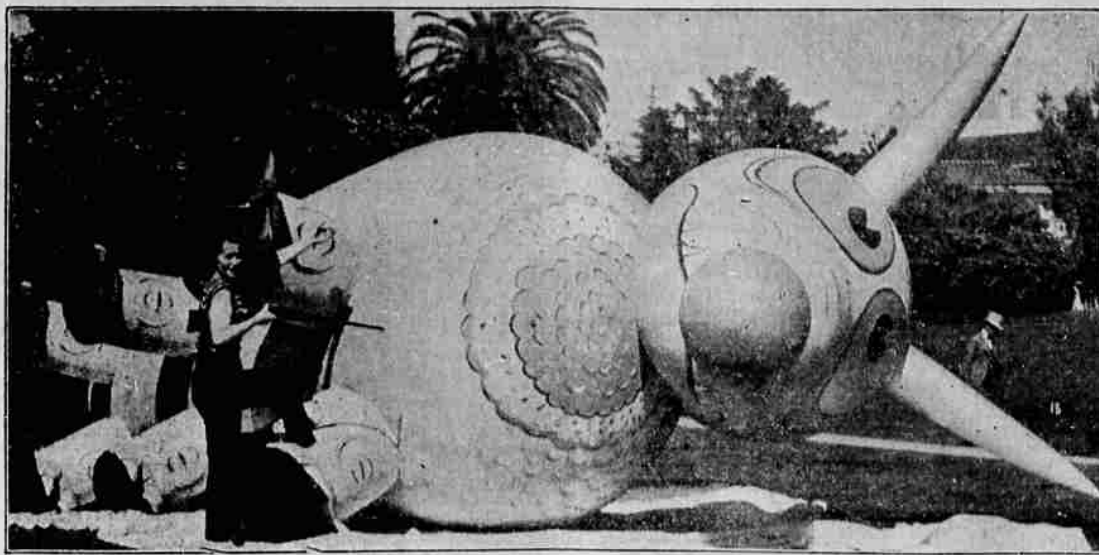

Dissolve lemon Jello in hot liquid. (Add cheese to hot soup and beat until melted). Add to hot soup. Let mold in individual molds. Turn out on lettuce. Top with mayonnaise.
