

'NO' MAJORITY PUTS RECORD OFF KRRR

KRRR listeners are still requesting the playing of "Gloomy Sunday," but the station management reports that no such requests will be granted as the record was destroyed.

During the "Grab Bag" program Thursday night, the management succeeded in learning two things: first, that the station has a great following of listeners, and second, that many listeners do not like "Gloomy Sunday."

Having received a few complaints regarding the particular piece of music, and at the same time receiving numerous requests, the station called for a vote by telephone.

The response was overwhelming. In less than 30 minutes more than 100 telephone calls were received. For the first 10 minutes sentiment expressed was evenly divided. The listeners disliking the song, however, then gained control and were in about a two-to-one lead when the telephone line became so crowded that it was necessary to call off the roll.

As a result of the vote the record was smashed and is no longer being played over the station.

REBELS HALTED IN DRIVE ON MADRID

Conto shells. It was reported from Alcala that a government plane was hit by rebel batteries and crashed into the sea between Marbella and Malaga.

Rebels Hold 28 Provinces
The government disclosed that 28 of Spain's 50 provinces were in the hands of fascist rebels. The capture of the important city of Alcala was announced in the southeast, cleaning up the rebel movement in that region and consolidating the government's grip on the territory south of Valencia.

The movement was regarded as particularly important since it strengthens the government's control of Valencia which with Barcelona constitutes the government's main outlet to the Mediterranean sea. Madrid was calm and the tenseness of yesterday disappeared in great part with reports that the rebel drive against the capital was stopped and driven back in disorder.

Radio advices from Oviedo stated that chief city of the Asturias was held by a Col. Aranda, who pretended to take it in order to defend it against rebels, but who really was acting with the rebels. The radio station at Ciudad Lineal sent a message that the rebel army on the northern coast of Spain started for Tangier but the crew overpowered the officers and the ship was joining loyal forces.

Prisoners taken near Zaragoza declared reports received there indicated rebels suffered 3,000 casualties in fighting at Guadalajara yesterday and that rebel General Mola experienced great difficulty in evacuating the wounded.

REFUGEES BEING TAKEN FROM CIVIL WAR ZONE

PARIS, July 25.—(AP)—American, British and French vessels, cooperating today in the evacuation of refugees from Spain, brought more than 3,000 foreign citizens, including United States citizens, from the scene of civil war.

Hallett Johnson, counselor of the United States embassy in Madrid, reported to the embassy here there were no casualties among United States nationals in San Sebastian.

The Spanish embassy today asked the French government to authorize urgent delivery of arms to Spain's embattled government, it was stated in usually well-informed sources.

The secret raising of a detachment of "shock troops" by French communists to aid the leftist Spanish government was reported in nationalist quarters.

WASHINGTON, July 25.—(AP)—Marooned amid the chaos of Spain, but still unharmed, American Ambassador Claude G. Bowers had submitted to the state department today a telegraphic report indicating that the fierce civil war may last a long time.

Bowers, who had been isolated there several days while fears for his life mounted, reported that the warring leftist government forces and the revolutionary rightists each held important sectors of the country.

