man of Chattanooga, in his race for democratic nomination, ran up a better than six to one lead over Dr. John R. Neal of Knoxville.

The only republican race, a contest over the memorial nomination, found Wayne Maddox of Huntington leading Henry N. Camp Jr., of Knoxville, by a substantial majority.

Relatives Shoot It Out
 At the little community of Speedwell in mountainous Claiborne county, four blood relatives became involved in an argument over a sheriff's race and attempted to settle it with gunfire. Divided into two groups, they shot it out at close range.

Horace Russell, 60, a farmer, and his son, Albert Russell, 30, were killed. William Russell, 75, brother of Horace, and William's nephew, Charles Russell, were wounded.

At another precinct in Claiborne county, James A. Singleton, 52, an election officer, was shot during an argument. He died in a Knoxville hospital.

Near Hohenwald, a small middle Tennessee community, John Gray, a 55-year-old farmer, was stabbed fatally during an altercation at the polls. Another farmer was held in connection with the slaying.

Most bitterly fought of the congressional races was the fifth district three-man fight for the democratic nomination to the congressional seat held for more than 25 years by the late Speaker Joseph W. Byrnes.

With 145 of the 199 precincts in the district reported, former Prosecuting Attorney Richard M. Atkinson of Davidson county (Nashville) had 6,681; J. Carlton Loser, the present prosecutor, 5,723; and Will F. Cheek, retired Nashville business man, 4,487.

MOTHER JAILED IN DAUGHTER'S DEATH

KELSO, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Mrs. Ruth Anderson of Prosser, Wash., was in the Cowlitz county jail today charged with second degree murder in connection with the death from an illegal operation of her daughter, Alice Sudora Knowles, 25, whose body was found in the Lewis river at Woodland on June 25.

Prosecutor Shirley R. Marsh said other arrests were expected at any time. Marsh said the state's case against the mother was based on the fact that she had deliberately withheld information regarding the movements of her daughter after the latter left her home at Coulee City on June 21, with the expressed intention of having an illegal operation performed.

The prosecutor said Harry A. Johnson, who went through a marriage ceremony with the girl some months ago despite the fact that she had not been divorced from a previous husband, Ernest L. Knowles, was not implicated in the case. Johnson, Marsh said, had opposed the girl's suggestion that she undergo the operation. Knowles is now living in China.

2 HAVE CLOSE CALL AT CRATER LAKE

CRATER LAKE, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Two men had a narrow escape from death or injury when they became trapped in attempting to descend the face of Garfield peak to the shore of Crater lake. Rangers made a midnight rescue. The men, Bronson Armistage, 28, and Walter Stenlake, 21, both of Portland, descended about 2,000 feet in an attempt to go swimming after they had climbed to the top of the peak. Stenlake stumbled on the way down, bruising himself, and the two finally reached the shore but found it impossible to follow the lake line because of cliffs.

They built a bonfire and rangers came to their aid. Park officials said that because of the numerous escapades of visitors, plans were being made to make dangerous climbing about the lake a punishable offense.

 BERLIN, Aug. 7.—A Nazi official branded as "mad" today reported execution of four German nationals by Spanish leftists while the official press was rife with charges that Soviet Russia was encouraging the "bolshavization" of Spain.

A double-barreled protest against the shooting of the German citizens and against an "unprovoked" shelling of the German steamer Sevilla was dispatched by the German foreign office to Madrid and Barcelona.

General Debate Feared.
 Fervently the French government worked for an eight-nation European accord for non-intervention in Spain fully conscious of the possibility that the bloody fratricidal war on the peninsula might become of illness, of Harold Smalwood of Ventura, Calif. Smalwood was stricken this morning and this afternoon underwent a successful appendicitis operation.

Uneasiness over the Spanish situation was reflected in London when the British government protested to both the rebels and the liberal government against endangering neutrals in the Gibraltar area.

(Downing street warned suitable stores would be taken if the situation did not improve.)
 For the moment at least the attitude of the Hitler government toward the proposed general hand-off policy in Spain was one of cold reserve.

Russia Accused.
 The last press meanwhile openly accused the Soviets with actively participating in "the bolshavization" of Spain.
 Full page headlines announced, "Soviet volunteers are en route to Spain."

Fishing Conditions in North Umpqua Area, Now Only Fair, Expected to Soon Improve

Fishing conditions in the streams of the Umpqua National forest are only fair, but are expected to show improvement soon, according to the weekly bulletin issued from local headquarters of the forest. Road and stream conditions are listed as follows:

North Umpqua district: All roads and trails in the N. Umpqua district are in excellent condition, except that section of the N. Umpqua road just above the boundary, which is under reconstruction. This section is somewhat rough, but passable. The streams in this district are extremely low, and last week's catches were below normal. Fishing above Steamboat has been very poor due to shooting on road construction at this place. Few catches were being made in Little River. The outlook for steelhead fishing is good, since a new run of steelhead is reported on the coast, and it is expected they will have reached this territory some time next week. Many people are now taking advantage of the excellent recreational developments at Wolf creek forest camp.

