

CLEVELAND THREAT HALTED BY YANKEES

League Leaders' Swatfest
Wins, 11-7; Larry French
Stops N. Y. Giants.

One big reason that pennant-bound Yankees are making a run away of the current American league race lies in their simple method of knocking off their closest rivals, just when the second-place club begins to get tough.

The Red Sox became trouble-some about a month ago. So much so, meeting them just at the time, ended the threat by taking four straight. The Sox haven't been the same since.

The crippled Detroit Tigers then stepped into second place. Gehrig and company stopped them cold by winning three out of four.

The Cleveland Indians travelling at a pace that had cut the league lead of Gehrig and company from 10 1/2 games to 7 1/2 ran up against the Yankees yesterday.

The Yankees pounded out 16 hits, including home number 23 for Lou Gehrig, and piled up an 11 to 7 winning margin in the first of a three-game series to boost their pace-setting edge to 8 1/2 games.

The Indians' edge over the third-place Red Sox was cut to three games, Boston, with Jimmy Foxx belting his 30th homer, trouncing the White Sox 7 to 3, behind Lefty Grove's seven-hit pitching.

The Tigers returned to fourth place, dropping the White Sox into the second division, by walloping the Senators 8 to 2, as Tommy Bridges limited the opposition to eight hits.

The St. Louis Browns, pulling farther out of the cellar almost daily, belted the Athletics 12-4, with Sunny Jim Bottomley collecting a pair of home runs.

French Stops Giants

The Chicago Cubs salvaged something from their three-game series with the Giants by winning the finale, 3-1. Larry French, the first Cub hurler able to stop the New Yorkers in the series, turned in a four-hit job.

The Cardinals remained just one game off the National league pace, by making it three straight over the Dodgers. Dizzy Dean won his own ball game by singling in the winning runs in the ninth inning.

The Phillies and Reds split a doubleheader, Peaches Davis pitching a six-hit, 12-2 win for the winners in the opener, and Dolph Camilli's homer leading the way to a 7-2 Phil triumph in the nightcap.

Berger hit two homers for the Boston Bees, but the Pirates pecked away at a pair of pitchers for a 10-5 decision.

Lewis, 178 1/2, closed with a rush to win the last four rounds to overcome an early lead piled up by Gainer, who weighed 177.

The two negroes fought on even terms until the sixth round when Gainer opened a deep gash over the champion's eye.

Gainer forced the fight in the seventh, but Lewis rallied in the eighth and launched a fast, two-fisted attack to win the closing rounds and the decision.

Roseburg Inspection Invited When Film Studio on Wheels Visits City Monday



Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer Traveling Motion Picture Studio on World Tour

Fascinating secrets of sound recording and projection of talking motion pictures will be revealed to the general public for the first time next Monday, when Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's elaborate traveling motion picture studio visits this city on its world educational exhibition tour.

The traveling motion picture studio, which was designed and constructed to specifications by the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer company, world's largest motion picture producing organization, at a cost of \$150,000, will be placed on exhibition from 4 until 6 o'clock at the Indian theatre, home here of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer pictures, according to an announcement made today by Manager Don Radabaugh.

It is the regulation Western Electric apparatus used in the Hollywood studios and in principal theatres throughout the country.

During the studio's brief visit here, this equipment will be open for public inspection by citizens of this city. They will be permitted to enter the studio, and will have an opportunity not only of seeing the equipment which makes the talking talk, but will be able to see the operations manifested in both the filming as well as the projection of sound films on the

OLYMPIAD OPENING MARRED BY RAIN

BERLIN, Aug. 1.—(AP)—An overflow crowd of 105,000 spectators packed the main stadium today as Chancellor Hitler arrived at the reichsportfeld to declare the 11th Olympic games formally opened.

The huge crowd, unimpressed by a heavy downpour, roared a greeting and gave the Nazi salute.

Overnight the Americans, ostensibly motivated by a desire to avoid giving the equivalent of the Nazi salute, changed plans for their part in the parade of the athletes of 53 nations before Chancellor Adolf Hitler.

Instead of extending their right arms outward at an upward angle with their hats in their hands, they decided instead to hold their hats over their heads, then gave an "eyes right" salute at a given command while passing in review behind the flagbearer, Alfred Jochem, veteran Union City, N. J., gymnast.

The British, following the French, evoked only mild cheers as they marched past, giving only "eyes right." The Italians lifted their hands in the fascist salute.

The Japanese leaders gave the military salute as the athletes gave "eyes right." The Canadians were given an ovation after saluting in Nazi fashion.

A big Austrian team of 200 aroused another outburst of Nazi saluting although a dozen officers gave only the military salute. The significance was quickly marked inasmuch that until the recent Austro-German accord, it was a prison offense in Austria to give the Nazi salute.

In addition to the studio itself, which measures more than 65 feet in length, and which is hauled by a gigantic trackless locomotive, the studio caravan from Hollywood consists of a special-built camera car and pilot car.

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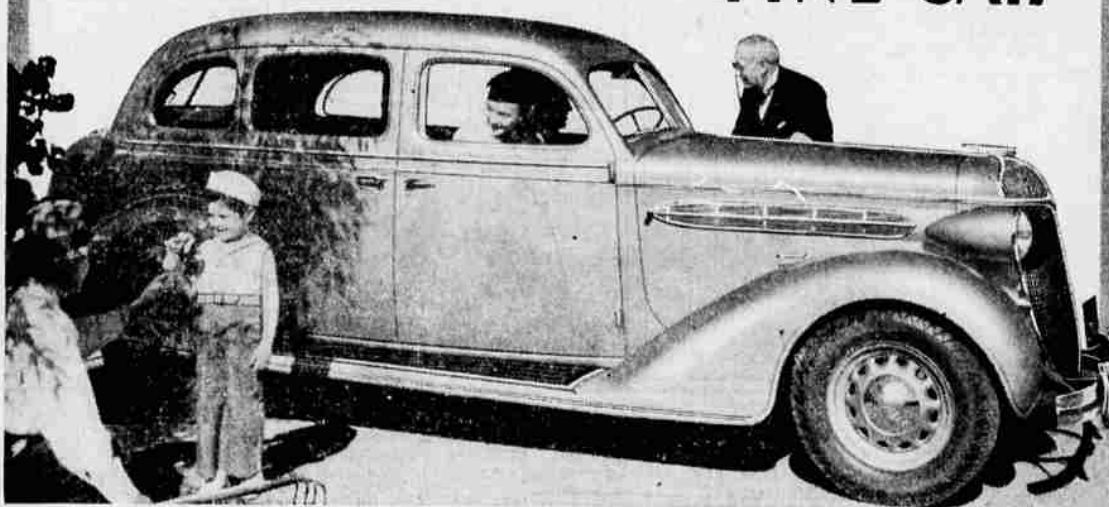
