for another chance and promised she would "train and not touch another drop."

Other members of the women's swimming team are circulating a petition asking the committee to give her another chance.

The 32-year-old swimmer definitely has balked at the Olympic committee's ruling that she return to the United States on a steamer sailing tomorrow.

The swimmer, broken up by the committee's drastic action, asked the public is cordially invited to attend the church services and to visit the reading room.

"I know I have been drinking too

much and I'm all wrong," Mrs. Jarrett told Dr. Raycroft. "I can't put into words how badly I feel now. All I am asking is a chance to face the committee and tell them on my word of honor, that I did not realize how seriously the offense would be regarded."
