1 large can pineapple, No. 2 1/2
2 oranges
1 cup walnut meats
2 marshmallows
1 cup whipping cream
2 T. flour
2 eggs
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup oil
Drain juice from pineapple and fruit, mix flour, sugar and salt together and mix with beaten eggs. Beat into hot juice in double boiler, stirring constantly until thick and smooth. Boil 10 to 15 minutes. Let cool. When cool add whipped cream and fruit and marshmallows cut in pieces.
Make about 2 hours before serving. Add nuts shortly before serving.

ETHIOPIA PICTURED AS LAND OF GOLD

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 7.—(AP)—The Rev. L. H. Christian, one of the three vice-presidents of the Seventh Day Adventist church, told interviewers here that gold can be picked up in Ethiopia "just as it was picked up in California in the days of '49."

"Ethiopia is a fine country, one of the prettiest and most fertile in the world," Dr. Christian, who was in charge of his church's work in Europe for 14 years, said the Ethiopians "as a race about as clever mentally as any people I have ever met but they are proud and lazy." He said the Italians "are going to do great things for that country."

He referred to Europe as a tin-dredge and said "the greatest issue in Europe today is communism."
