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CARDINALS REGAIN LEAD IN NATIONAL

Mize's Great Batting Big
Factor in Offsetting
Weak Pitching.

They ought to frame Johnny Mize's big bat out in St. Louis. It shot the gas house gang right back into the pennant picture again.

When Frisch benched Rip Collins because of his hitting slump two weeks ago and turned first base over to Rookie Johnny, the Cards were a slipping outfit.

Today, they're in first place in the National League.

Mize produced as well, in fact, that he's the number one man in the league batting race. And, with the Cardinal pitching staff cut down to just Dizzy Dean—beginning to show signs of strain—the gas house gang needed above all else a hit producer.

Since Mize took over first base 11 games ago, he and Ducky Medwick have combined to lead the way to seven victories.

In that time, he has been batting at a .438 pace, has driven in four runs and has hammered out four homers and half a dozen doubles.

Cubs Are Victims.

The gas house sank the Chicago champion Cubs into second place with a 6-1 decision. Mize, the Rochester Rookie the Cincinnati Reds couldn't use last year and turned back to the Cards, clubbed out a homer with two on, a double and two singles to account for four of the six St. Louis runs.

The victory put the Cards a full game in front of the Cubs, and 54 ahead of the Giants, who scored a 4-1 victory over the Boston Bees, largely through Ott, who crashed his 22nd and 23rd homers out of the lot.

The Dodgers and Phillies put on one of their customary slam-bang affairs, with the Brooklyn Just mauling to last for a 6-5 edge, as Chuck Fletch's homer with two on in the ninth all but tied the score. Rain forced postponement of the Pittsburgh-Cincinnati night game.

Yanks Break Jinx.

The Yankees, with Ruffing leading up his 15th pitching victory of the season, broke their Lefty Grove jinx and beat the lean pitcher 4-2 for the first time since 1924, thereby increasing their American League lead to 11 full games.

Brilliant turn in a five-hit pitching trick for the Tigers to shut out the second place Indians 9-0, and enable the Chicago White Sox to move up to one game back of the tribe by downing the Browns 8-2.

Washington's Senators, still in their worst slump of the year, were unable to hit against Rhodes and Pink, and bowed to the Athletics 5-3.

The new champions are considerably younger than the title holders of the past five years, and tennis followers of the city predict that they will be able to hold the crown for several years if they elect to continue their team.

of Chicago, who trailed Owens across the finish line. Today it was Matthew Robinson of Pasadena, Calif., who equaled Owens' former Olympic mark of 21.1 seconds. He was two meters behind.

Just as Owens finished across the finish it started to rain and Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler, who has been a constant spectator, left the stadium. The downpour quickened but the crowd stuck through it, cheering wildly.

U. S. Total Boosted to 113

The conquest by Owens and Robinson in the 200 following the one-two finish by Carpenter and Gordon (Singer) Dunn of Fresno, Calif., in the discus ran up the United States' first places to seven and total points to 113 in ten events.

There never was the slightest question about Owens' supremacy through his four days of competition. He was only challenged in the broad jump and then he bore down hard, boosting the Olympic record to 28 feet 5 21/32 inches.

He ran his quarterfinal heat in the 100 in 10.2 seconds, clipping one-tenth of a second from the world and Olympic record. Officials, however, disallowed it as a record because there was a favoring wind. But Jesse won the century title in record-equaling time of 10.3.

Carpenter hurled the discus 50.48 meters, 165 feet, 7 23/32 inches.

Qualifying Events

Forrest (Spec) Towns of Augusta, Ga., America's ace high jumper, Fritz Pollard Jr., Chicago negro, and Ray Staley of Corona, Calif., won their heats in the 100-meter hurdle trials.

Glenn Cunningham of Lawrence, Kans., ran second to Eric Ny, trailing the Swedish star by two feet in the 1,500-meter trials. They were so close at the finish both were clocked in 3 minutes 54.8 seconds.

The Kansan never extended himself and was satisfied as he qualified comfortably for the final tomorrow.

Gene Venzke of Philadelphia qualified in the second heat, crossing the finish line with John Carpenter of Great Britain and Jack Lovelock, a fastidious New Zealand fashions, in a team like fashion.

John Woodruff proved just as wide-eyed and puzzled looking as ever while running about \$20 meters to win the 800-meters title. He came in for the customary razzing because he kept running around the field to take the lead, then dropping back before he finally turned on the juice in the stretch.

**DOG PAROLED ON
'MURDER' CHARGE**

BROCKPORT, N. Y., Aug. 5.—(AP)—The mongrel dog, Idaho, which has been accused of the murder of a swimming boy, was returned to his owner by Justice of the Peace Homer T. Benedict today for confinement until October 1, 1937.

Under the verdict death is to be the penalty of freedom during the interim.

Idaho was tried in a crowded village hall for the drowning of 14-year-old Maxwell Brown, who sank in the large canal July 1 while a dog was swimming him.

The judge made no reference to what will happen to Idaho after October 1, 1937, and this was taken to mean that the dog will then go free.

PORTLAND CLOSER TO TOP OF LEAGUE

San Diego moved into a tie for fourth place by trouncing the league leading Seattle Indians, 7-4. Portland maintained its winning pace by coming from behind to beat the San Francisco Missions, 7-4.

The Beaver victory and Seattle loss placed Portland within a game and a half of first place.

Oakland lost third place ground by succumbing to the San Francisco Seals, 5-3. Los Angeles and Sacramento were idle.

The Missions pounced on their old pitching member, Caster, and had Portland in the hole 4-0 before the second inning started. Radomits took over the situation and for eight frames limited the Reds
