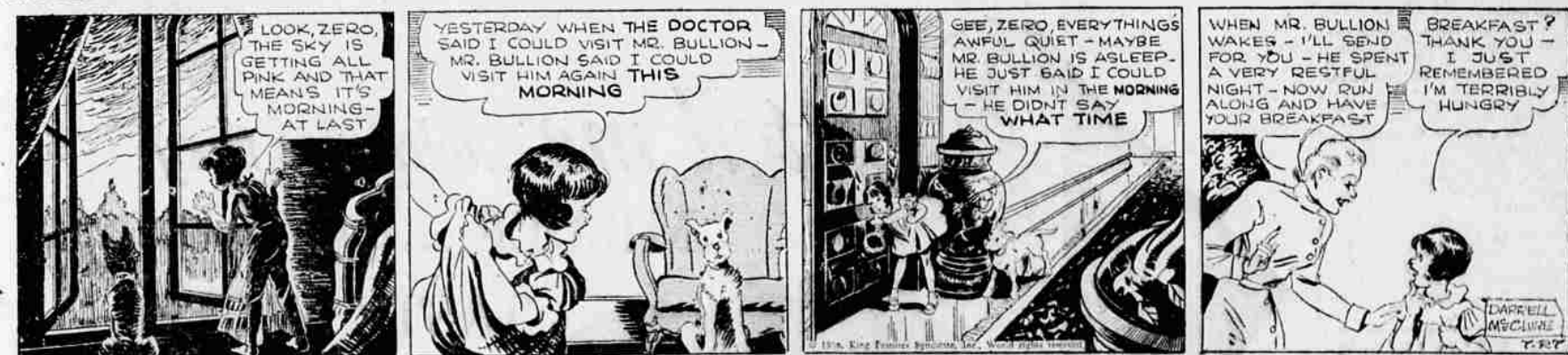

POLLY AND HER PALS



Two Comets Now Offer Rare Picture In Astronomy; One Located by Peltier Is Visible Without Use of Telescope

BOSTON, July 27.—(AP)—Two comets now are visible at night to the naked eye, offering one of the rarest spectacles in astronomy.

The comets are the first visible without the use of telescopes since Halley's comet appeared 26 years ago. It is not the first recorded appearance of two comets simultaneously, for in 1852 twin comets were observed less than 2,000,000 miles apart.

Few persons other than astronomers have seen the comets which may be observed tonight. They have come into the range of the naked eye only in the last few days.

The brightest of the pair, discovered by Leslie Peltier, amateur astronomer of Delphos, Ohio, can be seen easily in the northeast beginning about 9 p. m.

The other comet is visible in the west immediately after sundown. Discovered by a Japanese amateur astronomer, Sigura Kaho, only four days ago, it is a very faint patch of light hardly more than faint star size.

This comet is 93,000,000 miles away from the earth, already has passed the sun, and is believed moving away so that it may not be visible more than a few days longer.

Easy Way to Locate
The easiest way to locate Peltier's comet in the northeast is to look for the constellation Cassiopeia, a little more than halfway down toward the horizon. Cassiopeia is five stars forming the letter "W" with its open side pointed down toward the horizon.

The comet lies above Cassiopeia's right-hand line up toward the zenith. It should be about halfway between the horizon and zenith by 9 p. m. An aid to locating it is a bright star about ten degrees above Cassiopeia. The comet appears about halfway between this star and Cassiopeia's right arm.

The comet, of the brightness and shape of a medium star, is slightly elongated, indicating the formation of its tail in its rush toward the sun. Whether sufficient tail will be formed to make a good spectacle still is unknown. In the telescopes its tail is distinct now, but very short.

It appears certain for the northern hemisphere the comet will dim slightly before August 4, because it will be so low in the south then the atmosphere will interfere with good visibility.

The Japanese comet has a tail visible only in the telescopes but fully one degree in length.

The best guess of astronomers is that a comet is a loose collection of stones and chunks of metal. Stones in a very stony field furnish a good example of the density of such heavenly objects.

Mathematical calculations show the separate stones can live and travel together and still travel together, held by gravitation.

Sun "Captures" Many
In their journey many are "captured" by the sun's larger planets—Jupiter, Saturn and Uranus. These three planets are giants and their gravitational pull is sufficient to deflect a comet passing close to them.

The deflection changes into ellipses, the natural paths that would take comets past the sun and out into space never to return. In elliptical paths they travel around the sun and make regular return visits.

Some comets' heads are spread over fields larger than the earth's diameter. When far from the sun they have no tails.

As they approach the sun they are believed to grow hot. Their gaseous expand and split some of the stones asunder.

Then a sort of envelope or hood, the coma, develops around the head. This cloudy mass at first sinks downward toward the sun and then a singular thing occurs. The coma changes direction. It twines around, flying directly away from the sun until it attains an enormous length. Thus the tail, always turned away from the sun, is formed.

The longest recorded tail was that of the comet of 1843, estimated at 151,000,000 miles.
