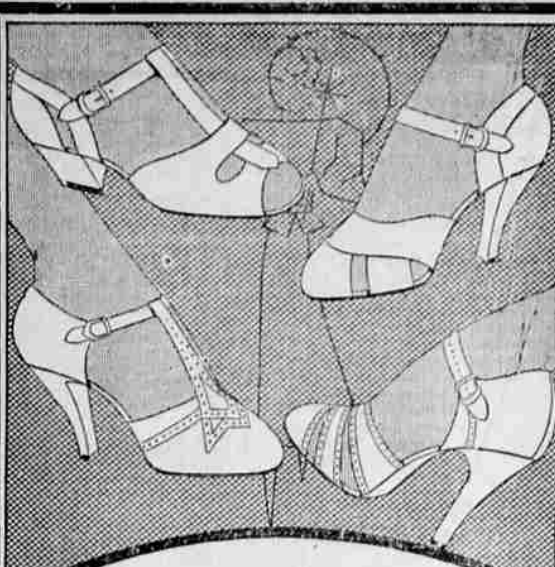

BEAVERS ONLY TWO GAMES FROM TOP

A deluge of base hits moved Portland's fast-stepping Beavers within two games of first place today in the ever-changing Pacific Coast league race.

Portland staged a seven-run rally to defeat Sacramento, 8-6, while the league-leading Seattle Indians lost an 11-inning encounter during which five home runs were scored. In the two northwest games, batters garnered a total of 55 hits.

San Diego and Los Angeles changed places at the head of the second division as the Padres beat the much-chased Seraphs, 5-1. San Francisco's intramural series was even-Stephen by the Missions' 4-3 victory over the Seals.

Oakland finished its wild contest with Seattle in impressive fashion. Bell and Anton hit homers in the eleventh inning. After Glynn homed in the first, Muller blasted his 25th of the year for the Indians to start a parade of pitchers. Hunt's fourthly swat in the eighth with two Indians on tie the score at 1-1.

Five doubles and a triple rattled the boards in Portland's park. Posedel staggered the route for the winners, and contributed to the victory by hitting a three-bagger with two on during the big sixth, when Portland scored seven runs off Andrews and Wahnock.

LONDON GIVES HIS LABOR UNION VIEWS

words?

"In my statement, which you quote, there is nothing to suggest that I am in favor of infringing in any way the right of free speech or free assembly. I am opposed to any such infringement. The workers have the right to meet among themselves or with others of their own choice to promote organization, with complete freedom from interference from anyone whatsoever. The workers should be fully protected in this right by the public authorities. This necessarily includes the right of a labor union to promote by lawful and proper means the organization of an unorganized industry, which includes the right to send in an organizer."

Kansas Action Explained

"In connection with the only serious labor disturbance that has occurred in Kansas, during my term as governor in Cherokee county in June and July, 1935, I acceded to a request, jointly preferred by the sheriff and prosecuting attorney of Cherokee county, that I send troops to maintain order. I instructed the troops through the adjutant general of Kansas to maintain order, to disarm all armed civilians, including the armed guards employed by the smelter and mine operators, and those that may have been armed in behalf of the labor groups. Guards on mine and smelter properties carrying deputy constable commissions were obliged to give up these deputy commissions. They were not permitted to carry arms off the private property where they were employed as watchmen. The troops were further instructed to preserve the peace, and secure the execution of all laws of the state of Kansas. Gunmen from other states who had made it a practice to threaten striking workers in Kansas were forced to stay out of the state.

"The troops, however, were directed not to interfere with labor meetings and other activities of the strikers, so long as they were peacefully conducted. This included picketing, and both meetings and pickets were protected from possible violence of any kind.

"My action in this instance protected the workers in the right of free speech and free assembly."

Elmer Brock and Frank Horton of Buffalo, Wyo., said: "Stockmen are for Landon, because of the antipathy of the present administration to the live stock, as shown by the reciprocal trade agreements and the apparent desire to import South American beef despite the danger of possible infection from the hoof-and-mouth disease."

Brock termed the amended Taylor grazing act "dangerous."

been requisitioned by the Catalan government after much equipment and property of the company had been destroyed in the fighting.

Many other automobiles and company buildings were burned or wrecked in the fighting before the government gained control and seized the foreign property to aid in the fight against the rebels, a General Motors executive said.

GOVERNMENT MASSING ALL MEANS OF WARFARE

MADRID, July 30.—(AP)—Loyalist Spain confiscated its merchant marine today to form an anti-fascist armada of defense and launch a desperate ground and air battle for possession of the strategic city of Zaragoza.

Leftist forces, the government announced, were driving insurgent fascists out of the Guadarrama mountains near Madrid.

In addition to giving merchant ships an official naval status, authorities summoned all military and civil fliers for orders to join in anti-fascist fights.

The boom of rebel cannon in the Guadarramas was belittled by loyalists to be a covering barrage for an insurgent retreat.

Zaragoza, Seville, Cordova and Granada still were in rebel hands, but the government claimed the insurgents were demoralized because of lack of citizen support.

Fighting Widespread

All four cities were targets, moreover, of powerful attacks by loyal planes, militiamen, troops and guards.

Gonzalez Pena, leader of the Asturian mine revolt of 1934, was at the head of several thousand miners continuing a merciless siege of the northern rebel city of Oviedo.

Madrid's defense chieftains mobilized armed sections from every class of the citizenry—even the shop girls.

Rebels holding the northern Guadarrama ridge began an intensive bombardment of government lines in reply to a loyal air raid yesterday.

Leftist commanders believed fresh supplies of ammunition were being sent to the fascist camps.

BALING WIRE DEATH REMAINS MYSTERY

PORTLAND, July 30.—(AP)—Investigation in the death of Mrs. Ada Haskins, found strangled by baling wire in Washington park Sunday, lagged today as detectives sought vainly for any slender clue on which to continue.

Two ex-convicts, Fay B. Wise and William Rae, who are being held for questioning in connection with the case, have both furnished alibis which police have been unable to shake.

Police have not yet abandoned the suicide theory, since Mrs. Haskins was said to have been ill from a communicable disease, with which her husband, who committed suicide, was also afflicted.

The rectangular auditorium was hung with flags and bunting for the occasion. A fan-shaped stage was erected in the east end to accommodate some 600 republican leaders, and distinguished guests, including Illinois candidates.
