

4,000 FALL IN CLASH AT SAN SEBASTIAN

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The American consulate at Barcelona, had been killed.

One was a Spanish clerk, the other an unidentified chauffeur. They were trying to bring to the consulate George Jenkins, head of an American motor company at Barcelona, who was on the outskirts of the city.

The United States, France and Great Britain agreed to pool their facilities to evacuate refugees, American and English refugees arriving at Marseille, France, from Barcelona said they heard General Manuel Goded and 47 other rebel officers had been slain in prison by their loyalist captors.

"Starve Out" Planned
"Starve out" tactics planned by the rebels for Madrid by means of an army encircling movement were contemplated also for San Sebastian and Irun.

On a front a few miles northwest of Madrid, the government threw reinforcements into a mountain pass, called the gateway to Madrid, in an effort to stem the rebel advance.

The rebels themselves trundled reinforcements north to besiege leftist strongholds.

From Pamplona, Gen. Emilio Mola, northern fascist commander, sped toward Madrid to take personal charge of the troops battling southward. Truckloads of peasant volunteers steamed over the highways to rebel-held Pamplona and to the San Sebastian front.

In Madrid a call was issued for reinforcements.

Reports received in Lisbon, Portugal, said a provisional government for Spain was being organized by the rebel stronghold of Burgos.

Spanish communists in San Sebastian threatened to kill 500 Spanish aristocrats if the rebels did not stop bombing the resort from the air.

The United States embassy here, sheltering 150 men, women and children, reported all Americans in the Madrid area were safe.

WASHINGTON, July 24.—(AP)—As an apology to British authorities for the action of Spanish rebel planes in bombarding a British ship, General Francisco Franco, the rebel leader, has awarded the military cross to the master of a British man of war which returned the Spanish fire.

In a subsequent interview at his shrine, Father Coughlin said that "I have no personal quarrel with

In the interview, Father Coughlin said that a president who becomes a candidate for re-election "can claim no special privilege on the grounds that he is president of the United States."

President Again Rapped
Also in the interview, he said that Roosevelt promised at a meeting in Sioux City, Ia., in the 1932 campaign to support the Frazier-Lemke bill. "Instead," he said, "he put the veto in the back of the bill."

As president, he said, Roosevelt "went with a tin cup in his hand and begged for a loan of 35 billion dollars. The bankers issued a credit to this amount and Mr. Roosevelt promised in the name of the taxpayers that he would return that amount in hard earned cash."

That, he said, "was the greatest currency inflation in the history of the world, more serious in its outcome than any other inflation ever will be."

In his assertion that President Roosevelt has "surrounded himself with crackpots," Father Coughlin mentioned Harry L. Hopkins, federal administrator; Secretary of the Interior Harold I. Ickes, Rexford G. Tugwell, resettlement administrator, and Dr. Felix Frankfurter.

Informed of the apology, Dr. Francis E. Townsend said it "was the gracious thing to do; I think more of him for it."

The battleship, it is reported, is to be stationed off the north coast of Spain to remove American citizens from Spanish territory in the event of emergencies arising from the Spanish rebellion. The warship has been touching English, Swedish and French ports in its current cruise. Barnes enlisted in the navy in 1917 and has served continuously since enlistment.

Campaign Mapped
Over the luncheon table and in Landon's study, the republican presidential candidate and National Chairman Hamilton discussed today the campaign itinerary. At present, the Kansas governor is expected to make his first trip shortly after the middle of August, heading toward West Middlesex, Pa.

Shirt-sleeved, Landon held his customary morning press conference.

A newsmen asked the governor to amplify his views on payment of a cash bounty to farmers—a factor in the soil conservation program outlined in his acceptance speech. Another asked for more detail on how business would be

freed from "governmental intimidation."

"I would not care to discuss them now," Landon replied.

Landon said he had not dealt with the three subjects mentioned in his telegram to the republican national convention—minimum wage laws, currency and the merrion system—because he felt that "without going into detail they had been covered."
