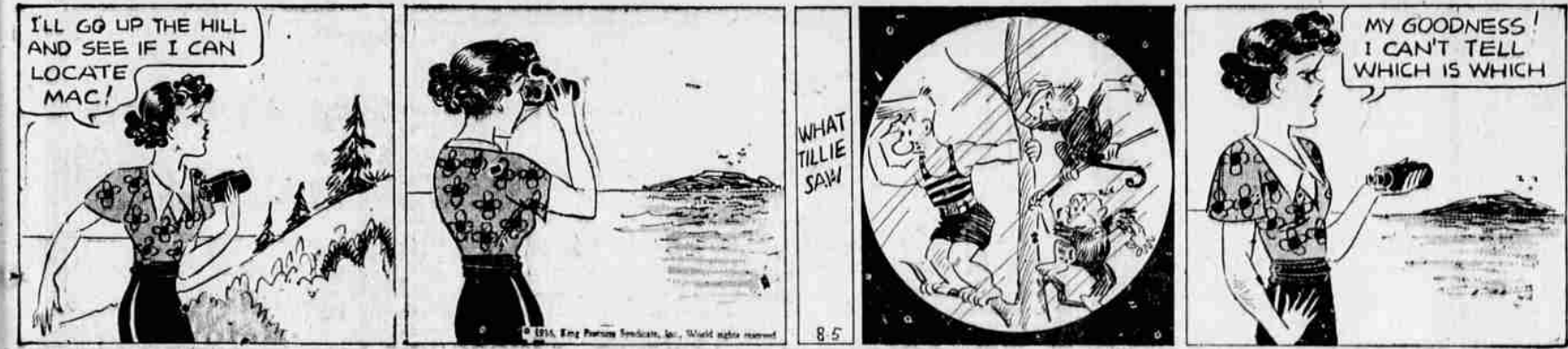

POLLY AND HER PALS

ARGUMENTS FILED
ON SIX MEASURES

SALEM, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Arguments in support of six initiative measures and constitutional amendments on the November election ballot were in the hands of the secretary of state when time for filing expired late yesterday. Two weeks remain in which to file negative arguments.

Initiative measures and constitutional amendments, for which affirmative arguments were filed, follow:

The so-called state power measure sponsored by Oregon State Grange and Oregon Federation of Labor.

Provision for temporary administration of the state power act, pending election of a permanent power commission.

Prohibiting legislation against truthful advertising.

Prohibiting use of traps and other set gears in the Columbia river and its tributaries.

Limiting taxes on real and personal property.

All arguments, both affirmative and negative, will be printed in the voter's pamphlet, to be issued prior to the general election.

ROGUE RIVER PEAR
PACKERIES START

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP)—The packing plants of the Rogue river valley opened today for the 1936 crop of Bartlett pears. Harvesting started Tuesday in the earlier orchards, and will be in full swing in all orchards next week.

There is no change in the Bartlett canning price situation. The buyers have not yet offered any price. The Myron E. Root packing plant announces that it is purchasing Bartlett pears at \$27.50 per ton for No. 1 sizes.

A week ago a price of \$28.75 per ton was offered by a California cannery, and a small tonnage bought at this price. Buying then lagged.

EARLIEST LIVING
OSC "GRAD" PASSES

CORVALLIS, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Mrs. Mary H. Whitby, 80, earliest living graduate of Oregon State college, died today after a paralytic stroke suffered several weeks ago. She was a member of the class of 1871. Her death makes Mrs. Clara T. Harding, San Diego, of the class of '73, the earliest living graduate.

FISH CANNERY'S
OPENING HALTED

NORTH BEND, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Prospects appeared unfavorable today to the opening of fish cannery operations at the Pacific Sea Products corporation, after J. D. Mickle, head of the state food

and dairy division, voiced criticism hinging around the carrying on of canning work in the same plant in which fish are made into fertilizer.

Officials of the plant, in the absence of K. Hovden, president, expressed the belief it was too late in the season to install equipment necessary to meet the state's requirements.

Forty women would be employed in the canning operations, for which machinery has been set up and \$,000 cans made ready.

U. S. SPENDING ORGY
WORRIES BUSINESS

PORTLAND, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Harper Sibley, president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, in commenting on the new deal here, said the national chamber "supports part of it; opposes other parts."

He commented that "the part we support you don't hear about, but the part we worry about is well known, that is—the excessive expenditures of the government without regard to income."

Sibley commented that "I would say business is better but a lot of us feel that the foundations under it are not as substantial as we would like to have them be."

LAND BOARD AGAIN
ON LOANING BASIS

SALEM, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The state land board, for the first time in several years, found itself in a position today to consider applications for new loans.

Loans are made on a one-third appraised valuation and carry interest of five per cent and two per cent on the principal. The loans are paid off under an amortization plan in 25 years.

P. Griffith, clerk of the land board, said approximately \$115,000 was available at this time. Only preferred loans will be authorized by the board.

MURDERER HALL'S
DEATH DATE FIXED

PORT ORCHARD, Wash., Aug. 4.—(AP)—Superior Judge H. G. Sutton signed a death warrant today setting September 11 as the date on which Leo Hall, convicted murderer, will hang at the Walla Walla state penitentiary. Hall, now in the penitentiary "death row," was convicted of the slaying of Eugene Chenevert, one of six persons killed in the Portland "mass murders" a year and a half ago.