South Umpqua district: Indications are good for a fair huckleberry crop in the vicinity of Huckleberry can. It is reported they will be in full bearing during the last of August. Fishing is reported poor at Fish lake. However, a few limit catches are being made with flies in the upper South Umpqua river. All roads and trails in this district are in good shape, although the South Umpqua road is somewhat rough. Those going by way of the Tiller trail road toward Union creek or Diamond lake may vary their trip by turning off at Drews and taking the road along the Rogue-Umpqua divide, from which

plotted. America might have picked up additional points in the 400 meters except for the sudden withdrawal, lead to a general European conflagration.

Negroes Win Laurels
 Williams' victory, gained by two tenths of a second, gave the United States her third sprint crown and represented the sixth Olympic gold medal captured by American negroes.

Professing, Jesse Owens won the 100 and 200-meter sprints and the broad jump for the first Olympic triple in 12 years. John Woodruff of Connelleyville, Pa., triumphed in the 800-meter run, and Cornelius Johnson of Los Angeles captured the high jump.

Setting a record smashing pace for Olympic decathlon competition, Bob Clark of San Francisco, former national A. A. U. titleholder, won two of the five events on today's all-around program, amassing 4,194 points.

Clark captured the 100-meter sprint in 10.9 seconds, a record, and the broad jump with a record leap of 25 feet and then turned in a fine 50 second performance in the 400-meter sprint.

Glenn Morris, Fort Collins, Colo., world record holder, won the 400-meter dash in the sensational time of 19.4 seconds, bettering all previous decathlon records, and ended the first day with a total of 1,192 points, right on Clark's heels.

Clark retained the decathlon lead through the shotput event, heaving the ball 12.68 meters, 11 feet 7 3/32 inches.

Morris, winner of the shot put with a toss of 14.10 meters, 46 feet 2 3/4 inches, moved into second place as Parker dropped a notch to third, with 3,885 points.

Another Mark Broken
 Hockert of Finland captured the Olympic 5,000-meter championship in record-breaking fashion.

Hockert lowered the Olympic standard of 14:30 made by his compatriot, Lauri Lehtinen in 1932, by seven and 8/10th seconds, winning a grueling race in 14:22.

Lehtinen, the defending champion, and John Henry Jonsson of Sweden, who finished second and third, also were clocked under the former Olympic record.

The two American starters, Louis Zamperini, Torrance, Calif., schoolboy, and Don Lash of Auburn, Ind., finished eighth and fourth, respectively.

Diamond Lake district: Fishing is reported fair in the streams in this district, with a few limit catches being made on flies and bait. All the streams are quite low at this time. Fishing at Diamond lake is just fair. Some catches are made with flies and trolling. All roads in this district are in good shape, but very dusty. There is a commercial packer at Diamond lake now with 20 head of horses which may be hired either for pack trips or recreation trips. There are many interesting hiking or riding trips around Mt. Bailey and along Skyline trail. Excellent views of the surrounding country can also be had from Climenon butte, Kelley mountain and Elephant mountain. It is possible to drive all the way to these lookouts. There are now approximately 15 cabins available for lease at Diamond lake. However, it is advisable to make reservations of these cabins before going to the lake, if one intends to stay for any length of time.

Bohemia district: Fishing in the Bohemia district is very poor at this time, due to the fact that the streams are too low and the small or accessible streams have been lately fished out. The roads and trails in this district are somewhat rough but passable. The forest service is making extensive developments at Cedar forest camp on Brice creek, with new tables and fireplaces being constructed. Fairview lookout is receiving numerous visitors and people can get a wonderful scenic view of the surrounding country from here. This lookout can be reached by auto and over a good road.

CANAL BREAK HITS OREGON FARMERS

BEND, Aug. 7.—(AP)—Water tearing through a dirt embankment near the lower end of the long, Bume in Deschutes canyon, south of here, extensively damaged the central Oregon irrigation company's canal last night, leaving thousands of acres, particularly near Powell Butte, without water. The break destroyed approximately 150 feet of the canal, the water pouring back into the Deschutes river, and causing a critical situation.

The cause of the rupture was unknown, although some were inclined to blame it upon rodents undermining the bank. The canal carried about 500 second foot of water.

Farmers were justifiably in need of water for potatoes, flax, and alfalfa and their position was painful for the break probably will require a weeks work.

WIFE CONVICTED OF MURDER PLOT

MILTON, Fla., Aug. 7.—(AP)—Mrs. Mary Vann, 49, was convicted today of being an accessory before the fact in a conspiracy to commit murder by hiring two negroes to attempt to wreck the railroad train on which her 60-year-old husband was engineer.

The conviction carries a possible sentence of from one to 30 years imprisonment. Mrs. Vann remained calm as the jury reported after deliberating 113 hours.

The husband has maintained a belief in his wife's innocence. The state claimed Mrs. Vann and Earl Travis, 35-year-old, former carpenter and night club operator, planned the husband's death so they might collect his life insurance and be free to marry.

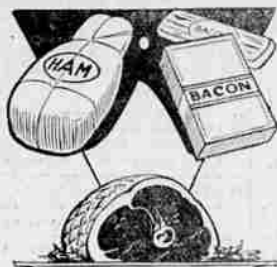
