OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

PORTLAND, July 30.—(AP)—Picketing of the German consulate here ended abruptly with the arrest of William F. Heava on charges of displaying a banner. He was released on \$10 bail. The picketing was ordered by the seamen's union local as a protest of the arrest in Germany of an American seaman, Lawrence Simpson, on charges of possessing anti-Nazi literature.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 30.—(AP)—Claude McCulloch of Klam-

ath Falls, state chairman of the democratic central committee, named Evan Reames of Medford to head the executive council of the group. Other members include James D. Burns, Gilliam county; Harry Deavin, Klamath; Dr. I. R. Fox, Lane; Charles Leavitt, Marion; A. M. Dalrymple, Marion; and Karl S. Paucette, Wallowa.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 30.—(AP)—Manuscripts, relics and newspapers arrived in the hands of Postmaster G. W. Leslie today to be placed in the cornerstone of Marshfield's new postoffice at dedication ceremonies Saturday. Governor Charles Martin is expected to attend.

McMINNVILLE, July 30.—(AP)—The Oregon Mutual Fire Insurance company reported a 15 per cent gain in assets and surplus over 1935 in its June 30 statement. Assets increased from \$1,015,444 to \$1,174,000, while surplus advanced from \$398,810 to \$458,978. "We are experiencing the best summer in the company's history," L. M. Waugaman, secretary, said.

WALLA WALLA, July 30.—(AP)—J. H. Samuel, of Milton, was still in a critical condition today from a gunshot wound in his head inflicted, relatives said, accidentally two days ago. He was shot while preparing to shoot pigeons near his barn. He was still unconscious during the night.

BONNEVILLE, Ore., July 30.—(AP)—The \$25,000 government power launch Sandy appeared relatively little the worse for its plunge into the Columbia river today. A "hope cast" by engineers hooked the Sandy at the bottom of Bradford slough. It was raised immediately and placed in drydock. It was estimated minor repairs would take a month. The Sandy plunged downward into the water last week when a tow-line tightened.

GRANTS PASS, July 30.—(AP)—Clarence Burke yesterday entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of murdering Roland Burr two years ago. He will be tried in September. Burke, 47, is under indictment for first degree murder April 26, 1934, at his lookout point cabin near Howard creek, 40 miles down the Rogue river from Grants Pass. He was arrested in California a few weeks ago.
