VERNON KENNEDY WINS 10TH IN ROW

White Sox Hurler Going in Grand Form; Cubs' Lead Cut to One Game.

In a year that has the pitching boys yelling for help, baseball's "forgotten man," Vernon (No-Hitter) Kennedy, isn't finding any trouble keeping the heavy swingers in their places.

The lanky Chicago White Sox sophomore right-hander, who hit the headlines with 1935's only no-hit, no-run performance just about a year ago and has virtually dropped out of sight since then, stands out today as the most dependable pitcher in the big leagues since early June.

While such mound masters as Dizzy Dean, Carl Hubbell and Schoolboy Rowe have been taking the lion's share of glory, the ex-Oklahoma City ace has been steadily winning ball games, until, with yesterday's 7-4 triumph over the Athletics, he had a string of ten straight.

He has failed to last only one game, and has allowed an average of only slightly more than eight hits per contest.

His victory string was played a large part in boosting the White Sox into fourth place, which they held on yesterday.

Rowe Beats Yankees Schoolboy Rowe, pitching his second game in four days against the Yankees' murderers row, tightened up after a shaky start, and lasted 10 innings to give the Tigers a 5-4 decision.

Cleveland's red hot Indians, with Trosky smashing two of five homers, won their fifth straight battle, 11-8, from the Washington Senators, to clip the Yankees' pace-setting edge to 7 1/2 games.

Cubs Lose Ground The Chicago Cubs' National league lead was shaved to a single game when the fast-moving Giants made it two straight, over the champions, winning 3-1 behind Hubbell's seventh-inning pitching.

The second-place Cardinals walloped the Dodgers, 7-0, with Rookie Jim Winford allowing but four hits for the tightest pitching performance by a gas house gang moundman in weeks.

The St. Louis Browns pulled a game and a half out of the American league cellar with their second straight win over the Red Sox, 4-3.

The Pittsburgh Pirates outlasted the Boston Bees for 11 innings and outled out a 5-3 victory, while the Phillies managed a split in a doubleheader with the Reds, winning the night cap 5-4 after Hallahan shut them out 5-0 in the opener.

WOODBURN ASTIR OVER JUNIOR GAMES

WOODBURN, Ore., July 31 (AP)—Barber shops, drug stores and just about any corner in town echoed with the noise of baseball today as this city settled down to playing host for the 1936 Oregon Legion Junior league baseball championships.

Teams from Portland, Eugene and The Dalles were scheduled to work out on the much-improved diamond this afternoon. The fourth team in the playoffs is Woodburn. Tonight, players, officials and scores of visitors will attend the welcome banquet at which pairings will be determined for the initial games tomorrow. The first game will start at 1:30 p. m. At the same hour Sunday, losers in the first day's play will meet in a consolation contest. The state title game will follow.

The El Rey (Jefferson high) team of Portland won its way to the play-offs by defeating three other Portland nines, Sugar Coast (Grant high), Proskiat (Commerce high) and Postoffice pharmacy (Lincoln high).

The Dalles earned a place in the finals by winning from Hood River and Vale. Eugene defeated Toledo and Roseburg, and Woodburn won from Hillsboro and Astoria. Woodburn and Astoria divided the only two games played but junior league officials gave the series to the former when Astoria failed to appear for a scheduled third game.

Winner of the state title will meet the Washington state champion for regional honors during the American Legion convention at Roseburg next month.

INJURY PUTS HOAG OUT FOR SEASON

DETROIT, July 31 (AP)—Myrl Hoag, New York Yankee outfielder who was hurt in a collision with Joe Dimaggio while the two were chasing a fly ball in Tuesday's game with the Detroit Tigers, remained in a serious condition today although his physician declared him "much improved" following a trephining operation.

The physician said the injury would mean Hoag's loss to his team for the season. An operation was necessary to drain a bloody fluid from the brain.
