

CARDINALS BOOST LEAD IN NATIONAL

Another Defeat Handed to
Cubs, Now Being Closely
Pressed by Giants.

OTT crashed out two homers yesterday to give the Giants an 8 to 4 decision over the Boston Bees. The victory was the New Yorkers' 17th in their last 21 starts, and enabled them to move up to 33 games from the second place (and still slipping) Cubs in the National league race.

The Cubs' hitting situation became more alarming than ever, as Parmelee limited them to five hits and the Cardinals made it two in a row over the Chicago champions, with a 4-1 win that boosted the red house gang two full games in front of the pack.

The Dodgers reached the last rung before climbing all the way out of the National league cellar by hitting timely behind Prandty's nine-hit pitching and knocking off the Phillies 7-3 for the second straight day.

This left the Phils with a slim half-game hold on seventh place. The Pirates and Reds battled it out in a tight night-game duel at Cincinnati, the Reds losing out 6-4 through a four-run Red rally in the seventh.

Kennedy's Streak Halted.
In the American league, the lowly St. Louis Browns ruined Kennedy's ten-game winning streak with a 1-4 victory over the White Sox in the opener of a double-header. Rain halted the nightcap in the seventh, with the score knotted at 9-all.

The Yankees, paced by Di Maggio's homer and double, driving in two runs, maintained their 11-game league lead with a 7-2 margin over the Red Sox.

The second-place Cleveland Indians managed at last to save something from the wreckage of their current series with the Tigers, landing on Anker for three runs in the tenth inning and a 6-4 decision.

Catching the staggering Senators again, the Athletics made it in a row with a 9-0 win, Bob Johnson nailing the 14-hit attack with a triple and two singles, accounting for three runs.

FORESTERS WIN IN LAST FRAME RALLY

The Forest Service ball handlers in the city softball league nearly lost their unbroken record of victories for the season when the Eagles lodge put them 6 to 3 in the hole in the 7th and final inning of the game played last night. RIVAL LABOR UNITS FACE FINISH FIGHT

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to organize mass production workers into huge industrial unions, regardless of craft lines.

"We will not disband the committee for industrial organization," he announced. "The decision of the executive council will not change the policy of the C. I. O., nor will it have any effect upon the organizing activities of the committee."

The executive council, whose craft members do not like the Lewis method of overlooking craft lines in organizing work, accused Lewis of violating labor by forming the C. I. O. as a rival to existing A. F. of L. unions.

"Those who split and divide labor through the creation of a dual movement must accept responsibility for their action," the "verdict" said. It described Lewis and his associates as "ambitious men" bent on "enforcing the acceptance of minority rule within the A. F. of L."

Lewis flared back that the council's action was one of "incredible and gross stupidity" and that it was "dictated by personal selfishness and frantic fear." He said it "indicates a total absence of consideration for the well-being of the nation's workers" and warned that President William Green "and his confederates may continuously run it."

The manner in which Green and Lewis, far different temperaments, reacted to what may prove to be a turning point in labor history was characteristic.

A one-time student for the ministry who later turned to coal mining, Green always has prided himself on his abilities as a peace-maker and it was plain that he was deeply troubled by the big schism.

Lewis indicated that they would not go into court to challenge last night's ouster order. With a grim smile, he said:

"We might win and it would be rather a paradox to have the courts order us back into an organization where we are not welcome."

In the camp led by Green are 98 craft unions with a membership of over 2,500,000 men and women.

LABOR HEADS WON'T SPLIT.
TEAMSTERS' CHIEF SAYS
NEW YORK, Aug. 6.—(AP)—Daniel J. Tobin, president of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters, said today that "under no circumstances" will the division between craft and industrial labor unionists "divide" the leader of the labor movement who are supporting the return of the Roosevelt administration.

Tobin, one of the craft unionists of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor which voted yesterday to suspend the John L. Lewis committee for industrial organization, said it was his opinion that all but three of the 17 members of the council favored President Roosevelt's reelection and that "95 per cent of the workers, whether organized or unorganized, will support the new deal administration."

BEAVERS MUFF ON CHANCE FOR LEAD

Only a difference of five games separated the first five teams in the Pacific coast league today as the first-place Seattle Indians received another setback from San Diego's hard-driving Padres.

San Diego held third place in the standings by a one-point margin as a result of its 4-1 victory over the tribe. Portland lost a chance to take the league lead when it dropped the second game of a double-header, 2-5, after gaining a 3-2 victory over the San Francisco Missions.

Oakland remained a bare three points ahead of the fifth place Missions as Gibson pitched the San Francisco Seals to their second straight win over the Acoras, 7-3.

Sacramento and Los Angeles broke even in their double-header. Phippen blanked the Seals, 4-0, in the first, while Thomas won the second for the Angels, 5-2.

Linda blanked the Missions until the ninth, and scored two team-mates with a double in the fourth to win the Beavers' first game at night since handily, in the nightcap Linda yielded five runs, three on homers, in the second and third frames, to give Thurston all the lead he needed.

EIGHT KILLED IN AIRLINER CRASH

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Eye-Witness Talks

"When I first saw the plane it was barely off the ground and making a steep bank," Sharp said. "It appeared to be turning back for the airport."

"It went over a hill and I heard a terrible crash. The motors kept right on running."

"I looked for a fire, but there wasn't any."

