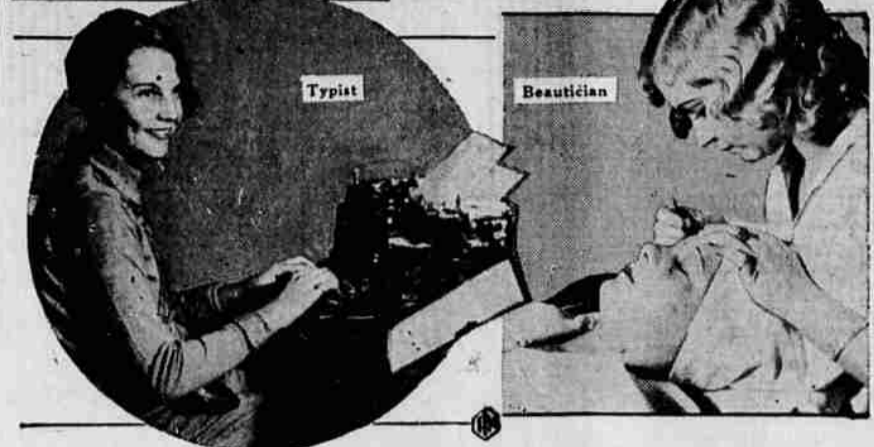

As another army of young women graduates prepare to storm the citadels of commerce, the question arises as to how their older sisters are faring in the world of business. Recent census survey shows that 10,500,000 women are "gainfully employed", nearly one-third the total number of men working. Of this number, about 2,000,000 are classified as clerks, accountants, cashiers or typists. Another 700,000 are employed as saleswomen. This figure serves to indicate the progress of women in business in the past 70 years. But it is still true that in certain lines they are handicapped by old prejudices and discrimination. Few women are able to rise above the \$5,000-a-year class. When they are in line for positions of such responsibility that a salary in the higher brackets is merited, a man is often chosen. But the old order is changing and the graduate of 1936 may well doff her bonnet to her sister of yesteryear for blazing the trail!

FIG PRESERVES

6 quarts white figs Soda water to cover 6 cups cold water 6 cups sugar 3 lemons Wash figs. Soak figs in soda water overnight. Rinse figs in morning. Place figs in roaster. Add 6 cups cold water, 6 cups sugar, 3 lemons washed and sliced into very thin slices. Roast in a moderate oven all day, or until almost thick enough to cut. Can and seal.

RIPE TOMATO PRESERVES

MRS. BLANCHE BOYER, Roseburg, Ore. MRS. CORA COLLARSON, Roseburg, Ore. Put through the food chopper the following: Ripe tomatoes, apples and oranges. For every 2 cups tomato and 2 cups apple add 3 cups sugar and 1 ground orange. Do not peel any of the fruit. Boil all together until smooth and clear.

ADA ADDISON, Roseburg, Ore. 1/2 cup oil 1/2 cup tarragon vinegar 1/2 cup catsup 1 t. salt 1 t. paprika 1/2 cup sugar Juice of 1 lemon Grated juice of 1 onion Mix well. Put into glass container and shake well before using. Excellent on green vegetables or fish salads.
