

Olympiad Opens in Berlin Tomorrow

ATHLETES FROM 53 NATIONS WILL VIE

Interest Centers in Triple-Threat Jesse Owens. Top American Entrant.

BERLIN, July 31.—(AP)—Under the most extraordinary circumstances ever marking the world's largest athletic show, the games of the eleventh Olympiad will be launched tomorrow by the best mass demonstration Nazi Germany can produce for the occasion.

Close to a half million persons including a capacity gathering of 100,000 at the main stadium and 225,000 at the outdoor arenas, probably will see and hear the ceremonies leading to the formal opening by Adolf Hitler.

As the climax of a full day's program, including youth demonstrations, ceremonies at the grave of the unknown soldier, the arrival of the Olympic torch bearer from Greece, about 4,500 athletes, from 53 nations will hear Rudolph Ismayr, Bavarian weight lifter and Olympic middleweight champion, take the Olympic oath in their behalf.

What the picture will reveal after the flag waving subsides and the diplomats retire to the background remains to be seen.

Goebbels in "Sales Talk"
Feted on the eve of the games 1,200 newspapermen from all parts of the world heard Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, minister of propaganda, deliver a remarkably frank speech denying any propaganda motives were connected with the games, yet declaring the critical stories about the "new Germany" spread outside by "emigrants."

He invited the sports writers in effect not to concentrate on the games themselves but to observe Germany "as it actually is" and tell the world about it.

The United States will defend Olympic team titles in eight branches: Men's and women's track and field, women's swimming, rowing, boxing, catch-as-catch-can wrestling, equestrian sports and yachting.

Competition Keener
Except in men's track, where the balanced American power appears certain to prevail, there is not a "dunch" for the Star Spangled Banner performers on this list.

Not only will most European countries present a far stronger front against the Americans than four years ago, when the distance and the depression curtailed participation, but Latin American and far eastern talent promises to cut more heavily than ever into the synthetic scoring column.

The athlete of the hour, as far as public interest is concerned, is America's triple-threat Jesse Owens.

The Buckeye Bullet begins four successive days of competition Sunday with the 100 meter trials, but the only thing he is worried about is that he will have nothing to do but relax and take a human holiday the last four days of the track program.

executive objected to accounts of his recent vacation cruise in Canadian waters which said he was to be accorded in Canada all the honors customarily rendered to a "foreign ruler."

"Your excellency," he said, turning to Lord Tweedsmuir, "I am grateful for the honors; but something within me rebelled at the word 'foreign'."

"I say this because when I have been in Canada I have never heard a Canadian refer to an American as a 'foreigner.' He is just an 'American.' And in the same way, in the United States Canadians are not 'foreigners,' they are 'Canadians.'"

"That simple little distinction," he added, "illustrated to me better than anything else the relationship between our two countries."

"On both sides of the line we are so accustomed to an undefined boundary three thousand miles long that we are inclined to minimize its vast importance, not only to our own continuing relations but also to the example which it sets to the other nations of the world."

After emphasizing the fact that hundreds of thousands of Americans and Canadians visit each other every year without the use of passports, and calling for "frank

dealings" between nations, he said:

"The United States and Canada and, indeed, all parts of the British empire share a democratic form of government which comes to us from common sources. We have adapted these institutions to our own needs and our special conditions, but fundamentally they are the same."

War Heroes Eulogized

The president said Quebec had a fascination for him and many of his countrymen because the plains of Abraham and the cliffs which lead to them "are eternal memorials to brave French, to brave British, and to brave American colonists who have fallen in battle, be it in victory or in defeat."

"Yet there is a nobler monument," he continued, "for on these fields of battle was born the living miracle which we are privileged to see today—two great races in peace and friendship, each contributing its particular genius in the molding of a nation."

"This is a monument worthy of those who gave their lives; this is an example from which all thinking men draw deep satisfaction and inspiration."

Near the end of his speech, the president gave a demonstration of his fluent French in thanking Mayor Grogg for the "warmth of your welcome."

He said the yearly exchanges of visits by Americans and Canadians would "tighten the close bonds which already unite our two peoples."

three generations."

Senator Steiwer said: "The new deal is not a political party. It is a political faction which has abandoned the traditions and repudiated the principles of a great political party. This faction has been willing to wage untried theories against the safety of our institutions and the welfare of our people. The final result is \$14,000,000,000 increased public debt and 11,000,000 still unemployed."

"The safety and well-being of our country is not promoted by new deal policies in which first consideration is given to any special groups or classes. Much less is our well-being promoted by would-be political royalists who, to perpetuate their own power, are willing to array class against class, in a nation which has never recognized class."

Two Ways Charted
Col. Knox charted two courses for the electorate:

"One lies along the valley of a rectitudinal road maintained by a paternalistic government, which falsely promises a security that men were wont to purchase with their own efforts."

"The other lies along the rugged heights to self support, self government and self respect."

"Next November, you will choose the American way."

"The people know," he stated, "that with the election of a new administration the damned-up forces of recovery will burst forth in a magnificent prosperity."

The nominee said the republican party recognized that changing social and economic conditions called for increased federal activities, "but insists that such new activities shall be legalized by proper constitutional amendment."

He referred to the issues in the party's platform and added: "Where the specific program is not definitely outlined the details will be represented in the coming campaign."

In this connection, Col. Knox has mapped a coast-to-coast speaking itinerary beginning early next month.

Hysteria Proves Burden

"In every election the people must decide whether they shall say: 'Well done, thou good and faithful servant,' Knox said.

"In this first and ordinary issue the present administration is found wanting."

"It has failed to meet its responsibility for the orderly, economical, and sound administration of the affairs of the nation."

"From the day it took office it embarked on a series of hysterical experiments on the economic life of a huddled people."

The new deal, Colonel Knox said, "began with a proposal for a belt of trees in a territory that have trees" and "is ending with the use of public funds to conduct classes in tap dancing."

"The republican party," said the vice-presidential aspirant, "does not promise to solve all the problems that you face."

"It does promise a fair and honest government. It does promise that the government will be as economical and efficient as can be made. It does promise to make every effort to install sensible and practical measures to help in the solution of the problems of trade and industry and agriculture, the problems of poverty and insecurity."

It will be the second comeback fight for Corbett, one time welterweight champion. The southpaw, 31, knocked out Johnny Dias of Massachusetts three weeks ago. He believes a clean win over Bazzzone will get him a bout with Jimmy McLarnin.

BASEBALL ASSN. FOR ROSEBURG PLANNED

A proposal for a baseball association to represent all organizations participating in baseball activities is to be made as a governing body for next year, according to Dr. H. B. Scofield, one of the sponsors of the plan.

The association would include sponsors of hardball, softball and Legion Junior teams, and would act to coordinate the activities of the several groups.

The present situation, Dr. Scofield states, causes much confusion, particularly through conflicting dates for games, use of the field for practice purposes, etc., and the association, by directing these matters would eliminate such confusion.

"Increased interest in baseball in Roseburg," Dr. Scofield said, "justifies every effort to bring to fans the best possible type of ball. Taxpayers have a large investment in the athletic field, and costs of construction, improvement and maintenance are paid by a percentage of rate receipts paid to the school board.
