CREEK GIVEN NEW BIRTH BY QUAKE

SALEM, July 27.—(AP)—The recent earthquake in the Walla Walla district started a flow of water in Dry creek which had been dry up to that time and is normally dry this time of the year, Charles E. Stricklin, state engineer, reported today after a survey of that section. The phenomenon will be watched to ascertain whether or not the earth rumbling opened up an underground source or just a reservoir, Stricklin said. Dry creek has its source in northern Umatilla county and flows into the Walla Walla river in Washington.

FT. STEVENS HELD VULNERABLE TO FOE

ASTORIA, July 27.—(AP)—Fort Stevens, coast defense position of the army near the mouth of the Columbia river, is vulnerable both to hostile naval vessels and air forces, high-ranking officers of the northwest national guard said after a three-week study of military problems here. The officers, working out a defense maneuver for the Columbia river mouth, showed a retreat would be necessary from Fort Stevens to the island. If they were unable to hold the fort and the beach north of Seaside, forces would retire to a position east of Young's river and along the entire Astoria peninsula, with field artillery raising the intervening ground to the ocean to prevent enemy movements up the river.