TOWNSEND CLUBS' DOINGS IN DOUGLAS

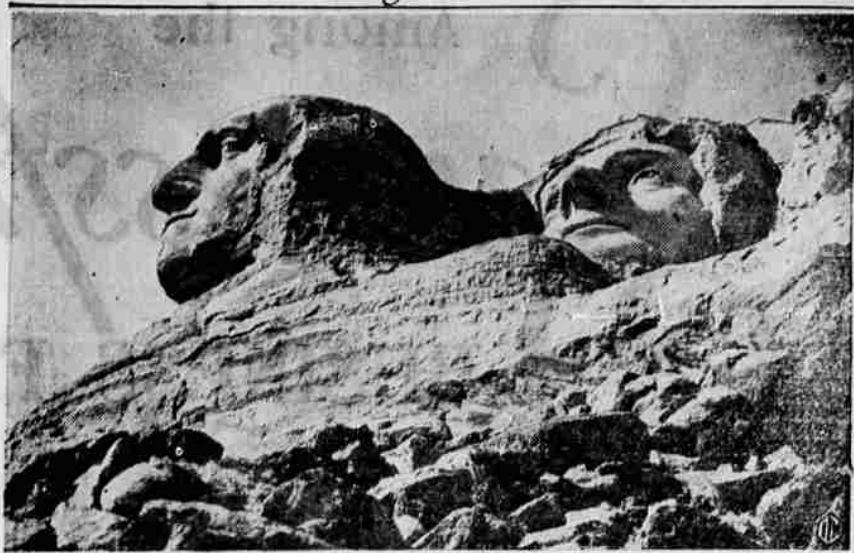

Renew Work on Huge Memorial in Black Hills



Return of favorable weather marked renewal of work on one of the most ambitious sculptural projects in history, the huge Mount Rushmore national memorial in South Dakota's Black Hills. Some conception of the size of the mountain figures is given by the above photo which shows the profile of George Washington at the left, his nose measuring 24 feet in length, face 60 feet from crown to chin, and the entire monument towering 240 feet in height. The rough outline of Thomas Jefferson, at the right, is the second of the four monumental figures, the third and fourth to be Abraham Lincoln and Theodore Roosevelt. Gutzon Borglum, famous sculptor, is supervising the work.

Borah Likes Speech

At Bellevue, Idaho, William E. Borah, republican senator, said today he "liked" Gov. Alf M. Landon's presidential nomination acceptance speech.

"I liked the acceptance speech, more particularly because of its quiet elevation of tone and its singular freedom from mere attack on the opposition."

"Of course an acceptance speech cannot go into detail, but the general principles stated seemed to me assuring when details come to be dealt with."

CHICAGO, July 25.—(AP)—For the notification of Col. Frank Knox, republican vice-presidential nominee, Chauncey McCormick, chairman of arrangements, today announced plans to stage "the biggest political show Chicago has seen in years."

Col. Knox will make his formal speech of acceptance next Thursday night, officially taking his place beside his running mate, Governor Alf M. Landon of Kansas.

The theme of the Chicago ceremonies will be "Americanism, Constitutionalism and the Flag."

The scene of the Knox notification will be the Chicago stadium. About 25,000 are expected to see the ceremonies.

The ceremonies will start at 7:30 o'clock eastern standard time.

VANDERGRIFT, Pa., July 25.—(AP)—Police today attributed the wreck of an 8-car freight train, in which one man lost his life, to a 12-year old boy's prank in placing a piece of iron on a rail.

Before he sailed for Rome, Bishop Gallagher expressed disapproval of the language used by Father Coughlin when he applied the word "liar" to President Roosevelt during an address at Cleveland.

Fishing and Road Conditions in Umpqua National Forest Good, Bulletin Advises

Weed-end vacationists in the Umpqua national forest will find good fishing and road conditions, according to the weekly bulletin issued from local forest headquarters. Fishing conditions have generally improved in nearly all streams, the report says. The bulletin is as follows:

Diamond Lake district: Fishing at Diamond lake is now better than it has been at any time this season with a number of limit catches being made with flies and trolling. Stream fishing is also excellent with many limit catches reported.

The Oregon State Game commission liberated a million fish in Diamond lake this week and they can be seen in the shallow water along the bank on the northwest side. Twenty thousand fry were also liberated in Bradley creek, a tributary to the North Umpqua river at Kelsay valley. Excellent views of Diamond lake and surrounding country can be seen from Clunamon, butte, Elephant mountain, Kelsay mountain, and Kelsay point.

It is possible to drive to these lookouts by auto, Rube Long, commercial packer, is now at Diamond lake with 20 head of horses and is ready to take parties on back trips, sight seeing trips, or the horses can be rented for riding by the hour or day. All the roads in the Diamond lake district are in fine shape, and all trails have been maintained with the exception of the Skyline trail. This trail has not been maintained all the way through but is passable. Camp fire permits are not required at the Diamond lake camp grounds but are required at all other camp grounds in this district.