The ship's clock, still running, was found shortly after dawn 100 yards from the main wreckage.

Carlton Putnam, president of the line, said the ship was checked at St. Louis and was in perfect condition.

"It was one of those things that can't happen but still did," he declared in announcing the crash.

Seven of the eight victims boarded the plane, a 10-passenger Lockheed-Electra, at St. Louis, only Omaha coming here on it. He was the husband of Phoebe Omaha, famous woman aviator.

OMIE TAUGHT HIS WIFE,
FIRST LICENSED AVIATRIX
MEMPHIS, Tenn., Aug. 6.—(AP)—Vernon C. Omie, 41, who died with seven others when a Chicago and Southern airliner crashed near St. Louis last night, was Memphis' foremost aviator and one of the most experienced pilots in the south.

He was the husband of Phoebe Fairgrave Omie, former racing flier and first woman pilot in the United States to receive a license.

Captain Omie taught his wife to fly. She now is a special assistant for air intelligence to the national advisory committee for aeronautics.

JUNIOR BASEBALL SERIES AWAITED

Wide Interest Manifested
In Playoff Dated Here;

official "Welcome" cards which will be distributed by the commission to merchants early next week, and there is no need for merchants to buy from out-of-town solicitors who are contributing nothing to the convention.

"Any solicitor sent out by or recommended by the commission, will bear cards of identification, and solicitors should be requested to show such cards if there is any doubt in the mind of the person solicited."

"The commission is endeavoring to arrange and conduct this convention with the least possible solicitation from Roseburg residents. "It was necessary before the convention was invited to this city to underwrite the expenses, and the members of the city willingly pledged themselves to contribute various amounts to meet expenses should the convention fail to pay for itself."

"We hope to be able to stage this event without asking the business men of the city to pay one cent."

"Through the consent of the city council the commission has secured control of all concessions. This was necessary in order to prevent interests which would make no contribution to the convention from slipping in and endeavoring to skim off the cream of convention business."

No Profit Sought

"The commission is not seeking to make any profit from the state meeting of the American Legion. Its sole aim is to realize enough from money-making events to pay only the actual costs. These costs are far greater than might be generally supposed, and unless the concessions and events for which admission are charged provide sufficient money to meet these expenses, it will be necessary to collect from the merchants on the pledges they have made, an action the commission earnestly desires to avoid."

"Every effort has been made by the commission to cooperate in every possible way with the merchants of the city and every purchase of supplies, materials, services, etc., has been made locally."

"It is conservatively estimated that the convention will bring \$100,000 worth of business to Roseburg during next week. We know that the figure is conservative because previous conventions in other cities have resulted in greater business with a far less attendance than is expected in Roseburg. It is the desire of the commission that Roseburg industry and business may obtain the greatest possible results from this large expenditure of money, and every effort will be directed to that end."

SPANISH REBELS
LOSE CADIZ FIGHT

ments in Spain proper for a final drive on the capital with the aid of a fleet of airplanes conveying three transport ships.

(Gen. Francisco Franco, generalissimo of the Spanish revolt, planned to capture Madrid by an encircling movement which would join insurgent troops marching from the south and the armies of Gen. Emilio Mola descending on the city from the north.)

Madrid Still Periled
Fervently, the government poured reinforcements into the Guadarrama mountain gateways in expectation of a three-way advance to halt the rebel march to Madrid.

The military masses blocked the insurgent march at El Alto del Leon—the heights of the lion—and captured the small town of Gorgona.

On the northern side of the mountainous front, rebels hastily moved men and arms into position in an equally vigorous preparation for prospective battle.

The fascists, from their high positions, were reported in sight of the capital buildings.

Reports reaching Madrid from the scene of bloody hand-to-hand fighting and artillery barrage showed no great advances by either side.

Rebel Plot Bared
As loyalists prepared for what they hoped would be a final, crushing blow to the fascist cause in the Guadarrama mountains, disclosures of an astounding nature as to the plan for the revolution were made in the capital.

Government officials, puzzled by the strength of rebel positions in the Guadarramas, said they had learned of indications that Jose Gil Robles, as minister of war, had laid plans last fall for the military strategy of the revolution.

The officials said he had ordered maneuvers in the Guadarrama area to acquaint troops loyal to him with every inch of the ground.

They added that bombproof gun emplacements had been started during the maneuvers.

(Gil Robles at the start of the revolution, from a sanctuary in France, insisted he was on vacation and had no part in the attempt to overthrow the government.)

Aerial Drive Set
Simultaneously the liberal government announced the launching of a war by air "without mercy" against the revolutionaries.

Government troops were reported within 11 miles of Zaragoza in their drive to smash the fascist military machine in northern Spain and crush the threat of a rebel advance on Madrid from this area.

The government plans to put into the air no less than 300 machines to crush the revolt.

The fascists, too, are preparing for a war in the air which their commanders believe probably will prove decisive in quelling the revolution or overthrowing Madrid's leftist government.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.—(AP)—The United States today called up on the Spanish government to provide adequate protection for American property in the revolutionary area, warning that it would expect adequate indemnification for damages suffered.

Eric C. Wendelin, charge d'affaires of the American embassy in Madrid, told Spanish foreign office officials the United States could not admit that the property of its nationals in Spain could be interfered with with impunity.

Wendelin reported after his call at the foreign office that the American representations were received with "sympathetic consideration."
