally both teams will wish to work out on Finlay field during the afternoon and both will possibly wish to loosen up on Thursday morning. As soon as the teams are off the field Wednesday evening, Fred Hartung and his committee will start preparing the stage and field for the big program of the evening.

The Wednesday evening program at the field will include the famous Gilmore circus and parade. This is really a show—particularly for the kids. The older the kids the better they will enjoy it. There will be laughs for every one from two years old to 92. Giant and

grotesque animals, 125 clowns, some of which are tall as a house, stunts, music, drill teams and a program that really will be a program. Yes, Wednesday night will be a real busy night on Finlay field.

On Thursday there will be drum corps practicing on the field all day. At three in the afternoon the first of the interstate ball games will be played. This game will be a honey and we fear that the seating capacity of the field will be taxed to the limit.

Friday will see three major events at the field. The individual drummers' and buglers' contests, the second in the series of baseball games and at night the greatest show Douglas county has ever seen—the annual drum corps contest. There will be five thousand people registered for the convention and all of them will be trying to get into the field to see that contest. It is a spectacle, beautiful uniforms, flashy maneuvers, military cadence, clock-like coordination, music, color and breath-taking suspense are all wrapped into this one program. People will come for miles for this one feature alone. For those who have never seen a drum corps contest we advise never going unless you wish to be

come a confirmed addict to the thing. If you ever see one you will never miss another.

Tomorrow the Douglas Juniors travel to Eugene for the second game in the elimination series to determine the southern Oregon champion. We have been asked: "If Eugene wins the right to represent southern Oregon at Woodburn, do you think she has earned that honor?" The answer is "NO." Eugene does not have a better team than Roseburg. Their team isn't as well balanced or as powerful as the Douglas county team. Individually, man for man, they are not as good as the local lads. Position by position, they are not our equal. If Eugene reaches the state finals they will do it by sheer luck. They will represent southern Oregon by out-lucking a superior team.

NOW CIVIL SERVICE

mended to the postoffice head by the political patronage dispenser for the district, usually a representative or senator.

Exam Need Reduced
"One feature," the commission said in a statement, "is that only one examination may be held for an office unless an eligible is excused from the first examination, or the eligible or eligibles resulting from the examination are found to be deficient either as to character or as to residence."

"Under preceding orders as far back as the administration of President Coolidge, the postmaster general was given final decision with respect to the residence of eligibles certified by the civil service commission."

For years the patronage method of appointing postmasters on recommendation of congressmen has been bitterly debated in congress and on the political platform.

Landon Would Go Further
An expression of opinion on the postmasterhips and civil service came from Governor Alf M. Landon, republican presidential nominee, during the national convention of his party at Cleveland.

In a telegram to the convention on the night of his nomination Landon said:

"I believe that there should be included within the merit system every position in the administrative service below the rank of assistant secretaries of major departments and agencies and that this inclusion should cover the entire postoffice department."

Of the 12,750 postmasterhips, there are 1,067 in the first class, 3,154 in the second and 9,659 in the third. Fourth class postmasters already are under civil service.

MADRID-BOUND
REBELS REPULSED

rallying points in the south. At Teutuan, however, Gen. Francisco Franco, the Spanish rebel commander-in-chief, was quoted by a Moroccan newspaperman as saying "everything is going according to our plans... we expect victory."

In Washington, Secretary Hull announced the American export line had agreed to divert one of its vessels to Barcelona to evacuate Americans if necessary. The state department received an urgent appeal from Consul William E. Chapman at Bilbao for a war vessel.

The American battleship Oklahoma, steamed from Cherbourg, France, to Bilbao to evacuate American women and children from the Spanish north coast. Barcelona is on the Mediterranean sea.

Planes Assault Rebels
Government bombs plummeted to rebel targets from airplanes swooping over army barracks at Zaragoza, Spain, today in a fresh assault intended to help break the back of a revolution now in its seventh day.

Running a gamut of anti-aircraft fire at this, a rebel stronghold in northeastern Spain, the planes augmented a column of militiamen

organized to reinforce 4,000 loyalists determined to take Zaragoza by storm.

On a wide battlefield of the civil war, which some sources estimated had taken a toll of 25,000 dead and wounded, loyal forces of Spain's liberalist government forces marched out of Madrid to meet the threat of two fascist columns converging on the capital.

