Mrs. Olive McKee and Mrs. George Coons and granddaughter, Jackie Uplegraff transacted business in Roseburg Tuesday.

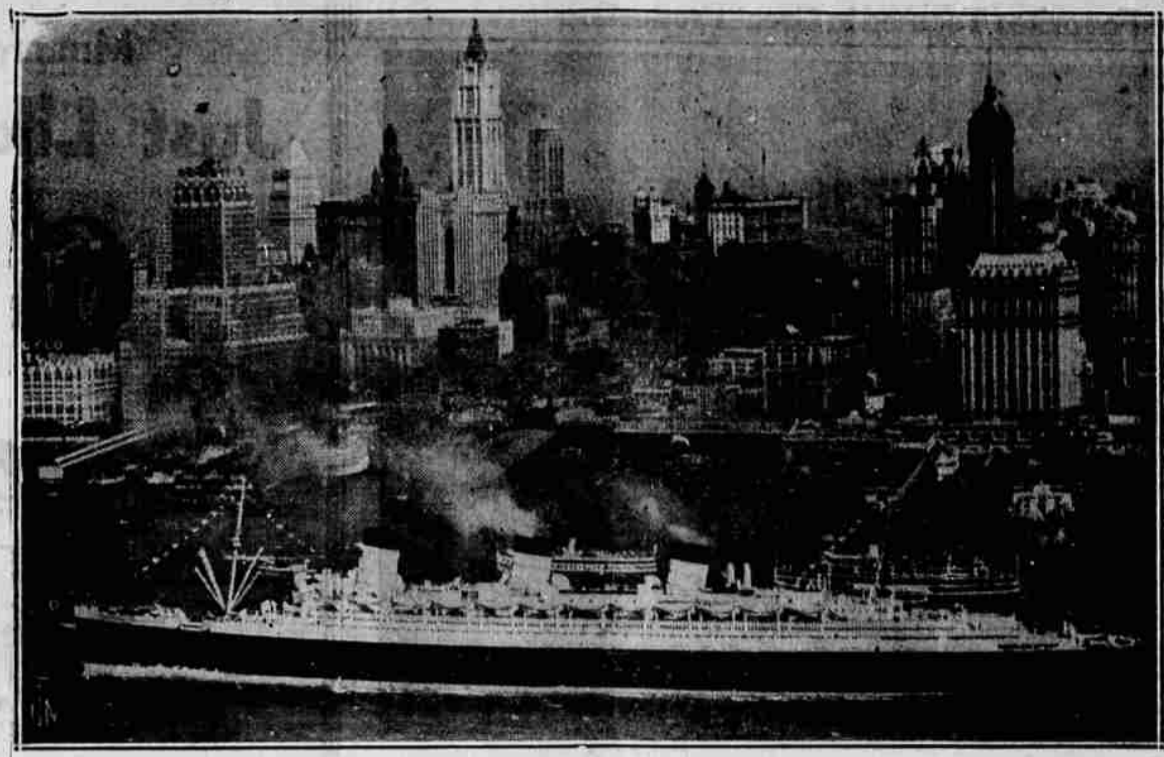

Strife in Spain Only One of Many Signs Heraldng Approach of Next World War

More Sore Spots Now than in 1914, Journalist Declares in Review of Potentous Situation on Three Continents; Europe Has Standing Army of 5,000,000 That Can Be Heavily Increased in Forty-Eight Hours.

(Editor's note: The following story on the foreign situation as it stands today is by the chief of the Associated Press foreign service, a correspondent who has spent 16 years covering the news of Europe. He returned only recently to assume the direction of the press association's foreign news report.)

By JOHN EVANS (Associated Press Foreign Chief.) NEW YORK, Aug. 1.—(AP)—Fascist banners over more than half of Spain, riotous in civil war, proclaim anew the dangers of a coming war.

Statements warnings and international conferences point out dangers which may lead to war in Germany's demand for "expansion."

Italy's effort to revive the old Roman empire, the chiefs of Japan's spread into China and Mongolia.

Soviet Russia's fear of Japan and Germany. France's belief that Germany intends a war of conquest.

Austria's belief that Hitler seeks control of southwestern Europe.

The little entente (Rumania, Yugoslavia and Czechoslovakia) declaration that German seizure of Austria means war.

Great Britain's conviction she must arm to protect her empire. German Nazi control of the free city of Danzig, capital of the Polish corridor which divides Germany into two parts.

Military experts credit Russia and Italy with more than 1,000,000 soldiers each. They calculate Europe has a standing army of more than 5,000,000 and 8,000,000 more available in 48 hours.

The world finally put 74,000,000 men under arms during the great war. Death took one of them every 15 seconds.

There is war on a virtual state of war on two continents—Europe, Asia and Africa.

In 1914 are more sore spots than in 1914 and far more prospect of an approaching conflict.

Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, sensing the dangers, warned the world also of war's unrelenting terrors when he told German Nazi aviators in Berlin Thursday that aerial warfare had "stripped the armor from every nation in war."

Musolini and Stalin, chiefs of fascist and communist states, are only two of many statesmen who talk of war. In every country, leaders and their peoples say they "don't want war" but the great majority see it coming.

Clashes over territory furnish reasons enough to them for their fears but daily there grows ominously the age-old clash between the "right" and the "left."

Spain's Turmoil. Fascism is the nucleus of the "right" in Spain. Fascism there groups monarchists, advocates a return to the Bourbon bridge Sunday. From there they motored to Reedsport and Florence.