North Umpqua district: Steelhead fishing is excellent in the North Umpqua river from Steamboat as far down as Honey creek. Limit catches of trout are also being made. The Mt. trail from Steamboat bridge down the North Umpqua river on the south side, an excellent trail for fishermen wishing to return to Steamboat without fishing back. The trail extends 3 miles down the river from Steamboat bridge. An interesting sight now is the steelhead jumping at Steamboat falls. All roads in

this district are in good shape. The North Umpqua road is open to Glen Echo, 5 miles above Steamboat. The Steamboat road is open to Steelhead creek. The Little river road is open to Emile creek, and the Red butte road is open to Watson cabin. All trails in the district have been maintained and are in excellent shape. Camp fire permits are required at all but posted camp grounds in this district.

Bohemia district: The streams in the Bohemia district are now too low for good fishing, although some rainbow trout are being caught in Brice creek. The roads in this district are in fairly good shape and all trails have been maintained and are passable. Over 50 species of wild flowers are now in bloom on Fairview mountain, and the road is open all the way to the lookout. This is a very fine week-end drive.

South Umpqua district: Good trout fishing is reported in the upper South Umpqua river and its tributaries. Occasional limit catches are being made at Fish lake, but the trout are becoming more sluggish and do not take flies so readily as in past weeks. Fish lake is located 61 miles from Camp Comfort, or 333 miles from Tiller by road and trail. On the South Umpqua road Frances Creek camp, Bonfield Creek camp, South Umpqua Falls camp, and Camp Comfort camp grounds offer pleasant stopping places for campers and good trout water is easily accessible from each camp ground.

All roads in this district are passable but are rough. All trails have been maintained and are in good condition. Camp fire permits are required at all forest camps in this district.

Again, the public is reminded that a shovel, axe, and water bucket are necessary equipment for those who camp on national forest land. We wish to caution all those who travel in the forest about fire. The forest is dry and the fire hazard is getting greater as the fire season advances. A bit of carelessness on the part of one forest user may spoil recreation possibilities for many.

(AP)—Rev. Charles E. Coughlin declared here today that the visit of Bishop Michael Gallagher of Detroit to Vatican City has "absolutely no connection with my differences with President Roosevelt."

"I am very happy that Bishop Gallagher should take the view-point he did in his statement at Naples today," Father Coughlin declared at a press conference.

Father Coughlin's apology to the president for the use of the word "liar" appeared yesterday in his publication "Social Justice."

Bishop Gallagher, due to reach Vatican City next week for an audience with Pope Pius was expected to defend Father Coughlin and his political activities, as he has in the past.

In April, 1935, the 70-year-old bishop, appearing with Father Coughlin on a radio program, declared that "I pronounce Father Coughlin sound in doctrine and in its application and interpretation. Freely I give him my imprimatur on his written word, and freely I give him my approval of his spoken word."

Members of Father Coughlin's National Union for Social Justice will decide at their national convention next month whether to follow Father Coughlin in supporting Representative William Lemke as candidate for president of the new union party.

sentenced the same day as James. He pleaded guilty to first degree murder in connection with Mrs. James' death.

The body of golden-haired Mary James was found face downward in a lily pond in the back yard of the James home last August 5. Her death was officially pronounced accidental.

James and his pretty 21-year old niece, Lois Wright, with whom he lived, were taken into custody. James was convicted of incest.

Then, with startling abruptness, Charles Hope told his strange story that to collect on Mrs. James' life insurance, James thrust her head into a box containing a rattlesnake, and later drowned her.

Jailors found a safety razor blade hidden in James' cell today. Once during the five weeks of his trial, James exclaimed: "If I had a good straight razor I would save the state a lot of trouble."

Turnkeys reported the blade was concealed in James' mattress.