Word received in Hendaye, France, said the Madrid-bound fascist columns faced a firm defense by a trained army of 36,000 civil guards.

The most bitter fighting seemed to center around Zaragoza and Seville, in southwestern Spain, and that in itself was interpreted by observers as an indication of how widespread the rebellion remained.

A small advance party from Barcelona, approaching Zaragoza, was reported ambushed by rebels and several liberals killed.

A Spanish destroyer arrived in Barcelona harbor under the command of the second officer, the crew having arrested the captain when he attempted to join the fascist army revolution.

Other battles were reported at Albacete, Guadalajara and other points. The government announced rebels at Cordoba, in the south, had surrendered.

England Warns

British naval guns boomed a "warning" to Spanish rebel air bombs off Tarifa, Spain, and British and French warnings were sent the left government at Madrid to keep its fleet out of the international harbor at Tangier. Moreover, Britain warned the rebels to keep their bombs clear of His Majesty's ships.

HUNGARIAN ENVOYS
UNDER U. S. GUARD

WASHINGTON, July 23.—(AP)—

The Washington Post says police have assigned a special guard to the Hungarian legation here because of a reported plot to assassinate Hungarian Minister John Pelenyi and members of his staff. The paper says legation attaches are frankly alarmed, and described the alleged bomb plot as a communist reprisal for the recent execution of a red agitator in Budapest.

Minister Pelenyi and his family are now en route to Hungary.

HITLER PROMISES
AUSTRIA HANDS OFF

VIENNA, July 23.—(AP)—

The Hitler government announced anew today a hands-off policy in respect to Austria's internal affairs, as hundreds of families celebrated an amnesty granted them by President Wilhelm Miklas.

The announcement took the form of a statement by Franz von Papen, the German ambassador, whose patient labor culminated in the Austro-German accord, that Austrian nazis must expect no aid from Germany if they engage in illegal activities.

OREGON EVENTS
FLASHED FROM
WIRE SERVICE

RICKREALL, Ore., July 23.—

(AP)—Fire, ignited in a stubble field near here yesterday, spread swiftly into the fields of H. M. Watt and burned 19 acres of standing grain before it could be checked. Neighbors assisted a forestry fire truck from Dallas in keeping the blaze from the farm buildings. The loss had not been estimated.

PORTLAND, July 23.—(AP)—Mrs. Amelia Keil, about 60, a widow, lost her life last night when she apparently became confused by traffic on Sandy boulevard and was struck, police said, by an automobile driven by Eugene B. Hanford, Cascade Locks.

Officer James Hunt said the woman was crossing the street near the middle of a block. A routine charge of involuntary manslaughter was filed against Hanford pending a verdict by a coroner's jury. Hanford was freed on bail.

The woman was Portland's 46th fatality since December 1.

LANDON TONIGHT

lief administration."

Tonight, before massed thousands and a scene of pageantry unsurpassed in the history of the sunflower state, Landon officially accepts the republican mandate to challenge Mr. Roosevelt's stewardship before the electorate.

Victory Scented
From far and wide, republican leaders gathered for the traditional ceremony. John Hamilton, national chairman, arrived with the statement that "the situation looks better and better all the time" and "victory is in the air."

Rep. Bertrand Snell of New York, charged by the Cleveland convention with the duty of notifying Landon, added that "we're on our way to victory in November" if the middlewestern situation is as good as that in the east.

Of Mr. Roosevelt's civil service order, Hamilton said it demonstrated "how scared" the democratic opposition was.

Thousands paraded on downtown Topeka avenues, awaiting the evening ceremonies when Landon, in a prepared address, will officially accept the republican nomination.

Hamilton said he was "pleased" to hear of President Roosevelt's civil service order for the post office department.

"He won't do a thing constructive unless he is driven to it," the national chairman told reporters.

He said he was "very happy" over results of his recent trip into the New England states.

"It was a knockout," Hamilton said.

Thousands Pour In

Landon laughingly told well wishers he would be satisfied if a drought relieving rain developed during his address. The weather forecast of "fair and warmer" pointed toward 100-degree temperatures in the afternoon.

Some sixty trains—score regularly scheduled and twice as many specials—brought their loads of visitors and uncounted thousands motored to the scene.

The details of caring for the huge influx of visitors ranged down to water fountains capable of providing a drink of water to 70,000 people an hour. There are thirty of these fountains, each attached to a fire plug.
